#### IS THE CATTLE RUN STARTING EARLY?

**FORT WORTH**—More than 7,000 cattle and calves, a big part of them grass cows and calves, arrived at Fort Worth Monday. This was more than 2,100 above the figure the same date last year, and gave additional strength to the theory that the cattle run is starting early this year.

Suspicion that this would be the case developed some weeks ago and has been growing steadily. A number of factors are involved. In many sections of the Eastern third of Texas the winter and spring season has provided ample pasture. This is especially true in the clover growing areas.

Many cattle producers in these areas bought low cost cows last summer and fall, and at this writing have a very good profit made in them. Many cases of "doubled money" are heard, and these stockmen are inclined to sell before the hot weather brings excessive runs and breaks prices sharply. They

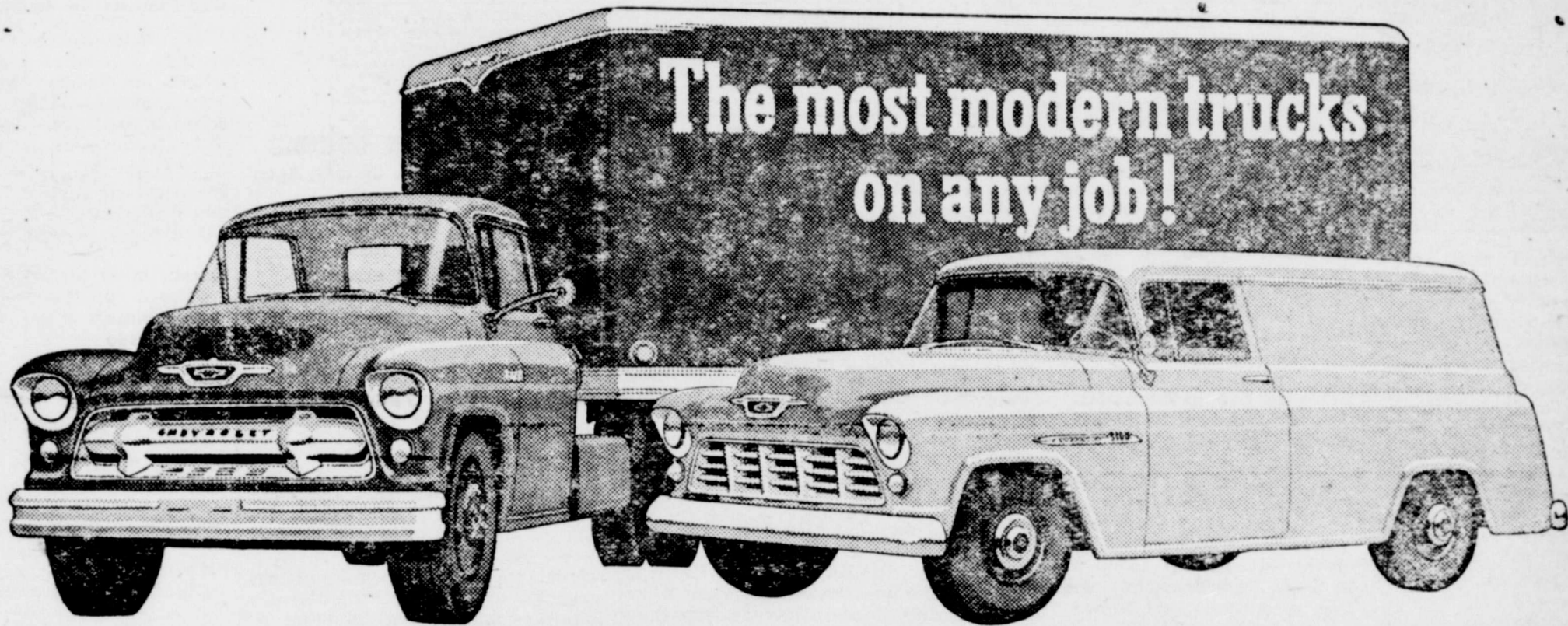

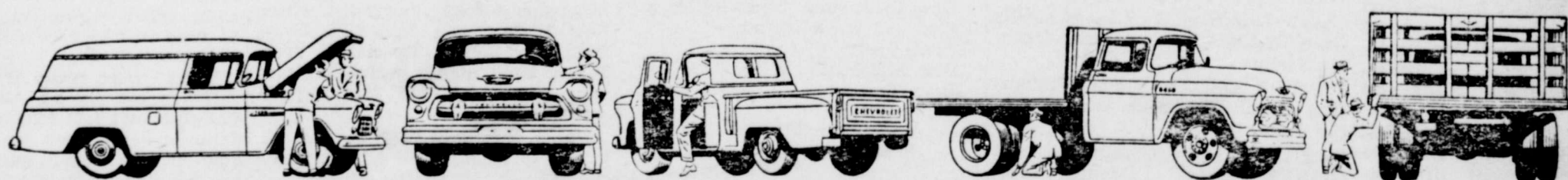

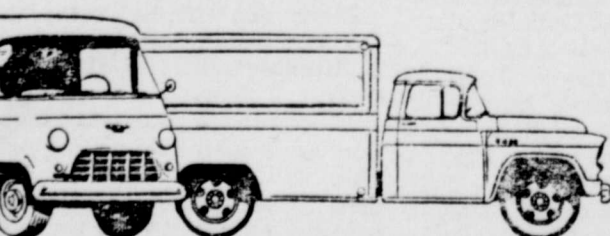

are inclined to cash in now, despite that fact that in many sections they still have some weeks of good grazing on these clover fields.

