




Lemon Angel Cake


1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix; 1½ cups water; 1 egg; ½ cup butter; 1½ cups sifted confectioners' sugar; 10-inch angel food cake.

Combine pudding mix and 1/4 cup of water in saucepan. Add whole egg and blend well. Then add remaining 11/4 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened. (This takes about 5 minutes.) Remove from heat. Cool about 5 minutes; stir once or twice. Chill.

Cream butter until soft. Add sugar gradually, blending well after each addition. Add chilled pudding gradually, beating well with rotary egg beater.

Split cake into three layers. Spread frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Makes 10 to 12 servings.




