Donkey Softball Game Here June 15

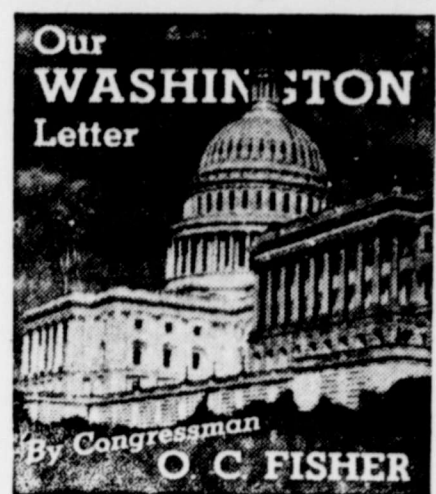

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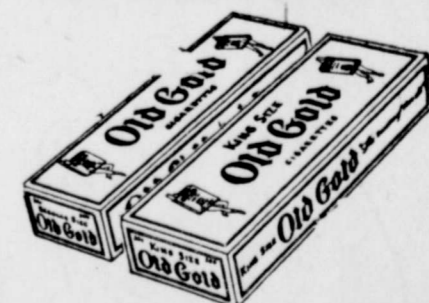


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DESSERT OF THE MONTH

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Fudge Pie

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 egg yolks
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 2 egg whites
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell
- 1/2 cup cream, whipped

Cream butter, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add vanilla and blend. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each. Add melted chocolate and mix well. Then add flour and blend.

Beat egg whites with salt until stiff, but not dry. Fold in chocolate mixture. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until pie is completely puffed across top. Cool. Top with whipped cream and sprinkle with shaved chocolate.

I say "her" because up to a couple of weeks ago nobody was quite sure. But now "Blinky's" a mother—of two chicks!

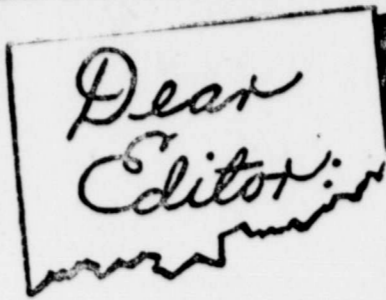

An Easy Change

GIVE a gal a new party dress and presto—she's a new woman. Try the same technique on that favorite "gal" of the food world, butter-scotch pudding and pie filling mix, and presto—a delicious new dessert treat! And it's so easy. First, for an extra plus in flavor, add strong coffee, then a touch of luxury with whipped cream and pecan meats. Finally, garnish with individual baked meringue puffs—and, oh boy—what a dish!

Coffee-Scotch Cream
1 package butterscotch pudding and pie filling mix; 1½ cups milk; ½ cup strong coffee; ½ cup cream, whipped; ½ cup broken pecan meats.

Combine pudding mix, milk and coffee in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Pour into bowl. (To avoid surface film, place waxed paper directly on surface of hot pudding.) Chill, then beat slowly with rotary egg beater. Fold in whipped cream and pecan meats. Turn into serving bowl. Garnish with individual baked meringues or whipped cream and additional nut meats. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

Honey Coconut Delight is one of those wonderful prepared-the-night-before dishes that you put in your refrigerator and forget about until time to serve. Add a little whipped cream if you wish just before serving. Then just sit back, take it easy and enjoy your guests!

Coconut Honey Delight
1 cup shredded coconut; ¼ cup butter; 1½ cups fine vanilla wafer crumbs.

1 package orange-flavored gelatin; 1 cup hot water; ½ cup honey; 2 tablespoons lemon juice; 1 cup evaporated milk, chilled and whipped.

Saute coconut in butter until golden brown, stirring constantly. Add crumbs and mix well. Press half of mixture in bottom of 9x9x2-inch pan.

Dissolve orange-flavored gelatin in hot water. Add honey and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in whipped evaporated milk. Turn out over coconut-crumbs mixture in pan and top with remaining coconut and crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut in 2½-inch squares. Makes 8 servings.
