## Good Rains General Over West Texas

General rains fell over West Texas the first part of this week, raising hopes of ranchers and farmers for possibly a normal year of rainfall.

Here in Sterling County the rains ranged up to three inches. E. L. Bailey, south of town, said he got three inches in the Monday-Tuesday-Wednesday rains. Here in town the rain was 1.75. To the north and west two or more inches covered the drouth-stricken ranges. Falling slow for the most part, the rains soaked in, doing a lot of good. The North Concho River got on a rise, sending water down to the new North Concho Lake just above San Angelo. The rains came mostly from the watershed above here to the west.

Hopes are up for a normal year. However, last spring, the rains were very promising, but quit just before hot weather, leaving nothing for grazing. Feeding will be helped in that some sheep feed will come up from these rains, but not too much cow feed.

Many years have come and gone all being below normal, and each rain is greeted with fond hopes, wide grins, and optimism. Hope springs eternal!

## Postmaster Examinations For Sterling City

An examination for Postmaster at Sterling City, Texas, \$4770 a year, will be open for receipt of applications until May 31, 1955, the Commission announced today.

The Commission is taking all possible steps through special publicity to civic and other community organizations to encourage well qualified persons to apply for the examination.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least two years experience showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Competitors must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would command the respect and confidence of patrons of the post office.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability, and character. There is a 1-year residence requirement and applicants must be at least 25 years of age and must not have passed their sixty-third birthday.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. and must be received or post-marked not later than the closing date.

## One Case of Polio Here

The polio season has begun. One case from Sterling City was diagnosed as polio on Monday of this week. Little Junaita Munoz, daughter of Antonio Munoz, was stricken Monday afternoon. Dr. Swann had gone to San Angelo to attend the medical society meeting and the baby was carried to the Malone-Hogan Hospital in Big Spring.

Juanita is three years old. Swann, local health officer, said the Tom Green Eight-County Medical Society adopted rules on the vaccination of children with the Salk vaccine. He said that the children ages 6-9 inclusive would get the first. Next would come the group ages 3-13 inclusive. Then, any age can get it when these are vaccinated. The ages in the order named are the ages most likely to be hit with polio, he said.

No actual date has been set for the second shots for the first and second graders. But as soon as it arrives, the shots will be given.

Hal Knight gave a barbecue at the Knight ranch last Friday evening. Four hundred persons attended the affair.

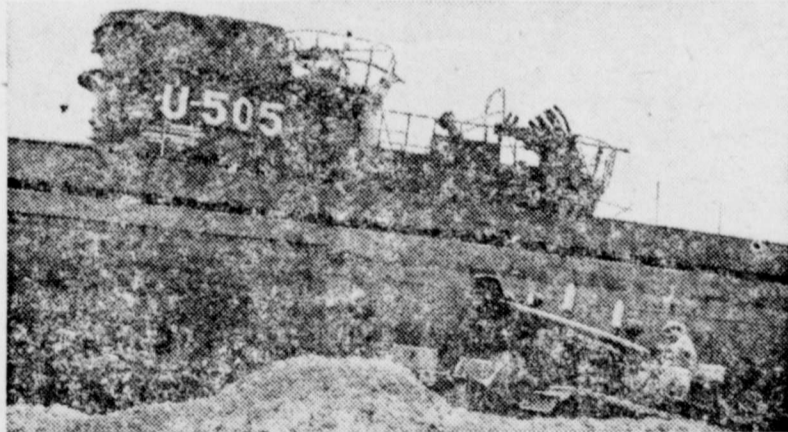
Barbecued beef, beans, onions, pickles bread and drinks were served to the local people, the oil fraternity and other guests by the host.

## Last Cruise for a Captured Sub



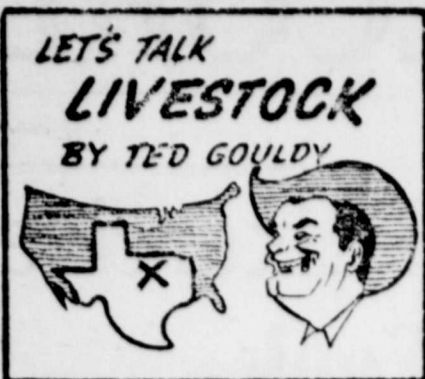
In one of the most heroic naval engagements of World War II, officers and men of Rear Admiral Dan Gallery's Task Force 22.3 boarded and captured Nazi submarine U-505. Fast action saved sub as it was about to sink. (Inset) Towed to Chicago from Portsmouth, N. H. Navy yards, sub was placed in floating drydock and beached at 57th Street and the Outer Drive in Chicago. Sub was rolled off to tracks on this temporary pier. Tracks extended from pier end to Outer Drive.



