Flows From Strawn

A signicicant Strawn sand discovery has been completed in north-

east Sterling County.

Discovery well is W. M. & A. P. Fuller, Midland, No. 1 W. R. Davis, in 73-2-H&TC, 15 miles northeast of Sterling City and two miles west of the Fuller-Coke, South field.

The strike indicates that the same Strawn formation from which the vast Jameson and Fuller-Coke fields produce, making 5,885,951 barrels of oil in 1954, penetrates far into Sterling County.

Flows 353 Barrels Daily

The well was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 353 barrels of 41 gravity oil plus 4.1 barrels of basic sediment, no water. Gas-oil ratio was 322-1.

Production was through a 1/4-inch choke and perforations between 6,-874-6,950 feet in 5-inch casing cemented at 7,000 feet, the total depth. Top of pay was picked at 6,374 feet on elevation of 2,308 feet. Pay section was fractured with 21,-000 gallons.

Tubing pressure was 650-625 pounds, with packer on casing.

Operator has requested discovery allowable and suggested that the field be designated as the Fuller-Sterling field.



The Lawsons came here from Eldorado where Harry was with the SCS. A graduate of Texas A&M, he had been with the SCS since graduating.


