

North Concho River Soil **Conservation** News Column

The North Concho River soil conservation district has entered the national Soil Conservation Awards program sponsored by the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. of Akron, Ohio, it was announced today by District Chairman J. R. Mims, of Water Valley.

Members of the North Concho district will compete against other soil conservation districts in the state. Non-partisan judging committees. selected from Texas's outstanding exponents of the soil conservation movement, will determine the state's outstanding district for the period May 1, 1954 and April 30, 1955 on a basis of total points scored in performance of regular district duties.

Grand award for one member of each winning district governing body and the top cooperating farmer or rancher named by the district will be a one-week, expense-free, vacation trip to Goodyear's fabulous winter resort, the Wigwam Guest ranch on Goodyear Farms, Litchfield Park, Ariz., in December, 1955.





Here is a summer drink, both "different" and delicious, and one you'll be glad to have "discovered"! The ingredients? Just items you are likely always to have on hand: a box of shredded coconut, a can of concentrated quick-frozen orange juice! The rest? A 10-minute simmer, a thorough chilling — a wonderful beverage for the good old summertime!

Coconut shell beverage glasses aren't a "must" for serving this unusual - as well as unusually delicious - summer drink, but they are fun! If you feel in the mood for making them, here is the formula: puncture the "eyes" of a fresh coconut and pour off the milk. Saw off the upper third of the shell and remove most of the coconut meat, leaving about a quarter inch border. Invert the upper third of the shell for a "coaster." And if you use your favorite old-fashioned glasses, this Orange Coconut Flip will taste just as good - just pass a plate of rich, chewy brownies as an accompaniment.

Orange Coconut Flip 1½ cups shredded coconut (1 box) 3 cups water % cup (founce can) concentrated heat. Then cover and simmer 10 minutes. Cool. Strain through cheesecloth. Add orange juice and mix until blended. Serve with cup (6-ounce can) concentrated % quick-frozen orange juice



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

Free Chest X-Rays Here Next Month

Saturday, July 31, has been set as the date for the mass X-raying of Sterling County residents by the State Department of Health X-ray unit. The department is staging campaign here as the result of being asked by the Noratadata Club. Mrs. Martin C. Reed was named chairman for the affair with Mr. O. T. Jones as co-chairman.

All citizens 15 years old or over are to be X-rayed. Children do not have TB except when an older member of the family has it. so no children will be X-rayed. The findings include not only tuberculosis but lung cancer and enlarged hearts, pointed out Gauss. The goal of the program is 100 percent of the population of the ages mentioned. Gauss pointed out that if TB is found in early stages it can be relatively easily cured.

The club sponsored the mass X-rays back in 1949 and only 577 people were X-rayed. Gauss said people should have their chests Xrayed at least once each year. The older people are the ones that need For COMMISSIONER, Prec. No. 1: it worst-because they constitute the reservoir of TB left in the For COMMISSIONER, Prec. No. 2: state. The young people are the ones, though, who catch it from the older ones when it is not known. TB is contracted only by constant association of persons with people who have TB in the infectious stage, pointed out the health official.

The X-raying only takes a minute or so. No clothes have to be removed and a minutes precaution in this matter may save your life or the life of one of your family.

Entering into the campaign with the Noratadata Club are members from the Lions Club and the Wimodausis Club of Sterling City.

The hours for the X-raying on July 31 will be from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. As last time, the machines are to be set up in the showroom of the Sterling Motor Company.

H-Bomb Color Film Now Available

Congressman O. C. Fisher has authorized this newspaper to announce that a 30-minute film in technicolor of the first hydrogen bomb test in history may be borrowed for local showing by writing him in Washington.

The 16-mm film, purchased by Fisher from the Atomic Energy Commission, was made by the Air Force during the "Operation Ivy" test in the South Pacific. It will be recalled that after viewing the spectacular explosion, a sailor wrote home that "an island disappeared." Fisher says he thinks it would be a good thing if every American

could see this showing of the destructive power of the H-Bomb. He is making the film available to schools, clubs, or other gatherings for programs or special occasions.



The filling is delectable cherry-vanilla ice cream which is the February special of ice cream makers throughout the country. You'll find it in your super markets and drug stores pre-packaged in convenient pints and half-gallons. Cut it in slices to make a uniform and attractive filling for the cake roll. This roll serves 10 to 12 and uses 2 pre-packaged pints or half of a half-gallon of ice cream

Cherry Vanilla Ice Cream Roll

cup sugar 4 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla % cup sifted cake flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 pints pre-packaged cherry vanilla ice cream

Have eggs at room temperature for greater volume. Grease bottom Have eggs at room temperature for greater volume. Grease bottom of a 15x10x1-inch pan; line with waxed paper and grease lightly. Beat eggs with rotary beater until foamy. Add baking powder and salt; beat until very light. Add sugar, about 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating until very thick. Fold in vanilla and sifted flour. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake in moderately hot oven (400°F.) 13 minutes. While cake is baking, sift confectioners' sugar lightly over towel or brown paper. Loosen cake from pan with point of paring knife. Invert pan onto towel or brown paper. Remove pan; quickly remove waxed paper. With both hands roll up cake from narrow side. In rolling, first fold all the way across roll; continue rolling by lifting towel or brown paper with left hand and guiding roll with right hand. Wrap towel or paper with left hand and guiding roll with right hand. Wrap towel or brown paper tightly around roll to hold it in shape. Cool on cake rack
