

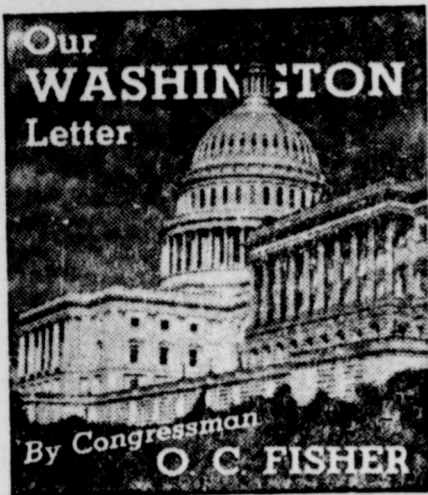

In the face of a ghastly traffic toll of 38,000 killed in the last year 1,350,000 injured, 100,000 permanently maimed, President Eisenhower called a White House Conference on Highway Safety to meet in Washington on Feb. 17. It was an attempt to arouse interest in safety - at a community level.

Aside from crushed bodies, the money loss alone from traffic accidents amounted to \$3.7 billion during the year. Casualty lists sound like a hot war, going on right here at home with every street and highway a front line. It's not pleasant, but we need to remind ourselves that three years ago—in 1951—the U. S. reached its millionth traffic fatality. It took fifty years. But we are moving faster these days and at our present tempo we should reach the second million by 1976!

Yes, it's everybody's job - your job and MINE -- Drive Carefully! What about the Hydrogen bomb? Just how destructive is it? Well, you may soon be seeing a movie or parts of one taken at the first H-bomb test in the Marshall Islands 1952. A private showing has already been given Congressmen. It's no longer a secret that the 1952 test obliterated the test island in the Eniwetok atoll. It tore a cavity in the floor of the ocean -- a crater that would hold 140 structures the size of the Capitol or 14 Pentagon buildings! And that was two years ago. They have been improving them, you know.

The Free Chinese Air Force, operating in U. S. made planes stationed in Formosa, has been taking some liberties across the channel in Red China. Flying at rooftop level, a large group of CAF planes flew over Shanghai just as the Commie radio was beaming congratulations from Malenkov to Mao Tse-tung on the eve of the fourth anniversary of the Peiking-Moscow mutual aid pact. A total of 30 million propaganda leaflets were dropped in the area. All planes returned safely.

## YOUR SENATOR REPORTS

NOT ENOUGH: Department of Agriculture economists predict farm income will be about the same this year as it was last year—unless, that is, "abnormal developments" occur in either the weather of the national economy.

Net cash farm income in 1953 was over four billion dollars below net farm cash income in 1947. Texas farm income was 17 per cent less last year than in 1952.

The farmers' share of the national income was not enough last year. We need to do better this year.

**PURCHASING POWER:** Farm purchases were down last year along with farm income.

Retail sales of farm equipment and machinery ran about 17 per cent below 1952 sales. Gross investment in farm buildings, motor vehicles and other machinery and equipment dropped by \$600,000,000—a decline of 11 per cent.

We must not adopt a farm program which would further reduce the purchasing power of the farmers.

**GREAT TEXAN:** General Ernest O. Thompson, Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission was in Washington to receive from the Venezuelan Ambassador the Order of the Liberator, bestowed upon him for his many years of service in the cause of oil and natural gas conservation.

## SPECIAL GUIDE FOR SELF EMPLOYED ON SOCIAL SECURITY PAYMENTS

A special guide sheet to help self-employed persons in correctly reporting their net income for social security tax purposes is now available, George Clark, manager of the San Angelo social security office, announced today.

This leaflet, "Helpful Guides on Reporting Your Self-Employment Tax," he said, has been issued by the Social Security Administration to supplement instructions given with the Federal income tax forms.

Pointing out that social security benefits payable to a self-employed person and his family in his old-age or to his dependents in case of his death, are based on his earnings credited to his social security, Clark stressed the importance of correct reporting. "It costs the worker as well as the Government additional time and expense when an incomplete or incorrect return has to be straightened out," he declared.

This guide to accurate reporting of self-employment net income is available for the asking at the San Angelo and other social security offices.

Clark urges all self-employed persons whose trade or business is covered by social security to get a copy before making out their 1953 Federal income tax form. The social security tax of 2 1-4 percent must be paid at the time the form is filled on or before March 15.

