OUR WASHINGTON Letter



WITHIN A SHORT TIME the Salk polio vaccine will be just as effective as other vaccines, according to Dr. Leonard A. Scheele, Surgeon General of the U. S. Public Health Service.

This well-known authority spoke to the Texas delegation at the weekly luncheon at the Capitol last week and described in some detail the laboratory processes now taking place by scientists to perfect the new discovery, at least as nearly as it is possible to do.

Dr. Scheele pointed out that the post-vaccination cases have totaled 12 out of nearly six million vaccinations administered. He blamed the vaccine-caused-cases on inadequate mixing of the material or on other unknown factors which, he thinks, can be eliminated or reduced to a minimum.

The Doctor emphasized that those who have received one shot of the vaccine will have strong resistance to the disease for some time even though the second and third shots may be delayed for a while.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE has announced that mohair production is making a come-back after declining 45 per cent between 1945 and 1952. Last year growers clipped 13.7 million pounds, which was 1.1 million over 1953--or a 9 per cent increase. Total goat population: 2.5 million, from which 96 per cent of the mohair is produced in Texas.

"With about 8 per cent more goats in Texas early this year than at the beginning of 1954", the report concludes, "some further increase in mohair production appears likely."

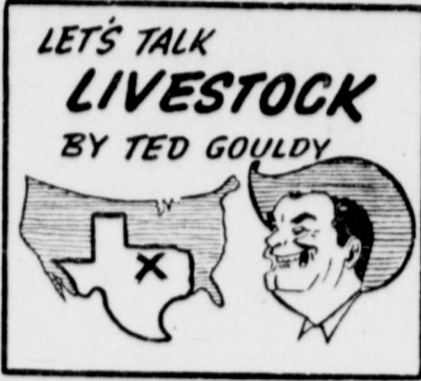
A new softball schedule has been drawn up which includes a team from Water Valley. This new schedule supersedes the old one we ran in last week's paper.

U. S. NOT ALONE IN EATING BETTER!

While the domestic production of meat is at high levels and the per capita consumption in the United States reaching all time highs, it is interesting to note this situation prevails in most of the world.

Figures just released by the USDA indicate that last year (1954) meat production of the world was three percent greater than the record year 1953. Forty-two countries produced an estimated 83 BILLION pounds. This is believed to represent 93 percent of the total world output.

MEAT-TYPE LAMB?

This year at Fort Worth the medium to good lambs have been selling at prices very near the extreme top for fancy choice kinds. In fact, feeder buyers have been getting fewer of these just "meaty" lambs than ever before, because packers have been so eager for them.

We have been hearing a lot about "meat-type hogs" but it looks like the country is going for meat-type lambs in a big way, too!

Many half-fat lambs selling in the \$19 to \$21 bracket at Fort Worth Monday look a full two grades below the choice \$22 and \$23 kinds. Shorn old crop lambs Monday sold up to \$18, the highest since around Easter for the class. The trade credits cool weather in many parts of the country, and a late start on the Southeastern states lamb crop for the good market at Fort Worth.

Monday Spring lambs were 50 cents to \$1 higher and old crop 50 cents to \$1.50 higher. Other sheep steady, breeding ewes in very active demand in view of the improved pasture outlook.

CATTLE STEADY; IN LINE WITH PRICES YEAR AGO

Cattle prices at Fort Worth Monday were almost identical with those in effect a year ago at this time. Fed steers and yearlings are about \$2 per hundred lower than a year ago, but cows, bulls, slaughter calves and stockers are all selling just about like last year at the same time.

So we can quote you prices for this year and last at these levels, with the above mentioned exception.

Prices Monday: Good and choice grainfed steers and yearlings \$19-\$22.50; common and medium grassers \$12 - \$18. Stocker steer yearlings \$21 down. Fat cows \$11-\$14; canners and cutters \$7.00-\$11.00. Stocker cows \$7.00-\$12.50. Bulls \$10.00-\$14.00. Good and choice fat calves \$16.00-\$20.50, few higher. Lower grade calves \$10.00-\$15.00. Stocker calves \$23.00 down.

