Whams Ackerly 30-20

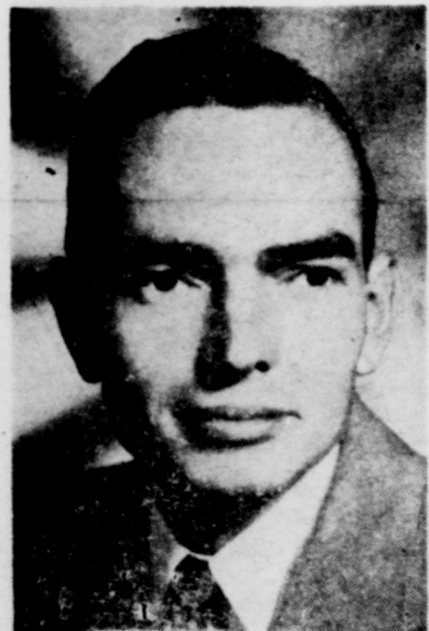

The passing whiz hit Marshall Blair for a first-quarter TD, then repeated in the second period on a pass-and-run play of 63 yards. Billy D. also combined with Don Carper for two scores, both covering 50 yards.

Lynn Glass was on the receiving end of Billy's last heave, a 60-yard scoring play.

Eddie Gill sparked the Ackerly attack, passing to Paul Alexander for 15 yards and a score, and running eight yards for the second six-pointer. Charles Brown passed to Lee Lemons for the final Ackerly tally.

Sterling City plays Mertzion tonight, and goes to Forsan next week, Friday night, October 8, for a crucial conference game with the Buffaloes on their home ground.

Norman Durham Gets Ph. D. from Texas U.

Norman N. Durham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Durham, Eastland, has been awarded the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in bacteriology with a minor in biochemistry at the University of Texas' August commencement exercise.

A member of the Society of American Bacteriologists, Dr. Durham did research in protection of cells from radiations; induced mutations in cells treated with mutagenic agents; and studies of the physiological process of cells damaged by radiations.

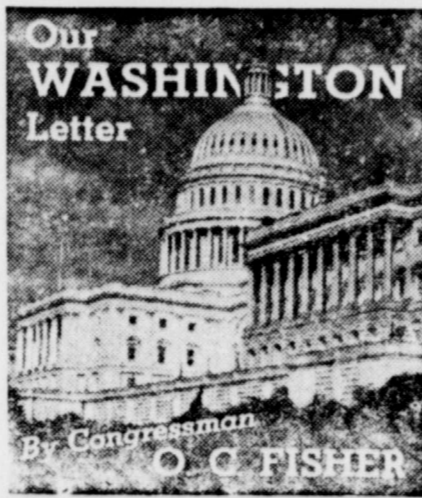
In May of this year he attended the national meeting of the Society of American Bacteriologists in Pittsburgh, Penn. at which he presented a paper on the research in induced mutation studies and mutagenic action on living cells.

Dr. Durham has taken over his new duties as assistant professor in the Department of Bacteriology at Oklahoma A&M College in Stillwater, Oklahoma. Norman is teaching and doing research in the agricultural experimental station.

Dr. Durham graduated from Eastland High School in 1944 and after a year and a half in the Navy he entered North Texas State College in 1946. He majored in biology and minored in chemistry for his B. S. degree and later received his M. S. degree in biology with a minor in education.

He married the former Jane Stovall of Muleshoe and they have one child, Susan, one year old. He is the grandson of Mrs. D. C. Durham.

Livestock and Drouth Loans Available From Agency

Representative O. C. Fisher said today that farmers in the 21st District can obtain a wide variety of operating loans from the Farmers Home Administration. Full details on the loans had been obtained, he said, from officials of the agency. The credit is available immediately and can be used to finance current living and operating expenses as well as the production costs of next year's crops.

The loans fall into three general categories. Representative Fisher said, emergency loans special livestock loans, and regular production and subsistence loans. The production and subsistence loans are made only to operators of family-type farms. The emergency and livestock loans are made to operators of family-type farms and other farmers and ranchers as well. All of the loans are made only to farmers who are unable to obtain the credit from other sources.