When breakers threatened to wash away cribbing supporting beached sub, International TD-24 crawler tractor was brought in, bladed sand into nine-foot-high protective dike.



Jacked up four and one-half feet above beach pier, sub was then rolled across Outer Drive to permanent exhibition site at the east wing of Chicago's Museum of Science and Industry. **CATTLE PRICES SKID**  
 Fort Worth—Last Monday the nation's 12 major markets reported close to 125,000 cattle and calves. This was about 20,000 more than a year ago the same date, and 10,000 ahead of a week earlier. It was the signal for renewed pressure on prices across the nation.

Chicago reported cattle 50 cents to \$1.50 lower. Kansas chalked up up losses of 50 cents to \$1 per hundred. It was the same story at all points. Here at Fort Worth grainfed cattle were scarce and pretty close to steady, but the rank and file cattle and calves averaged 50 cents to \$1 lower, some spots more and some spots less.

In livestock circles this happens every year, usually in June. How ever, the season governs the "June Break". An early season such as this one sees the break in cattle prices come early, and in a "late" season, sometimes the break comes in July or later.

Usually the "June Break" comes soon after the first interval of

high temperature and burning summer winds, which sear pastures.

Topsy fed cattle sold at Fort Worth at \$23.50, two loads at the latter figure from M. L. Smith, Jack County, averaged about 950 lbs. Another top feeder, I. S. Scott, Castro County, sold fed steers at \$23 and their heifer mates at \$22. Some other well fitted cattle at \$22 and \$23 on the yards were fully steady. But, otherwise cattle and calves all lost ground, whether sold as slaughter or stocker kinds.

Cows \$6.00-\$13.00; bulls \$9.00 to \$13.50; slaughter calves \$9.00-21.00; stocker calves and yearlings \$13.00-21.00; heifer mates \$3 to \$5 under stocker steers.

**WORLD CATTLE NUMBERS AGAIN SHOW INCREASE**

Virtually all important cattle producing countries of the world show increases in the past year in their cattle population. Latest report covering end of 1954 estimates world cattle number at 877,000,000, this is ten million above the 1953 total.

In the U. S. the increase last year was about one per cent. In the face of the current big supplies of feed grains in storage in the U. S., ample production of meat, poultry, milk, and eggs and other farm produce in which feed or proteins figure-should remain at high levels for a year or longer.

Current feed grain index is ten points behind a year ago this date, oil seed meal prices are better than 50 points under a year ago.

**SHEEP PRICES DIP**  
 Prices of spring lambs were

weak to 50 cents lower, some spots \$1 off at Fort Worth Monday. Shorn old crop lambs closed mostly 50 cents to \$1 off. Many spring lambs are definitely shrinking and showing loss of bloom now. Top milk fat lambs \$20 to \$21, fat shorn old crop lambs topped at \$15 to \$15.25. Old ewes \$3 to \$4. Feeder old crop mixed feeder and fat lambs sold at \$13.50 down; and feeder spring lambs sold around \$14 to \$16, with packers still paying more than feeders on most of these kinds.

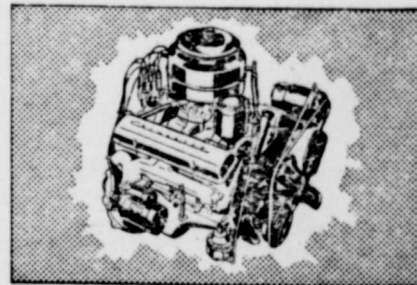

Take A Light Bow

If you want to have your cake—but not feel it—much! try a downy sponge cake with a "baked-in pineapple flavor." It's especially appropriate as a light finale to a heavy Sunday dinner... the kind that's traditional to us all for special occasions.

Pineapple Sponge Cake

2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour; 4 eggs; ¼ teaspoon salt; 1½ cups sugar; 1 cup hot pineapple juice, or syrup drained from canned pineapple; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Sift flour once, measure, and sift again. Beat eggs and salt together until very thick and light colored—about 5 to 7 minutes. Then add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add 1½ cups of the flour, alternately with the hot pineapple juice, beating well after each addition. Combine remaining flour and baking powder and sift over batter; beat thoroughly. Add vanilla; blend.