FEEDER CALF SALES DATES ARE SET

The Texas Hereford Association will stage a feeder calf show and sale on the Fort Worth Stockyards June 30. Henry Elder, secretary, announced the showing will include lots of 10 and 20 head, and also classes of above and below 500 pounds.

The Hereford Association will also choose a Fall date for a similar show and sale. These public market sales give the cowman with a small or intermediate sized herd a chance to show his calf crop under more favorable conditions. ANGUS ASS'N. SETS TWO SHOW-SALE DATES

Glen Tole, secretary of the Texas Aberdeen-Angus Association has announced feeder calf shows and sales for July 8th and September 9th at Fort Worth.

Commercial Angus breeders decided they needed two dates so that calves off early country will have a favorable sale time.

Last Fall the highly successful Angus feeder calf sale at Fort Worth launched these special Feeder Days at the market. Calves sold to much better advantage than they normally would have and many lots were \$1 to \$2 above current market prices.

County Agent's Column

One rancher from Jack County uses 2, 4, 5-T mixed with Deisel oil to control prickly pear. He carries a spray can with him as he works over his ranch and as he has time, he works on the pear.

His mixture is 2-3 cup of 2, 4, 5-T in two gallons of Deisel oil. This is sprayed on the pear and if it is properly applied, it will control 90 percent of the pear. I understand some ranchmen use cake coloring in the deisel oil so they can tell where they have sprayed.

Along this same thought, Garlyn Hoffman, former Sterling County Agent, and now Extension Service Range Specialist at A&M will be out here in July to put on a demonstration showing the use of 2, 4, 5-T and Deisel oil on mesquite using the basal spray and stump method. We will have more in this column about this later when we find out about the dates, etc. Garlyn said he would put out some of the new CMU pellets or powder if it is available. CMU is a new chemical they are trying on mesquite for control.

Bobby Dunn was awarded his trophy last week by the Purina Company for having the Champion Finewool Lamb at the County Show. It was presented for the company by their local representative, Boots Williams.

Already this year the disease known as Curly Top of Tomatoes has made its ugly appearance. This disease attacks plants at this time of the year, first by causing the leaves on one part of the plant to curl up and slowly turn yellow. Usually there will be warts on the basal part of the plant. In time, usually 5-10 days the plant will die. There is apparently no treatment for the disease after the plant becomes affected. Horticulturists at Texas A&M say to treat the remaining plants with 5 percent DDT dust making weekly applications after the disease appears. Curly Top is caused by a virus disease which is transmitted by an insect called the Beet Leafhopper. The only control is to control the insect. That is where the DDT comes in.

There has been quite a lot of this appearing in this area the past two years. Some of the same disease was observed the other day, so more of it for this year is probably in prospect.

