

Raisin Apple Rennet Custard

14 cup chopped raisins cup thick applesauce 2 cups milk (not canned) 1 package vanilla rennet powder

among 4 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. When comfortably warm (110° F.) not bot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package vanilla rennet powder at one time. these rennet custards are as easy to digest as they are to prepare.

Age vanish rennet is dissolved — not over one minute. Pour at once, while over one minute. still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes. while milk sets. Then chill in refrig-e ator until serving time. Serve plain or with whipped cream.

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

Gayle Steward's Essay

(Continued from Front Page) did most of the writing for he could express himself well. Jefferson's declarration did two things. (1) It stated a new idea of rights of people. (2) It broke all ties with England.

The idea of this declaration was not new. To a large extent they were the same ideas that had been used to justify the revolution against King James II in 1688. This document is one of our most cher-

After the Declaration of Independence was adopted in Philadelphia, July 14, 1776, a struggle for independence followed. The colonists lacked men, money and equipment, but they were fighting for a cause they believed in. The colonies also received foreign aid. With the help of all these, American colonies won their independence from England.

The people had to have a government for their young nation. The people had tried the Articles of Confederation and they had failed. The people decided to see if they could improve their government. Each state was invited. Every state except Rhode Island attended these

meetings. In June, 1787, a group of men sat in a small room of the State House. The chairman of this group was George Washington. The members of this group paid close heed to his advice. These meetings and others were devoted to making a written plan of the government. Attending these meetings were such men as James Madison, Ben Franklin, and Governour Morris.

Virginia proposed a plan for a strong government. This plan had three parts of government (1) Congress (2) law-enforcing body (3) courts. This plan proposed that the states be represented according to population. New Jersey proposed that each state be represented equally, regardless of population or

Finally after long and serious debates on these plans, a compromise was reached. It was agreed that Congress should have a Senate and House of Representatives. In the House of Representatives, the states were to be represented according to size. But, in the Senate each state had two Senators and two votes. Since a bill had to be approved by each house, the states would be equally represented.

With their work completed, on September 17, 1787, the members said good-bye to each other and left Philadelphia.

Some people feared that this government would take away their rights, as Britain had done. Thomas Jefferson suggested a Bill of Rights which provided clearly that people of this country may have. This Bill of Rights still protects

our freedoms. I have told America's story. I wish that others could enjoy the freedom and happiness that I do. I have the right to go to the church of my choice, say what I please, take part in my government, choose my own profession and make a home for myself. If it had not been for the men and women who fought for our country, I could not be telling of my home; "America .


