



Log Cabin Fudge

1 cup maple blended syrup; 1 cup sugar; dash of salt; 1/2 cup light % cup broken walnut ·ream, meats.

Combine syrup, sugar, salt, and cream and place over low heat. Bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Then boil, without stirring, until a small amount of mixture forms a soft ball in cold water (or to a temperature of 236° F.) Remove from heat. Cool to lukewarm (110° F.), without stirring. Then beat until mixture loses its gloss (12 to 15 minutes). Add nuts and turn at once into lightly but-tered 8x4x3-inch pan. When cold, cut in squares. Makes 18 large pieces.