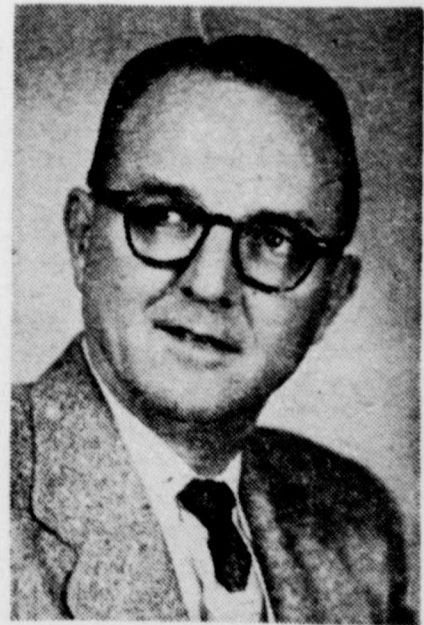

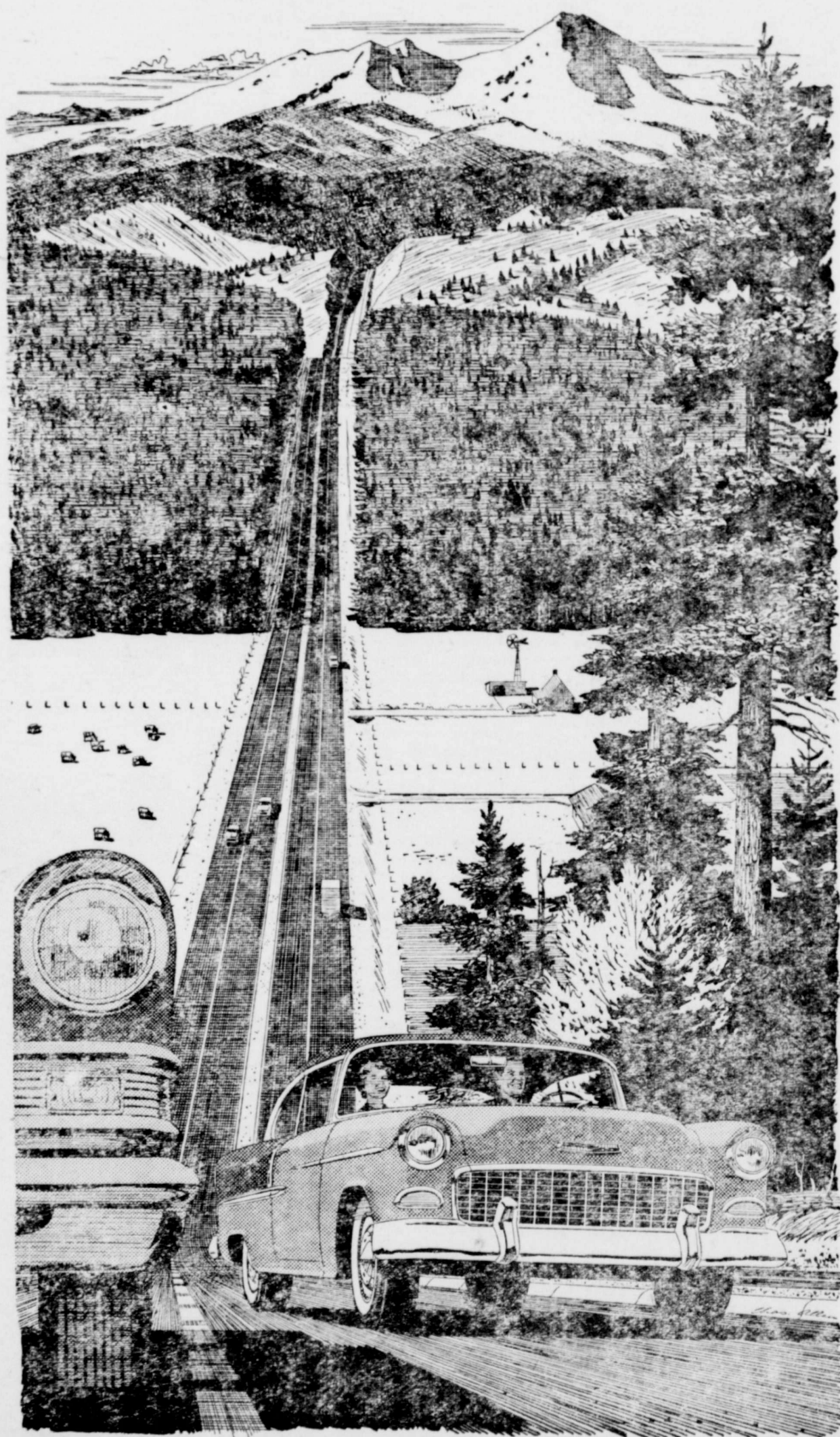

Fill tub or washer with warm water, add a half cup of the new laundry bead-bling (the one with nylon brightener) and a good soap or syndet, plus a water conditioner (according to the manufacturer's directions).

