



Grinding toward the legislative climax of the session, the House this week is tackling the big Agriculture bill and the one dealing with foreign aid.

Over in the Senate the bill implementing upstream water conservation was approved. The House version, previously passed, is believed to be more desirable in the promotion of upstream dam works. A conference committee will iron the differences out.

Last week the House approved conference report on a bill, previously passed by both the House and Senate, which authorizes the Government to contract with individuals for the construction of post offices and other public buildings. Under this plan the Government may contract with individuals whereby the latter will construct a building according to certain plans, rent it to the Government for a number of years, and then, in accordance with the contract, it would become the property of the government. It is hoped this arrangement will result in more Post Offices being built where needed, particularly in the smaller cities and towns.

A controversy flared on Capitol Hill last week when an erroneous news report said President Eisenhower opposed legislation which would deny retirement benefits to Alger Hiss. It was promptly corrected by the White House with the statement that the President favors such legislation. Certainly anyone who works for the Government should be denied any pension or benefit growing out of such service, if such person is guilty of dishonorable conduct while so employed.

My OPERATION IVY film, which I purchased from the Atomic Energy Commission, is proving very popular in our district. I have already received some two dozen requests to borrow it for showings at clubs and other gatherings. It is a technicolor, 30-minute, official filming of the first Hydrogen bomb test ever made.

Turkey Shoot Here On July 11

Sunday, July 11 a Turkey Shoot here in Sterling City will be sponsored by the Sterling County 4-H Club said Fred Campbell, sponsor of the club, this week. Proceeds from the event will go to further this work in the county.

The shoot will be staged at the Emery caliche pit about two miles west of town on US Highway 80. It will get underway about 2 p.m. and will last all afternoon.

Classes will be held for shotguns, .22 cal. rifles, pistols and high-powered rifles. Ranges will be 50 yards for 22 caliber rifles, 25 yards for pistols, 100 yards for high powered rifles and 25 yards for shotguns. Shells will be furnished for the shotgun class, but in all other classes each contestant must furnish his own ammunition and firearm. Official NRA targets will be used. Five rounds will be fired at 22 and pistol targets, three at the high powered targets, and one at the shotgun target. Ten contestants will fire in each class and the high score in each class will win the turkey.

In case sufficient turkeys are not obtainable, suitable prizes will be awarded instead. Turkeys will be dressed and frozen. Each contestant may win only one prize on a range.



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Chest X-Ray Program Here This Month

Saturday, July 31, has been set as the date for the mass X-raying of Sterling County residents by the State Department of Health X-ray unit. The department is staging campaign here as the result of being asked by the Noratadata Club. Mrs. Martin C. Reed was named chairman for the affair with Mr. O. T. Jones as co-chairman.

All citizens 15 years old or over are to be X-rayed. Children do not have TB except when an older member of the family has it, so no children will be X-rayed. The findings include not only tuberculosis but lung cancer and enlarged hearts, pointed out Gauss. The goal of the program is 100 percent of the population of the ages mentioned. Gauss pointed out that if TB is found in early stages it can be relatively easily cured.

The club sponsored the mass X-rays back in 1949 and only 577 people were X-rayed. Gauss said people should have their chests X-rayed at least once each year. The older people are the ones that need it worst—because they constitute the reservoir of TB left in the state. The young people are the ones, though, who catch it from the older ones when it is not known. TB is contracted only by constant association of persons with people who have TB in the infectious stage, pointed out the health official.

The X-raying only takes a minute or so. No clothes have to be removed and a minutes precaution in this matter may save your life or the life of one of your family.

Entering into the campaign with the Noratadata Club are members from the Lions Club and the Wimodausis Club of Sterling City.

The hours for the X-raying on July 31 will be from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. As last time, the machines are to be set up in the showroom of the Sterling Motor Company.





FORT WORTH—Prices of cattle and calves at the end of June are selling around \$1 to \$2 above the same date a year ago. End-of-June 1953 cattle prices were at the next to lowest ebb since World War II. Lowest point on cattle and calf prices since the war was around mid-September 1953.

Hog prices are currently \$1.50 to \$2 behind the end of June last year.

Lamb prices are around \$5 lower on the better fat lambs, to as much as \$2 to \$3 higher on lower grades than a year earlier. Feeders and slaughter ewes are selling about level with end-of-June 1953. Old wethers today sell \$1 above a year ago and shorn old crop lambs are \$1 under a year ago. Breeding ewes enjoy a much better market than a year ago.

COWS, bulls and grassy steers and yearlings were around 50 cents to \$1 lower at Fort Worth Monday. Slaughter calves were weak to 50 cents lower. Stockers were 50 cents to \$1 off, only some choice load lots

of calves selling steady. Dry lot fed steers and yearlings were firm.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$17 to \$23, and common and medium grade grassers sold from \$10 to \$17, and some canner and cutter yearlings sold from \$7 to \$10. (A year ago best fed cattle drew \$18 to \$22, and lower grades ranged from as low as \$4 or \$5 on cull yearlings, up to \$16 on mediums.)

Fat cows Monday sold from \$9 to \$13.25, and cutters drew \$6 to \$9. (A year ago fat cows drew \$8 to \$12.50, and canners and cutters \$4.50 to \$7.50.) Bulls Monday drew \$9 to \$13 odd head higher. (A year ago bulls drew \$7 to \$12.50.)

Good to choice slaughter calves Monday drew \$15 to \$18.50 and common and medium sorts drew \$10 to \$14, with culls from \$7 to \$10. (A year ago good and choice calves drew \$13 to \$16.50, and cull, common and medium grades cashed at \$5 to \$13.)

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$16 to \$20 Monday with the higher figure reserved for load lots of choice kinds. In this bracket were 39 head averaging 513 pounds from Gladys Scaling Martin of Clay County, at \$20; 78 head from Mason Crocker of McCullough County at 294 pounds at \$20; and 27 steer calves at \$20 that came from J. O. Walkup, Wichita County, and averaged 435 pounds. Walkup also had a load of heifer calves at 418 pounds at \$18. Stocker steer yearlings generally sold from \$7 to \$17, mostly \$16 down. Stocker yearlings sold from \$15.50 down and stocker steers cashed from \$11 to \$14.

On Monday at Fort Worth butcher hogs topped at \$24 to \$24.25 most of the better hogs at the higher price and sales of good hogs included a load of 230-pound hog from C. W. Buckles & Son of Rayville, La.; some top hogs from Bill Williams of Parker County; and W. C. Ward of Hill County; all of these at \$24.25.

Less desirable butchers either weight or other standpoints, sold from \$22 to \$23.75. Sows cashed at \$15 to \$18.50. (A year ago top hog sold at \$24.50 to \$26, and sows cashed at \$23 downward.)

GOOD and choice fat Spring lambs sold at \$17 to \$13.50 Monday at Fort Worth, and common to medium sorts drew \$10 to \$15, with cull around \$3 to \$10. Feeder Spring lambs sold at \$14 down. Slaughter shorn yearling lambs cashed at \$8 to \$12, and feeder yearlings drew \$11 down.

Slaughter ewes drew \$5 to \$5.50 and old wethers cashed at \$6 to \$9. Old bucks sold at \$4 to \$5. (A year ago good and choice fat lambs drew \$17 to \$23, but culls sold as low as \$5 to \$10. Yearling lambs drew \$8 to \$13, aged wethers \$5 to \$8 slaughter ewes \$3.50 to \$4.50. Feeder lambs topped at \$14.50 a year ago at this time, with stocker yearling lambs \$8 to \$9.)