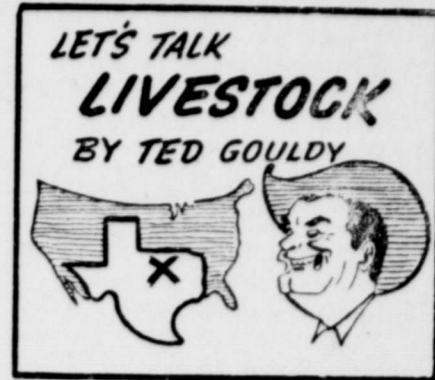

Fort Worth—The nation is in for another beef eating spree in 1954 on the basis of the report that the cattle population was one per cent higher on Jan. 1 than a year earlier.

The estimate is that there are 94.7 million cattle on farms in the United States. Last year (1953) beef consumption per capita in the Nation was at a record level, and about 12 lbs. above the preceding year. Estimates are that this year the nation will eat only a little less beef per capita.

The American Meat Institute says that beef is at an all-time low. The same goes for the price of all meats on the average. They base this figure on the number of minutes of labor required to buy a pound of meat.

The Institute's figures reveal that during 1953 it required only 23.6 minutes of labor to pay for a pound of beef. During the depths of the depression it took 35 minutes labor to earn the money to buy a pound of beef.

The average labor required for a pound of "all meats" in 1953 was only 21.2 minutes. During the depression it required 30.8 minutes labor to buy a pound of beef.

At Fort Worth Monday fed cattle were fully steady to strong, except some half fat yearlings and heifers that were drabby and weak. Some club yearlings topped at \$25 and the better grades of commercially fattened heaves sold from \$17 to \$22.50. Fat cows drew \$10 to \$12.50 and canners and cutters \$7 to \$10.50. Bulls sold from \$10 to \$14, a few higher. Fat calves drew \$15 to \$20, lower grades \$10 to \$15.

Desirable stocker calves \$16 to \$20, feeder cattle were quoted to \$20 or above. Stocker cows \$9 to \$13.50.

The Teague Chronicle reported recently that some losses are occurring in cattle on lush early grass along the Brazos bottomlands. The trouble has been diagnosed as "grass tetany" and seems similar to what was called "wheat field poisoning" in the wheat field country. Springer heifers and cows with young calves seem to be the principal sufferers.

If your cattle show nervousness, weakness, violent temperature, staggering gait, etc., call a veterinary at once. It may prevent losses if you act quickly.

Hogs were 25c higher Monday at Fort Worth. Top was \$26.50 to \$26.75. Sows \$21 to \$24.

The boys from Burnet County furnished the highlight of the Monday sheep trade at Fort Worth. They had shorn fat old crop lambs that brought the day's high of \$19. Most other clipped lambs sold from \$16 to \$18.50, with lower grades \$12 to \$16. Feeder shorn lambs drew \$18.50 down, and some light-weight woolled feeders drew \$19.

The year's best price was equalled on new crop milk fat lambs with the toppy kinds sold from \$23.25 to \$23.75. Old ewes drew \$7 to \$9, some stocker ewes to \$10 to \$12. Old bucks \$4 to \$5. Aged wethers \$9 to \$12. Yearlings and two-year-olds \$12 to \$16.

Commercial feeding projects continue to become more and more popular with the 4-H and FFA youths. This is a type of program we have advocated for a long time and which we believe has much to recommend it.

It is noteworthy that of the numerous groups of such youths who have marketed their stock at Fort Worth, many of the boys have ten to twenty animals. Many report a fair profit, which is better than lots of the old folks have been doing.