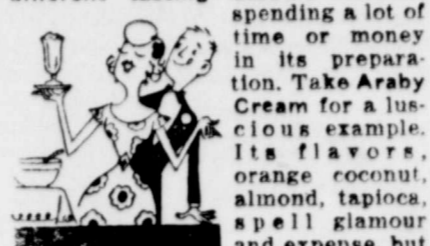
Turn batter into ungreased 9-inch tube pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 40 minutes, or until done. Remove from oven, invert pan, and let stand 1 hour, or until cake is cool.

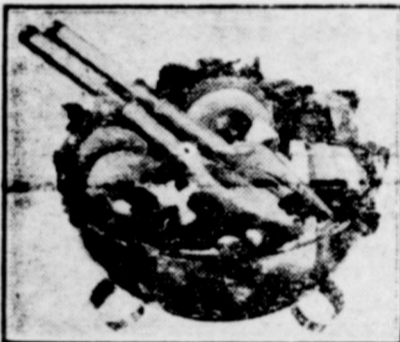

**Dressings For Salads**



By JANE ASHLEY

Spring and summer brings us a wide variety of fresh fruit to use in attractive salad combinations. And here are two excellent dressing recipes to serve with your fruit salads.

**Celery Seed Dressing**

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 1/2 cup Karo Syrup, Red Label
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1 cup salad oil
- 1 tablespoon grated onion

Place all ingredients in a small bowl. Beat with rotary beater until well blended and thickened. Place in covered container. Chill several hours. Shake before serving. Makes about 1 1/4 cups.

**Banana Cream Dressing**

- 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 bananas, sliced

Add corn syrup gradually to whipped cream, stirring gently until well blended. Just before serving, sprinkle lemon juice over sliced bananas. Fold into whipped cream, corn syrup mixture. Serve as a salad dressing for fruit gelatin or fresh fruit salads. Makes about 3 cups.