The regular production and subsistence loans help small farmers to improve their farming operations. These loans may be made to buy farm and home equipment, feed, seed, lime and fertilizer, and to pay other farm operating and family living expenses.

There is a statutory limit of \$7,000 on each production and subsistence loan and the total outstanding debt for these loans cannot exceed \$10,000. Repayments are based on the income to be received each year after reasonable expenses are met. In no case may the loan run for more than 7 years.

Special livestock loans are made to producers and feeders of cattle, sheep, and goats, except commercial feed lot operators. These loans are made to meet usual expenses necessary to successful livestock operations, such as the purchase or production of feed, and replacing, hiring, or repairing farm machinery and equipment. Livestock loans are not made to expand operations or to pay existing debts, except incidental current-bills.

Livestock loans are made for periods up to 3 years. Any balances remaining on these loans after the 3 years are serviced for collection based on the repayment ability of the borrower. Other creditors are not asked to subordinate their liens, but are expected to stand by and to agree that a reasonable part of the applicants income from livestock can be used in repaying the loan.

Emergency loans are made to farmers and ranchers who because of losses suffered from the drought or local economic conditions need credit to continue their operations.

These loans may be used for purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, machinery repair, replacement of equipment, and for other essential farm and home operating expenses. Emergency loans may not be made to pay existing debts. Ordinarily emergency loans to meet current operating and living expenses are expected to be repaid out of the year's income. Repayment on advances for other purposes are scheduled in accordance with the borrower's ability to pay.

For each loan made, the Government obtains the best security available including a first lien on all crops to be produced with the loan and on all livestock and farm machinery purchased with the loan.

All applications for Farmers Home Administration loans are made at the agency's local county office. These offices are located at: Fredericksburg, Kerrville, San Angelo, Brady, Del Rio, Coleman, Lampasas, Brownwood, San Saba, and Sweetwater.

A "Parfait" Touch For The Seniors

EVEN though you've agreed with your son's wishes and are planning the simplest of menus for the Senior Class Party—he fears that anything but hot dogs and coleslaw will take time from dancing and games! — you hanker to add a touch of elegance to this last school get-together. And you know the girls will approve! So, get out your pretty dishes and prepare a parfait to serve as a late dessert. If you make it chocolate the boys will love it, too!

Chocolate Parfait
 ½ cup sugar; ½ cup water; dash of salt; 3 egg whites; 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled; 2 teaspoons vanilla; 2 cups cream, whipped.

Bring sugar and water to a boil until small amount of syrup forms soft ball in cold water, or spins a long thread when dropped from tip of spoon (238° F.). Add salt to egg whites and beat until they hold up in moist peaks. Add syrup gradually, beating constantly. Continue beating until mixture is cool. Add chocolate and vanilla and blend; fold into cream. Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator and let stand 3 to 4 hours. Or turn mixture into mold, filling it to overflowing; cover with waxed paper and press cover tightly down over paper. Pack in equal parts ice and salt 3 to 4 hours. Makes 1 ¼ quarts parfait.

Mosquito Eradication

Following many complaints and due to the fact that mosquitos are thought to be the vector carrying the virus of encephalitis (sleeping sickness), a committee was appointed from the Lions Club to see what could be done to eliminate the mosquito menace.

This committee met and after discussing the problems involved, decided that the best plan would be to enlist the aid of each business or home owner to carry out the following program:

1. Check all possible openings into cess pools and septic tanks, such as cracks in the ground and cavities of the cover, and eliminate these soon as possible.
2. Put coal oil in all rain barrels or cisterns, and if this is objectionable, make an insect proof cover screen or cover for all openings into the cistern.
3. Cut weeds and tall grass.
4. Spray insecticide with a hand spray in your garage or other buildings where the insects are in the habit of staying during the day time. Consult your County Agent or insecticide dealer for methods and materials to use.

Some of the members of the committee are going to inspect the draws and any place where there is enough run-off water to make a standing pool, and oil any that are found to prevent any further mosquitos from hatching out.

It is hoped that everyone will participate in this program at the same time so that it will be more effective.