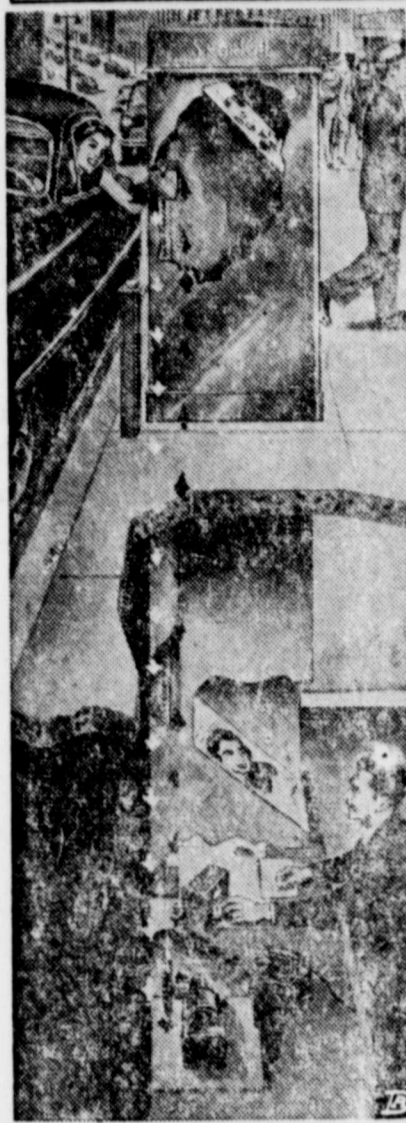

### Banks Go Underground to Speed Service



Modern banks are going underground to provide fast curbside service and eliminate double-parking in heavily congested areas. They're doing it with bullet-proof, weather-proof "Snorkels," devices developed by the Mosler Safe Company, builder of the vaults protecting the nation's gold at Fort Knox. A "Snorkel," about the size of a king-size mail box, is installed next to the curb outside the bank.

The drawing shows the unit's 2-way periscope-type mirrors and speaker system which enable the motorist-customer to see and talk with the bank teller, safely seated beneath the sidewalk in the bank's basement.

Arrows show how the motorist in her car places deposit or withdrawal slip on a tray-like elevator which lowers it to the teller. In less than half a minute the bank-book is returned and the customer departs. Time-saving "Snorkels" are already being used by banks from coast to coast.

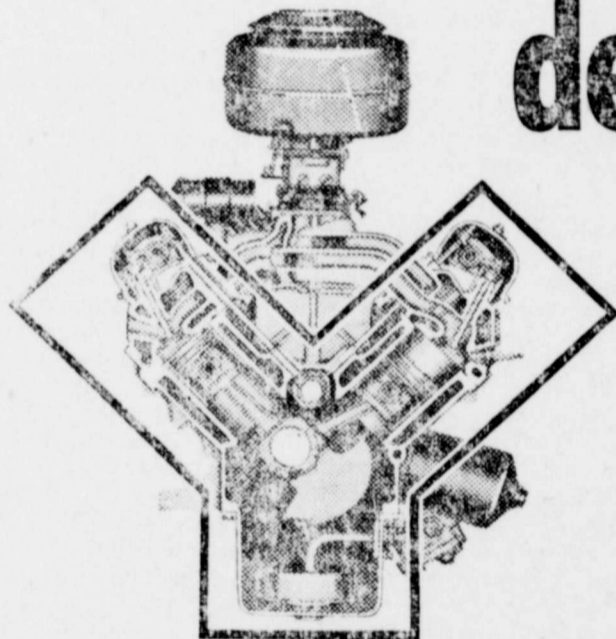

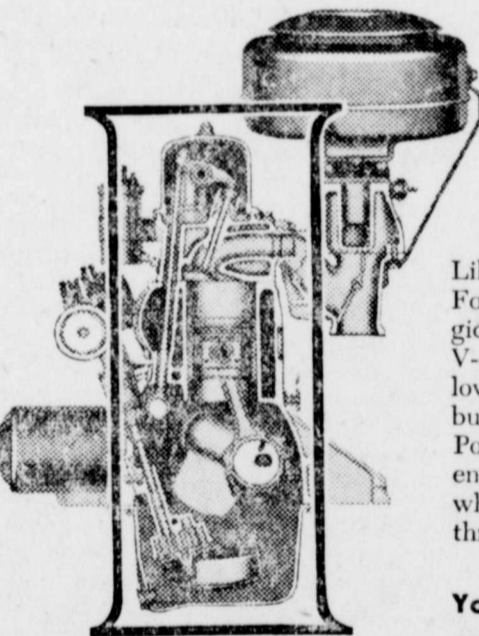



**Help For Leftovers**

NOWADAYS, there are many interesting and imaginative dishes to make from leftovers, but sometimes even your best efforts may result in a main course that isn't quite up to snuff. When this happens to you, let a lush dessert come to the rescue. With a rich, chocolaty dessert like Chocolate Pompadour Pudding to finish the meal, you're likely to hear only praise for an excellent dinner!

**Chocolate Pompadour Pudding**  
1 square unsweetened chocolate; 6 tablespoons sugar; 2 tablespoons milk; 1/2 cup sugar; 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch; dash of salt; 2 cups milk; 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 2 egg whites.

Melt chocolate over hot water. Add 6 tablespoons sugar and 2 tablespoons milk. Set aside.

Combine 1/2 cup sugar, cornstarch and salt in top of double boiler. Add milk and blend. Place over boiling water and cook and stir until mixture thickens—about 15 minutes. Pour small amount of hot mixture over egg yolks, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add vanilla. Pour into custard cups, filling two-thirds full.

Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold in chocolate mixture. Pour over pudding. Set custard cups in hot water. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Cool, then chill. Makes 5 servings.

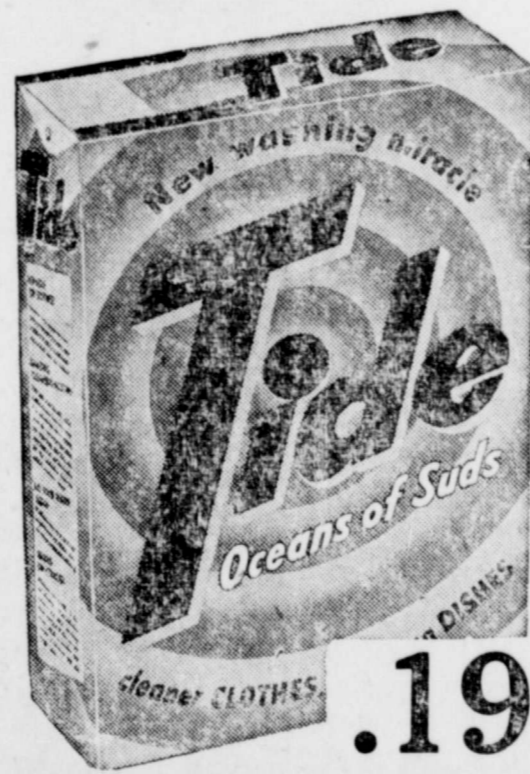

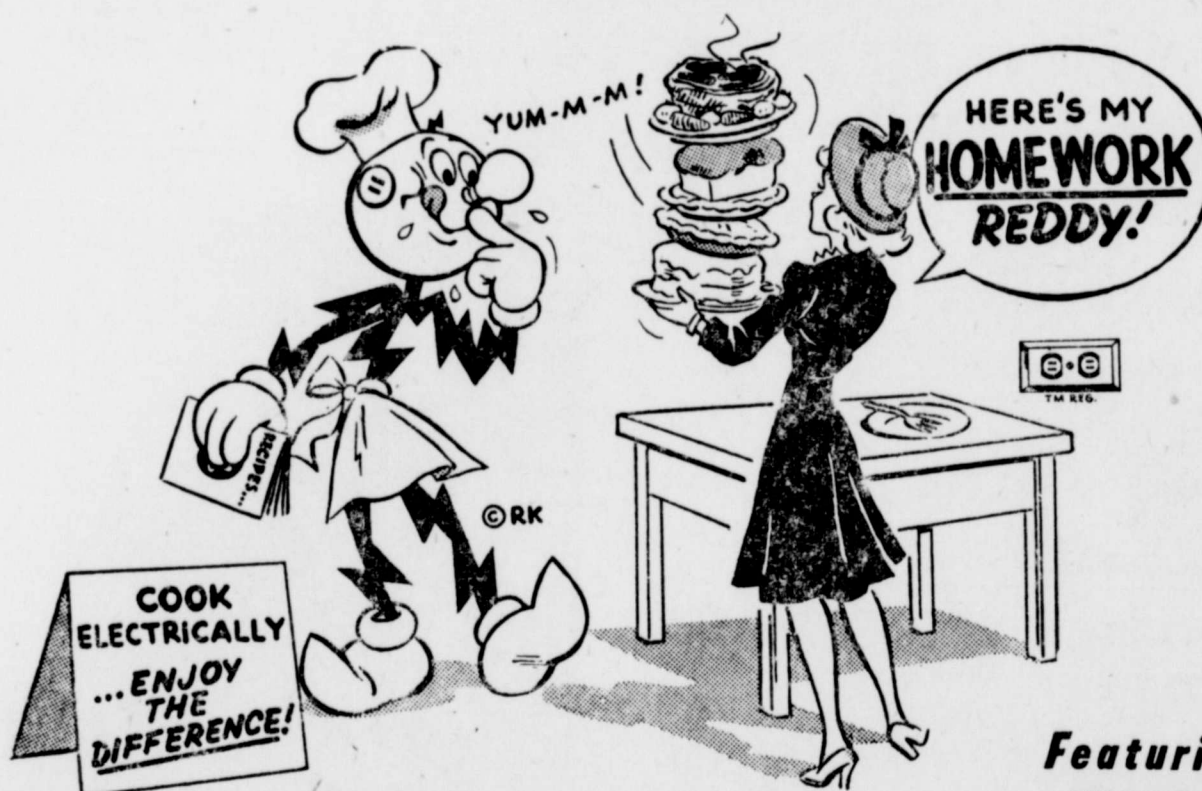
