Title-Bound Eagles Win Over Christoval Score 50-20

The Sterling City Eagles continued their victory march last Friday night by trampling the Cougars of Christoval for four full quarters. The final score was 50 to 20 in favor of the Sterling boys and they led in scoring all through the game. Christoval had a game team and turned in a good performance, but just could not hold the Eagles back from pay dirt.

As the game opened, Christoval kicked off down over the goal. As the Eagles took the ball on play, Marshall Blair picked up five and then 15 yards. Billy Derrell Blair got an 8-yard run in and Carper racked up 6 yards. On a double pass play then Billy D. passed to Lynn Glass who went over for the first counter of the game. Leslie Cole kicked the ball for 2 extra points making the score 8-0.

Sterling then kicked off to the Christoval lads. J. Wills picked up six yards and a pass from Cochran to Kirby or vice versa was good for a tally for the Cougars. Their kick was no good so the score was 8-6.

Christoval kicked off—over the goal. As Sterling starts play a pass from Billy D. to Leslie Cole got the pigskin down on Christoval's 18 yard line. A pass from Billy to Marshall was good for a TD. Leslie again kicked the ball through the posts for 2 points, making the score 16-6. As play resumed Marshall kicked the ball (out of bounds) to Christoval. Christoval got a pass play over, but Bobby Lester nailed the receiver. Christoval then was not making any ground, and punted.

Don Carper took a pass from Bill and went over for a counter making the score 22-6. As play resumed Christoval lost the ball but recovered it, losing 12 yards on the play. On the next play the Cougars almost made a first down with a pass play. On the next play they lost four yards as Billy D. nailed the guy behind the line of scrimmage. The South Concho boys did make a first on the next play and the first quarter was over.

Christoval couldn't get anywhere with runs and line plunges, so they took to the air from then on with passes. They used the spread formation a lot. After failing to make a first down, Christoval punted. As Sterling began the march down the gridiron, Billy D. made 3 yards; then a pass from Billy to Marshall advanced the ball down to the 9 yard line. Then a pass from Billy to Cole was good for a TD. The score now stood at 28-6. As Sterling kicked and play resumed, Christoval passed, and the pass was intercepted by Carper who run it for 20 yards. The play was called back and Sterling received a penalty, which gave Christoval a first down. Christoval then passed for a TD, bringing the score up to 28-12.

Bobby Lester returned Christoval's kick for 25 yards. A pass from Billy to Marshall was good for a long run. On the next four pass plays, Sterling failed to make a first down and Christoval took over the ball. The Cougars then made some nice gains in passing, but Leslie Cole shagged one of them and run for a TD—but the play was called back by officials. Sterling was penalized to the 1 yard line. On line plays Marshall and Billy took the ball 25 yards to midfield. A pass from Carper to Glass was good for 8 yards and Billy got in a 15 yard run just as the half ended 28-12.

Patsy Martin Crowned Football Sweetheart
At the half Patsy Martin, a senior girl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jake Martin, was crowned Football Sweetheart by the Sterling City team. She is a majorette with the pep squad.

As play resumed after the half time activities, Billy D. intercepted a Christoval pass and picked up 10 yards. But on the next play Carper lost the ball and on the next play he intercepted a Christoval pass and ran for a TD. Leslie got the ball through the uprights for 2 more points, making the score 36-12. As Christoval resumed play with the ball, they failed to make a first down, so Sterling took over on the punt. Soon Sterling returned the punt and Christoval got the ball

on their own 5. Soon they punted and Carper returned the punt 8 yards. Billy D. picked up 5 yards, and then Christoval intercepted the long pass intended for Glass on their own 11 yard line. The Cougars couldn't make much headway at passing, so Wilkinson ran the ball over for a TD. The score was now 36-20. After Christoval kicked Billy D. picked up 20 yards for a first down as the quarter ended.

