

# Frying Can Be Easy



Be sure oil is heated to correct frying temperature before adding food. For best results use a deepfat thermometer.

Mazola Salad Oil comes ready to use. You will like its convenience . . being liquid it pours and measures easily

Chart for Correct Frying Method

How Much Oil: Use 1 quart oil for a 3-quart frying kettle. Never fill more than 1/3 full.

When To Fry: Heat oil to 375° F. Test with frying thermometer or bread cube, 1-inch square of dayold bread turns to a golden brown in 30 to 40 seconds. Never add food until correct temperature is reached for frying.

How To Prepare Food: For coated foods (chicken, fish) keep flour or crumb coating light and even. Shake off excess before frying. For moist foods, like potatoes, dry with towel before frying.



You can re-use oil. That makes it economical to use for frying. But it must be properly strained and stored in refrigerator for next use.

The secret for perfect frying is the choice of bland, fresh tasting corn oil and the correct frying method for the food.

How To Fry: Add foods to hot oil slowly to prevent excessive lowering of temperature. Do not overload fryer. Fry to a golden brown. Drain foods thoroughly on paper towels. Cool oil, then strain into dry container. Cover and store in refrigerator for next use.

How To Care For Used Oil: After each use, allow oil to cool slightly then strain through cheesecloth into dry container. This removes food particles and crumbs. Be sure the container is dry. Let oil cool completely, cover container tight'y and store in refrigerator

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

starve. In the "fat" years, we must

save the precious water that will

take us through the lean years. This means heavier concentration on small dams and upstream water projects. Texas is a "big" state and many of its problems can be solved only through "big" projects. But the 'big" water projects do not meet the needs of all our people. We need thousands of small dams in the upland areas-dams that will not only soter water but give Texans protection against the flash

floods that do so much damage and


wash away the soil. We have had many surveysmany projects. But we haven't licked the problem yet! It is going to take all of us-working together -to get something done. About 300 years ago, a very wise man said: "God helps them who help themselves." I think this is just another way of saying that the Almighty will respond to our own faith, confidence and courage.

I am working in close cooperation with the Government agencies that are involved in Soil Conservation; Flood Control and Reclamation. There are some fine men in those agencies-men who have dedicated their lives to saving the soil as a heritage for our children. I have appeared before Congressional Committees and urged project after

Saute coconut in butter until golden brown, stirring constantly. Add crumbs and mix well. Press half of mixture in bottom of 9x9x2-

Dissolve orange-flavored gelatin in hot water. Add honey and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in whipped evaporated milk. Turn out over coconut-crumb mixture in pan and top with remaining coconut and crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut in 214-inch squares. Makes 8 servings.



#### SAM CONNALLY OF SAN SABA ANNOUNCES FOR CONGRESS

Sam Connally of San Saba officially announced this week that he will be a candidate for U. S. Representative from the 21st Congressional District of Texas, and spelled out some of the issues on which he will base his campaign.

Heading the list is his proposal to work for an increase in the income tax exemption, which he says is essential to bolster the drouthstricken economy in this congressional district. Connally's stand on this issue is in direct opposition to action taken by the incumbent Congressman from this district. who voted against a similiar proposal and was instrumental in hav- ceived his public school education

"I strongly favor raising the income tax exemption from \$600 to



\$700 per year," Connally said. 'Drouth-hit taxpayers must have some relief. The fellows who need it most and who would be helped most are the little fellows, not the big corporations. My father always told me that the big fellow can take care of himself, and that we need able representation to take have bee nset as follows: care of the little man.'

Another proposal voiced by Connally is to work for a comprehensive water- conservation program with less federal control and greater participation and control on the state and local levels. This he sees as one of the most vital problems facing Texas today.

Connally said his decision to be a candidate for Congress was prompted "by my desire to serve the people and because I feel that I can offer representation in Congress that will more truly reflect the thinking and wishes of the people of this district."

"As long as I am your Congressman, I will stay on the job," he declared, "and will not let Washington social or political life become so engrossing as to lose sight of the fact that I am a representative of all the people of my district."

Now serving his third consecutive term as district attorney of the seven-county 33rd Judicial District. Connally is a 38-year-old Air Force veteran of World War II. He is married and has a 6-year-old daughter, Terry, named after former U. S. Senator Tom T. Connally, a dis-

A native of Rosebud, Connally grew up in Brownwood and rethere. He received his B.A. degree from Daniel Baker College, Brownwood, later attending George Washington University and National University in Washington, D. C. where he received the LL.B. degree. Connally was admitted to the bar in 1940 and practiced in the Brownwood law firm of Wilkinson, Johnson & Griffin before entering military service in World War II.

Volunteering into the Air Force as a private in 1942, he subsequently was assigned to Aviation Cadet Communications School at Yale University where he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Force in 1943. He served in New Guinea, the Philippines and finally in Japan. Upon being separated from the military service in 1946 as a captain, he returned to law practice in Brownwood. was serving as president- of the Brownwood Junior Chamber of Commerce when he moved to San elected district attorney in 1948.

Connally is a member of the board of trustees of the First Methodist Church in San Saba, a member of the Chamber of Commerce and Masonic Lodge, and is a member and past commander of the Wiley B. Murray Post of the American (Pol. Adv.

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