In the drouthy areas the discouraging lack of needed rain, plus the disheartening dust storms, is expected to cause earlier-than-usual shipping. Many of these areas face critical water shortages, as well as pasture deficiency.

Early movement of cattle has its good points, as well as bad ones. It will give pastures a rest. Cows will hold up better and require less feeding where calves are taken off early. Light weight calves and yearlings are more popular right now with stocker buyers in the North—good examples are the around 280-pound calves last week that sold at Fort Worth at \$24, and on Monday Hayden Hargess, Coleman County, put a load of steer calves weighing 401 pounds in the bank at \$23.50, and their heifer mates sold for slaughter at \$21 and \$20.

The earlier than normal run of lambs this year lend strength to the feeling that this will be an early one for cattle—unless the month of May comes up very, very

**GRASSY CATTLE AND CALVES WEAKEN**

Trade in cattle and calves was rather slow in the opening session at Fort Worth Monday. Cows held about steady, and bulls were steady. High grade slaughter and stocker calves of choice grades were also steady, but grades below choice were weak to 50 cents lower. Fed steers and yearlings were weak to 50 cents lower. Good and choice fed steers and yearlings \$19.00 - \$23.00; fat cows \$11.00 - \$14.00; canners and cutters \$7.00 - \$11.00. Bulls \$10.00 - \$14.50. Good and choice fat calves \$18.00 - \$21.50; few fancy heavyweights \$22.00. Stocker steer calves \$23.50 down, and heifers mostly \$18.50 down. Stocker cows \$8.00 - \$12.00. 18,000 SHEEP ON YARDS HERE MONDAY

The sheep and lambs offering Monday was 6,000 larger than last week, and 2,000 ahead of the same date last year. The 18,000 head about 40 per cent spring lambs and 60 per cent old crop shorn lambs. Trade was 50 cents lower on the opening rounds, and after shippers and order buyers had filled their needs average prices closed 50 cents to \$1 off. Fat spring lambs drew \$18.00 to \$21.50; and fat shorn old crop lambs drew \$16.00 to \$18.50. Old ewes \$5 to

\$5.50, and old bucks around \$4. Aged wethers \$7 to \$10. Stocker spring lambs \$15 down, and shorn feeder lambs \$12.50 to \$13.50.

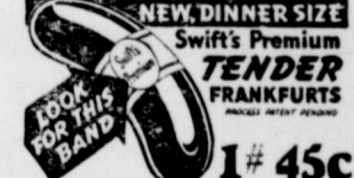

### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Already Washington prepares for great debate late this summer when United Nations will be brought before Congress. Occasion will be appropriation request for U. S. share in maintaining U. N.

Senator William Knowland (R., Calif.) is expected to spearhead attack. It is not hard to imagine what "one worlders" and other global schemers will say about Sen. Knowland.



Yet fact remains despite American hopes, aspirations and good faith that attended birth of U. N. in San Francisco, organization has been a failure in solving world problems.

Sen. Knowland is already on record opposing continuation of forum in New York for Russians to blast U. S. at every occasion.

As evidenced by President's remarks on wartime meeting with Marshall Zhukov it appears obvious Russian mind is incapable of understanding any strong nation permitting such vehement attacks to be made on itself within its own boundaries.

In addition, many authorities maintain UN is downright dangerous to U. S. safety inasmuch as Congress has failed to pass Bricker amendment, or similar legislation to safeguard U. S. citizens from loss of their constitutional rights through UN actions which would supersede all U. S. federal and local laws.

During UN's ten years existence, American taxpayers have poured millions into organization, not counting billions of dol-

lars and thousands of lives thrown into United Nations "police action" in Korea.

Many Washington observers feel concept of UN is inferior to that of old League of Nations. In League, weapon of economic sanctions to preserve peace was recognized even though not invoked due to timidity.

However, it is felt use of economic blockades today with Red China needing food, with Russians facing starvation, would do much to bring about honorable world peace. However, too many nations of free world whose industrial capacity was built up by U. S. foreign aid grants are too eager to trade with the communists to expect use of this bloodless weapon.

Thus ten years of UN have failed to make any great accomplishments, and cost to U. S. has been heavy.

Leaving aside wisdom of permitting persons from all the world to enter U. S. with special immunities as UN personnel, the great steel and glass birdcage on the East River has been hatching on U. S. soil many ideas foreign to American way of life.

It is significant that one of major accomplishments of UN has been setting up of a cooperative store for its employees. Thus socialistic methods of business have been created on free American soil under banner of UN.

Undoubtedly, as freely predicted in Washington, when Sen. Knowland launches his attack on the UN, some will try to make it appear he is also capable of assailing Mother's Day.

However, despite emotional appeal of world peace, it will be a time to analyze debate from viewpoint of cold business logic.