As fourth quarter play resumed a pass from Marshall to Billy D. gained 11 yards for the Eagles. Don Carper then carried the ball over for a score but the play was called back. Marshall on a run made a first down. Then a double pass play, Marshall to Billy D. to Gaston got that six points that had been called back. The score was now 42-20. Christoval got the kick on their 1 yard line they made some nice gains then slowed down. The Cougars punted and Marshall ran the ball for 10 yards, and Carper over for a first down. Play was then somewhat slowing as game time was drawing close. The final thrill of the game was a pretty pass from Billy Blair to Lynn Glass for a TD. The game ended Sterling City 50 and Christoval 20.

Sterling gained a total of 504 yards in the game, 183 of them by runs and 321 with passes. Out of 14 passing attempts, eleven were completed—a 78% on passes.

Billy D. Blair was the Eagles' biggest ground gainer of the night with 333 yards gained. He picked up 91 yards running and 242 on passes.

Blackwell Game

The Blackwell game was moved up from Friday night, November 12 to Thursday afternoon, Nov. 11, due to the holiday. The game is being played in Blackwell as this paper is being printed. If Sterling wins over Blackwell, the Eagles will represent the district in bi-district play—probably with Lohn.

It is presumed that the Eagles will have no trouble with Blackwell, and school officials are to go and make arrangements with Lohn officials next Sunday for the site of the bi-district game.

Mrs. Matilda Jane, (Mattie) Kellis Glass, 81, one of the early teachers in Sterling County, died at 2:30 a.m. last Saturday in the Sterling County hospital. She had been a patient since October 20 because of a heart ailment. She was in a coma the last days of her illness.

Funeral services were conducted here Sunday afternoon at the First Methodist Church. Dr. Baxter D.D. Greer, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church here officiated. Dr. B. O. Wood of the First Presbyterian Church of San Angelo assisted.

Lowe Funeral Home and Johnson's Funeral Home of San Angelo had charge of arrangements.

Burial was in the Montvale Cemetery here.

Pallbearers were Earl Bailey, Hal Knight, Aaron Clark, Will Durham, W. B. Allen, Rufus Foster, Lee Reed, and H. F. Donalson.

Mrs. Glass was born at West in McLennan County November 23, 1872. She came with her family to Runnels County in 1885 and the next year they drove on to Sterling County in covered wagons, bringing livestock with them.

The then Miss Kellis taught school at the old Kellis School about seven miles northwest of here on the North Concho River. It was while teaching that she met and married the late J. L. Glass, who was ranching here at the time. The wedding ceremony was solemnized here Dec. 23, 1897, with the late Judge P. D. Coulson officiating.

Her parents were the late Nicholas and Elizabeth Buce; her grandparents Dudley Kellis and Mary Brisco Kellis, Bryant Buce and Matilda Buce. The late Uncle Bill Kellis, widely known as the publisher of the Sterling City News-Record, was a brother. Her late father became a captain in Quail's Division of the Frontier Reserves after volunteering for service.

Survivors include a brother, T. J. Kellis, of Cottonwood, Arizona; three sons, Harvey and David Glass of Sterling City, and Dr. Roy Glass of San Angelo; two daughters, Mrs. S. M. Ray Jr. of Belton and Mrs. W. E. Grigsby of Sanderson; 11 grandchildren, McElroy Ray of Dallas, Jeff Ray of Baltimore, Md., Mrs. Ray Carlisle of Raymondville; Mrs. James Strother of San Angelo; Frank Ray Glass of Houston, Larry and Lynn and Willene Glass of Sterling City, Dan Glass of Sterling City, Gayle Glass of San Angelo and Mrs. Robert I. Langford of Puerto Rico; and eight great-grandchildren.

A son, Frank, died May 28 this year; her husband, J. L., died Oct. 11, 1947.

Thanksgiving Cranberry Relish
No Cooking!