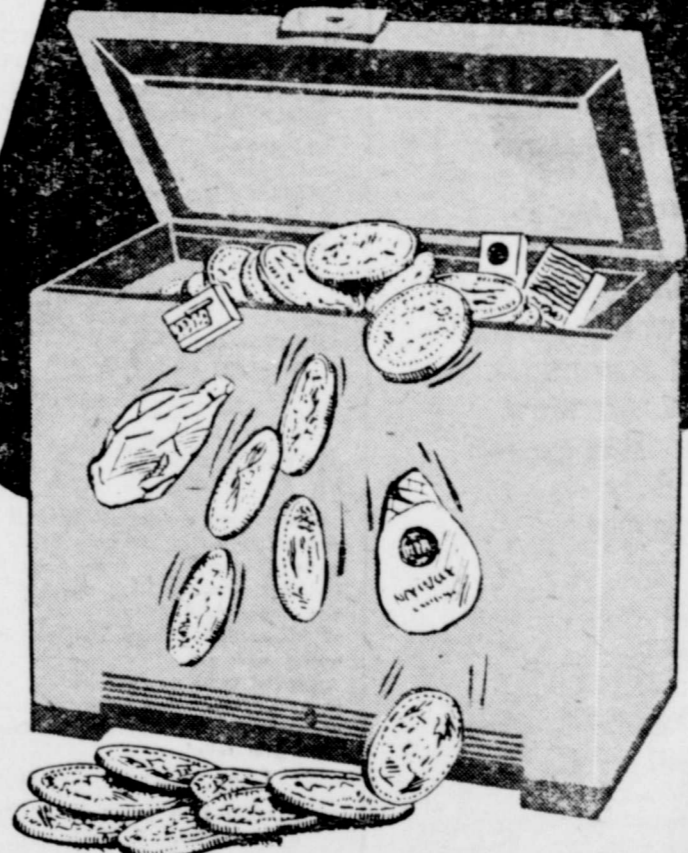

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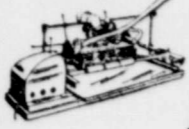

Help For Leftovers

By Betty Barclay

NOWADAYS, there are many interesting and imaginative dishes to make from leftovers, but sometimes even your best efforts may result in a main course that isn't quite up to snuff. When this happens to you, let a lush dessert come to the rescue. With a rich, chocolaty dessert like Chocolate Pompadour Pudding to finish the meal, you're likely to hear only praise for an excellent dinner!

Chocolate Pompadour Pudding
1 square unsweetened chocolate; 6 tablespoons sugar; 2 tablespoons milk; 1/2 cup sugar; 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch; dash of salt; 2 cups milk; 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 2 egg whites.

Melt chocolate over hot water. Add 6 tablespoons sugar and 2 tablespoons milk. Set aside.

Combine 1/2 cup sugar, cornstarch and salt in top of double boiler. Add milk and blend. Place over boiling water and cook and stir until mixture thickens—about 15 minutes. Pour small amount of hot mixture over egg yolks, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add vanilla. Pour into custard cups, filling two-thirds full.

Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold in chocolate mixture. Pour over puddings. Set custard cups in hot water. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Cool, then chill. Makes 5 servings.

IT'S your teen-ager's turn to entertain the "gang" with an evening of dancing and juke-box music on the family record player. If you're the refreshment committee, have plenty of milk and instant cocoa mix on hand for easy-to-mix Chocolate Milks. Get bottles of cold cola beverages so those who want something different, or a bit sophisticated, can mix Chocolate Colas. Or perhaps they'll go for Spicy Chocolate Milks. The fellows enjoy shaking their partners' drinks (although stirring in the glass suffices!) so a couple of shakers might also come in handy.

Cold Chocolate Milk
1 glass cold milk; 2 to 3 heaping teaspoons instant cocoa mix.
Pour milk into a tall glass. Add cocoa mix and stir well. Or shake in shaker. Makes 1 serving.

Note: Dash of salt may be added with the cocoa mix, if desired.

Chocolate Cola. Use recipe for Cold Chocolate Milk, substituting 1 cup cola-flavored beverage for the milk.

Spicy Chocolate Milk. Use recipe for Cold Chocolate Milk, adding dash of ground cloves and dash of cinnamon to the milk.