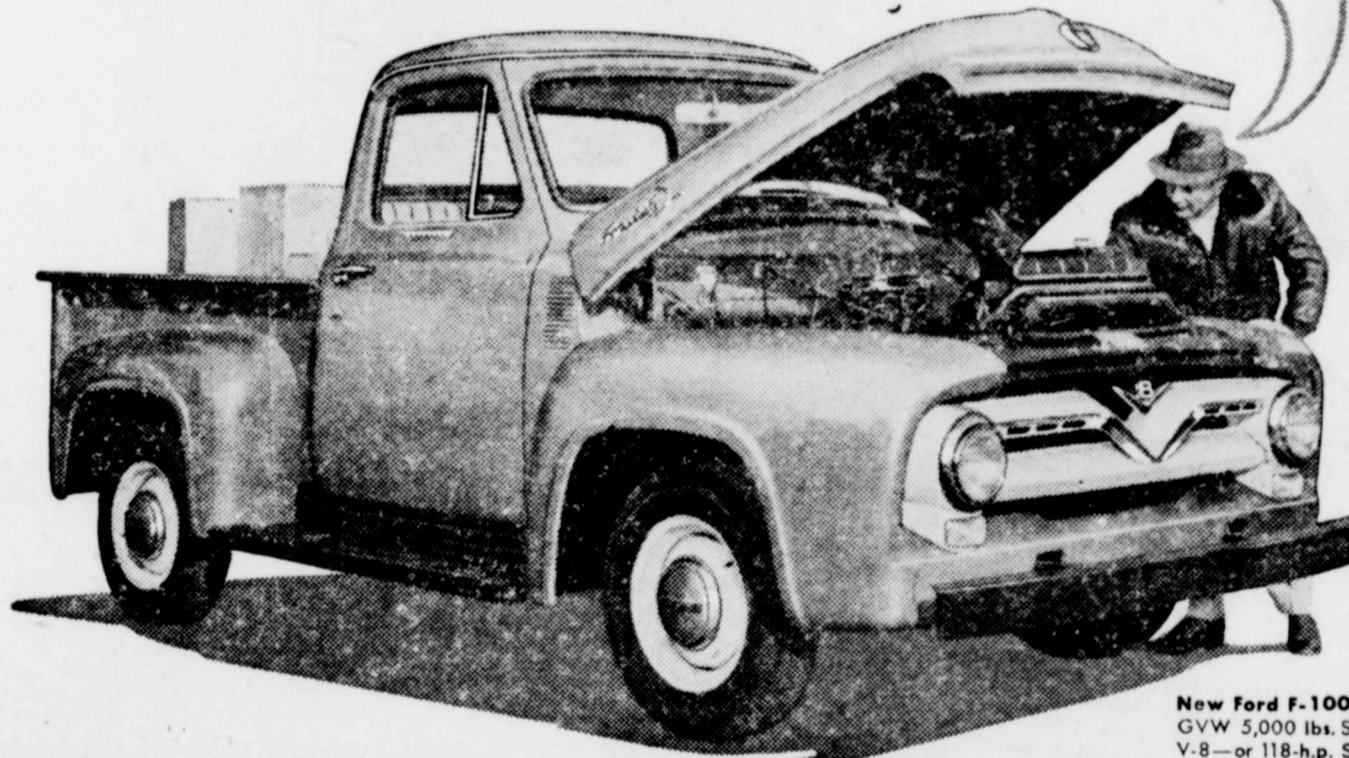

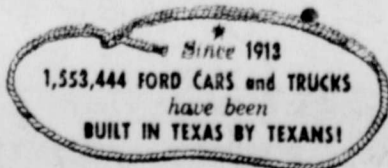

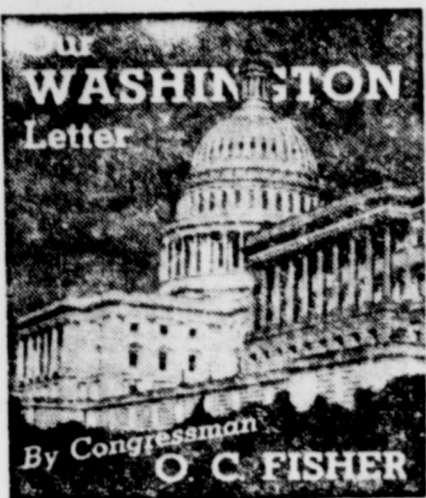

**WASHINGTON Letter**  
By Congressman O. C. FISHER

THE QUESTION of Statehood for Hawaii and Alaska tops the agenda in Congress this week, and is due to be acted upon in the House before this letter is printed. I shall vote against the admission of these two territories.

Hawaii, with a half million people, including military, is an archipelago composed of a dozen volcanic islands, roughly 2,000 miles from our west coast. Sugar cane and pineapples are their mainstays, with the economy being supported heavily by the military and American tourists. Harry Bridges, second ranking U. S. communist, is a power in politics since his union controls all agricultural labor and all shipping. That gives him a strangle-hold over the Territory's economy.

In the case of Alaska, a better case for Statehood is made because of its proximity to the States. But Alaska is still largely an undeveloped country. Fewer than 100,000 people live there, including Eskimos. They do well to muster 20,000 votes at election time. Imagine giving 20,000 people the

power to elect TWO UNITED STATES SENATORS, and give them the same influence in guiding the destiny of this Nation as Texas with 8 million!

To admit these two territories at present would create a dangerous precedent and would invite the admission of Puerto Rico and perhaps the Virgin Islands and Guam. The time is not ripe for this kind of business. There's yet plenty of time to make these momentous decisions.

ANOTHER FIGHT on public housing is shaping up in Congress. Under that program the Government builds projects and then rents them to people at very low or nominal rentals. In 1953, upon the insistence of the House, socialized housing was killed. But last year it popped up again, and the House yielded to Senate pressure and allowed another 35,000. BUT, provided such could be built only where they replaced slums. Since comparatively few of the public housing projects have anything to do with slums, fewer than 10,000 units out of that 35,000 have met that test.

Now the public housers want to take off the restrictions and get Uncle Sam into the landlord business on an even bigger scale. It will be hard to sell the House on this reversal of policy. Most Texans can be depended upon to vote against it. The last test on socialized housing showed only three Texas Congressmen voting for it. That test came on an amendment I offered to discontinue the program.