- 4 cups (1-lb.) Ocean Spray Fresh Cranberries
- 2 oranges, quartered (seeds removed)
- 2 cups sugar

Put cranberries and oranges (including rind) through food chopper. Add sugar. Chill. Makes 2 pints. Keeps in refrigerator for weeks.

Time Saving Tip: The family will love this relish so make a large amount and freeze ahead for future needs.

To Make Thanksgiving Cranberry Relish Salad: Make raspberry flavored gelatin, following directions on package, but using 1 1/2 cups water instead of 2 cups. When tartness begins to set, fold in 1 cup Thanksgiving Cranberry Relish. Pour into mold and chill until firm. When ready to serve, invert.

mold and decorate with fresh cranberries and sprigs of parsley.

Sweet Potato Pie

- 2 tablespoons softened butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup mashed sweet potatoes
- 3 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup Karo Syrup, Red or Blue Label
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- 2 tablespoons orange juice
- 1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell

Cream butter and sugar together; add mashed potatoes and eggs. Mix well. Add corn syrup, milk, salt, grated orange rind and juice. Stir until thoroughly mixed. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. Bake in a hot oven (425° F.) 10 minutes; reduce heat to moderate (325° F.) and bake 20 minutes longer or until set.

Apple and Sweet Potato Casserole

- 5 cooked medium-sized sweet potatoes
- 2 green apples, cut in 1/4-inch slices
- 1/4 cup apple-bleended syrup
- 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine

Put apples and sweet potatoes in a 2-quart casserole. Add syrup and butter. Bake at 350° F. for 30 minutes.

1/4-inch slices and place half of the slices in greased baking dish. Arrange apples on potatoes and cover with remaining potatoes. Combine syrup, butter, and salt and pour over top. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 45 minutes. Remove cover and continue baking 30 minutes longer, basting frequently. Makes 6 servings.

Heavenly Pumpkin Pie

- 1 package vanilla pudding and pie filling mix
- 1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 1/2 cups mashed cooked pumpkin
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell

Combine pie filling mix, sugar, ginger, nutmeg, cinnamon, salt, milk, and butter in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Add pumpkin; mix until well blended. Pour into pie shell. Chill until firm. Serve with sweetened whipped cream, if desired.

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Let Her Make It

to serve her chums at the next club meeting, let her try a flashy gelatin dessert. Peach Delight, for instance, is based on orange-flavored gelatin and what could be more colorful than that? Daughter'll be able to prepare it herself since it's as easy as boiling water!

P. S. — She might like it enough to make it for Dad and Mom some summer weekend, too.

Peach Delight

1 package orange-flavored gelatin; 1 cup hot water; 1 cup peach juice and water; 1 cup canned peaches, diced.

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add peach juice and water. Turn 1/2 of gelatin mixture into 1-quart mold. Chill until firm. Chill remaining gelatin until slightly thickened. Then fold in peaches. Turn into mold over firm gelatin. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with sweetened whipped cream flavored with almond extract. Makes 6 servings.

Oh, Fudge!

ON a rainy summer day little girls get restless with nowhere to go, not even school. This gives their mothers the chance to teach them the proper way to prepare a batch of fudge.



After all, each girl should acquire the know-how of fudge making before she reaches the stage of entertaining the boy-next-door!

Reliance Fudge

2 squares unsweetened chocolate; 1/2 cup milk; 2 cups sugar; 1 tablespoon light corn syrup; dash of salt; 2 tablespoons butter or margarine; 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Add chocolate to milk and place over low heat. Cook until mixture is smooth and blended, stirring constantly. Add sugar, corn syrup and salt, and stir until sugar is dissolved and mixture boils. Continue boiling, without stirring, until a small amount of mixture forms a very soft ball in cold water (or to a temperature of 232° F.). Remove from heat. Add butter and vanilla. Cool to lukewarm (110° F.); then beat until mixture begins to thicken and loses its gloss. Turn at once into greased 8 x 4-inch pan. When cold, cut into squares. Makes 18 large pieces.

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
