Atlanta, Ga., March 30, Mr. Aaron Clark of Sterling City, Texas, today was officially certified by Dr. E. C. Scott, Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. as a commissioner to the General Assembly of the denomination. The Assembly, which Mr. Clark

will attend as an official voting representative of Mid-Texas Presbytery, will be held in Richmond, Va., June 2-7. It is the highest court of the Presbyterian Church, and meets annually. Some 460 commissioners from 17 states attend and review the work of the Church for the past year, and set in motion the program for the coming year.

County Agent's Column

There has been several trial areas pitted by some of our local ranchmen the past year. Results of some tests run in Presidio County show moisture penetration following a .50 inch rain to be the following:

Bare land next to pits 0 to 1.75 in.
Between Pits 2 to 4.50 in.
In Pits 5 to 12.0 in.
In Good Grass Cover Over 18 in.

This information tends to indicate that a native grass cover is the ideal, but pitting when properly carried on has a definite place in a ranch improvement program.

Bluetongue vaccine is widely available this spring. It will be used on a broader scale this year than at any other time to immunize sheep from what has generally been known as Range Stiffness. There is still some scepticism as to its value, because this vaccine may not give all sheep complete protection from Bluetongue. The reason for this is because there are several different strains of the Bluetongue virus in this area. The cost of the vaccine is not too high, and it might well be worth using. We will not know its value until we try it.

Recommendations for watering roses calls for a 2-inch mulch around the plant and weekly waterings. Soak the soil to a depth of about 6 inches using a soaker hose if one is available. The mulch can be made of peat moss, sawdust, cottonseed hulls, etc. A regular spraying or dusting program should be followed. Formulas for either an all-purpose spray or dust can be obtained from the

county agent's office.
Tony Allen, a local 4-H Club member, is now a Registered Rambouillet sheep breeder. He recently became the owner of two registered ewes with ewe lambs. The lambs will probably be exhibited next spring at our county show and possibly the San Angelo show. Others who have registered Rambouillots are David, Bitsy and Drew Durham and Bill Davis. All of these have a nice little bunch started.