Since corduroy tends to pick up lint, and since colors also tend to run—wash colors separately from whites. If washing by machine, run machine 5 minutes; rinse thoroughly, spinning about 3 minutes. Squeeze gently by hand, or put through loosely adjusted wringer. Remember that twisting corduroy makes unnecessary creases!

Washbowl Washing: Identical, except that gentle scrubbing will be necessary.

Drier Drying: Dry corduroy at high heat, but remove while still slightly damp to prevent creasing. Place on hanger and smooth out—especially at seams. Drier action brings up nap nicely. Ironing is usually unnecessary, but if you prefer to touch up garment, then place nap-side down on a Turkish towel and iron from wrong side. A steam iron does especially well for this type of pressing.

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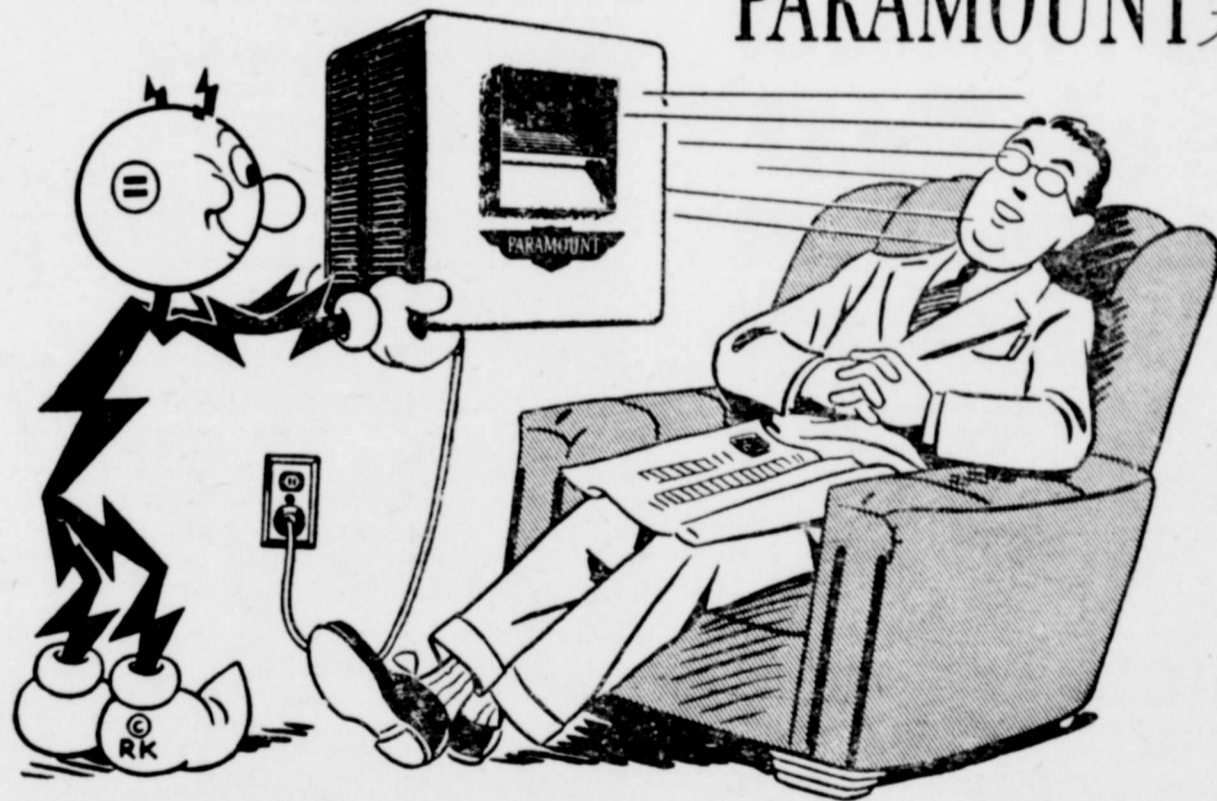
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
