-Continued from Front Page) yearlings were steady to 25 or 50 cents lower, and some of the medium to good kinds of lighter yearlings were fully 50e off and instances more. Many of these apparently had a wheat or oat pasture background and they were relatively numerous.

Cows were largely steady, though some buyers talked lower and bought a few that way. Bulls were steady. Slaughter calves got away about like late last week, some of the not-so-good heavies inclined lower with light yearlings of the