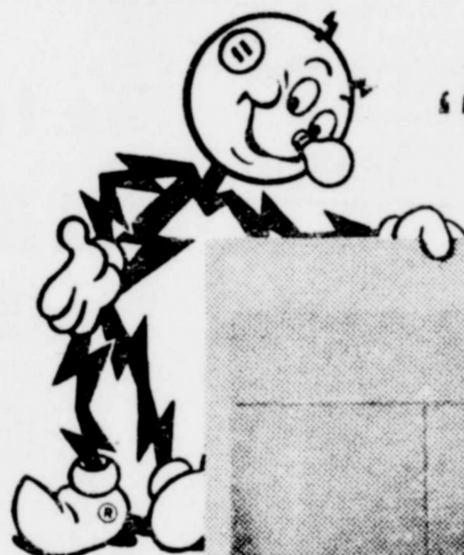

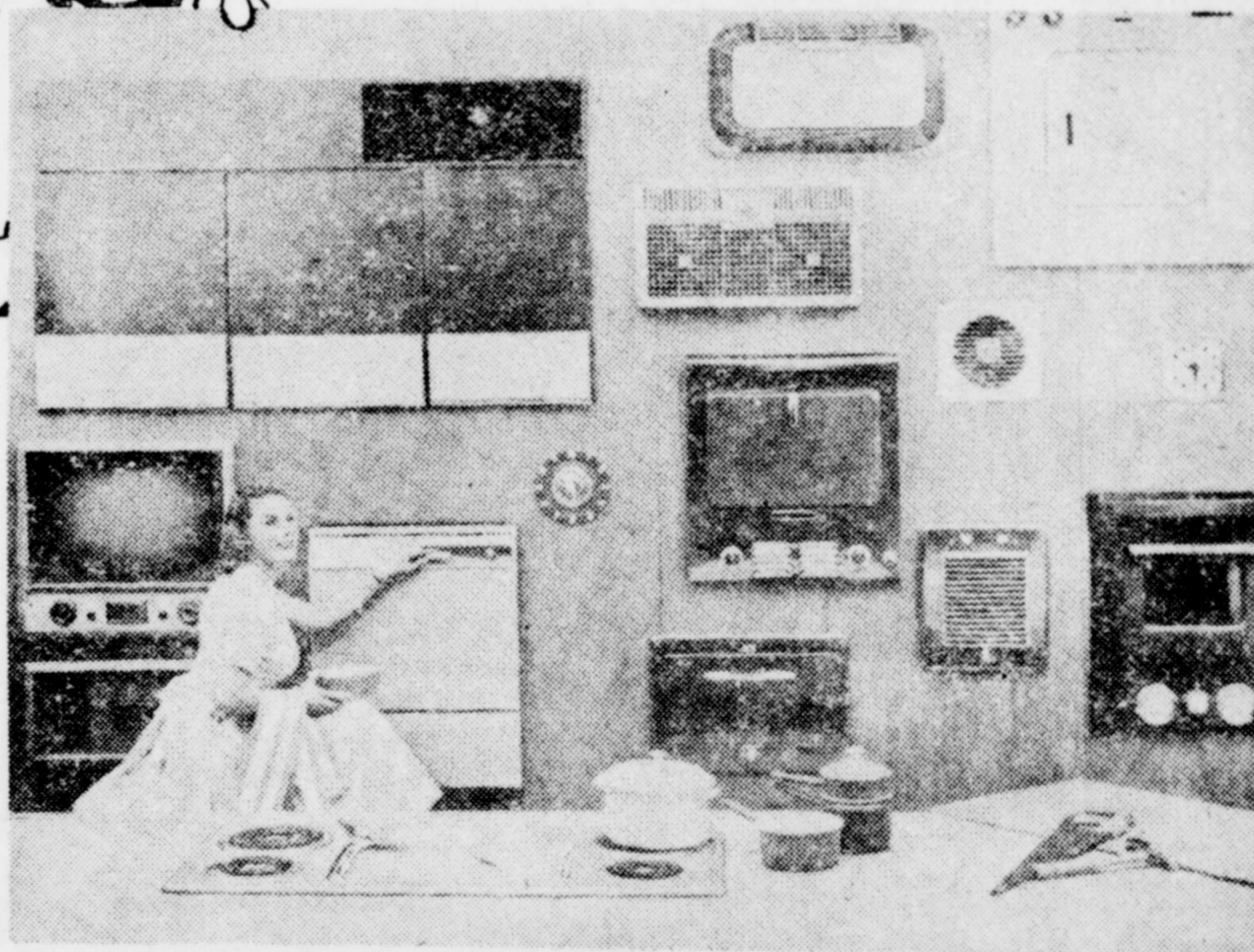
