## Sterling Oil Field Gets Fifth Well

The Jameson West (Strawn) field of Sterling County has gained its fifth producer and a one location west extension with the completion of W. M. & A. P. Fuller No. 3 W. R. Davis, in 73-2-H&TC, 17 miles northeast of Sterling City.

It was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 192.20 barrels of 42 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio 755-1.

Production was through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,921-7,010 feet in 5½-inch casing set at 7,058 feet, the total depth. The pay section was treated with 20,000 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 6,921 feet on ground elevation of 2,289 feet.

Tubing pressure was 600-625 pounds; casing pressure, zero.

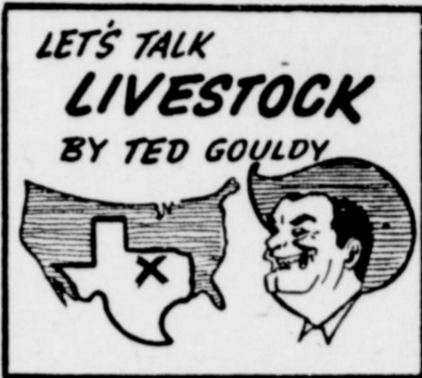
## Paving Through Town Progressing

The paving of Highway 87 through town is progressing. The job has been going on for several weeks, and the end is in sight. The state is paving the highway from curb to curb all through the town proper. The old road bed was plowed up and re-done. Cement was worked into the base and a three inch topping of hot mix is completing the job. Two coats will be required to finish.

Drainage through town was improved with new grades. Under supervision of the State Highway Department engineers and the contract for the work being handled by Cage Bros., the job is being done according to the latest specifications of the department.

The highway from Sterling City to Carlsbad is almost complete. It has been under construction since last summer.

## COOL, COOL WEATHER HELPS LIVESTOCK PRICES

**Fort Worth**—The rains and cooler weather are helping parched and blasted Texas ranges recover and have put a firm prop under cattle prices in this part of the country. Abnormally cool weather in the Eastern United States has kept consumption of meat at high levels in that area.

So the cool, cool opening weeks of June have been doubly delightful for livestock folks.

## CATTLE PRICES OPEN STRONGLY AT COWTOWN

Usually on a mid-June Monday the market reporter is about as a professional pallbearer. It is the thing for us to use words like "weak", "dull demand", "prices sharply lower", and "sluggish".

However, Monday at Fort Worth cattle started moving to the scales and prices were fully steady. In fact, some cows were 25 to 50 cents higher. Stocker calves and yearlings of high quality were stronger, and very scarce. Slaughter calves were steady. Bulls drew fully steady prices.

Prices included: good or choice fed steers and yearlings \$19-22.50; medium and lower grade yearlings and heifers \$12-18. Fat cows \$11-14, a few higher; canners and cutters \$7-11.50. Bulls \$10-14.25. Good and choice slaughter calves \$16.50-20.50; cull, common and medium slaughter calves \$9-16. Stocker steer calves \$16-23; steer yearlings \$14-21; stocker cows \$8-13. Heifer calves and yearlings in stocker flesh usually sold \$2 to \$3 under comparable steers.

## WIDELY KNOWN CATTLEMAN BILL BONNER, TO JUDGE

First of four judges to be named for the Hereford feeder calf sale at Fort Worth June 30 is Bill Bonner of Gainesville. Bonner is known the length and breadth of the cattle country as a good judge of cattle and his selection fits in with the purpose of the show and sale sponsored by the Texas Hereford Association. That is to give good commercially produced feeder calves a chance to be shown together under favorable conditions where the small cowman will be able to take advantage of the large numbers present and offer his calves to big time buyers.

Henry Elder, secretary of the Hereford group, reported an inquiry from Arkansas from a buyer wanting 100 "good Texas calves", and at the same time another man reported he planned to have 100 calves in the sale. Things like that are what cause cattle trades!

## SPRING LAMBS WEAKEN; OTHER SHEEP STEADY

Spring lambs opened steady to 50 cents lower Monday at Fort Worth. Top was again \$22 on the best milk fat lambs, but the price was paid sparingly. Old crop yearling lambs were steady at \$16 down. Stocker shorn lambs sold from \$13-50 down, but straight bunches of yearling ewes again reached \$15 to \$16. Feeder type Spring lambs sold from \$15 down.

## Behind The 8 Ball

These high winds, dust-storms or young tornados (or whatever) are getting too frequent around here to suit me.

On May 25, a tornado or tornadoic winds caused a B-36 to fall killing 14 men, wrecking a 3½ million dollar plane, and a cost of maybe more millions to the Air Forces to families of the men, etc. The winds did not come right in to Sterling City, but they were close enough.

## Wind Does Damage

A windstorm, bringing clouds of dust, pelting rain and light hail, damaged property lightly at 8 p.m. Tuesday. TV antennas were hardest hit. Trees lost branches and some large trees were blown over. Roofs on houses suffered high wind damage.

Arriving in a DRIVING dust storm from the west, visibility was quickly reduced to zero. The high winds did their damage quickly. The dust turned to a driving rain and up to three fourths of an inch of rain fell in about 30 minutes.

The moisture did more good than the windstorm damage.

A plate glass window blew in at the Sterling Motor Company and a huge air conditioner tumbled from its high stand at the Baptist Church. Trees were uprooted and tree damage was worse just to the north and west of town. Nearly all trees have a permanent "lean" to them and will have for several days.

Some windmills were damaged; outbuildings suffered in some cases and shrubbery damage varied over the town. Winds must have been over a hundred miles an hour to have done the tree damage it did. On Wednesday of last week, the 70 to 80 mile winds did not do any damage to speak of to the trees. The damage could have been a lot worse, but it gives one an idea what the wind can do—even in a semi-playful mood.

### A Smart Supper Idea

MEAT left on your roast, to slice down cold? Ham left from the weekend picnic? **Coconut Broiled Bananas**  
 4 bananas; melted butter; salt; 1 cup shredded coconut, cut; 3 tablespoons orange juice; 1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind.  
 Peel bananas and split lengthwise in halves. Place cut side down in lightly greased shallow baking pan. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle lightly with salt. Place in broiler, about 4 inches from heat, and broil about 3 minutes, or until bananas are almost tender. Meanwhile, combine coconut, orange juice, and orange rind. Turn bananas and sprinkle with coconut mixture. Return to broiler for about 2 minutes longer, to brown coconut lightly. Serve hot as meat accompaniment. Makes 4 servings.

NATURAL GAS, housing, minimum wage, and postal pay figured in legislative news on Capitol Hill last week, as the Congress turned down the home stretch of a rather mild and docile session. It looks like the session will end about August 1, maybe a little later.

The House committee finally reported out a watered-down Natural Gas bill which outlaws Federal price control of gas before it is sold into interstate commerce. The bill seeks to correct a rather tortuous decision of the Supreme Court in the Phillips case. The bill will have tough sailing, though, and its ultimate enactment is in doubt.

The House and Senate passed a pay raise for postal workers, and the Senate struck a blow at home

ownership in this country by pushing through a socialized housing bill calling for Uncle Sam to build 540,000 units and then rent them at nominal rentals. This Senate move conforms with a demand by the Americans for Democratic Action and the CIO Political Action Committee. Public Housers are gushing over the Senate victory, seeing eventual possible victory for their dream for up to 10 million government-owned rent houses.

The Senate also figured on minimum wage, upping the present 75 cents per hour figure to \$1. The House committee has not yet acted. The CIO wants \$1.25. The other day Governor Harriman of New York had a conference with Congressmen from that state, following which the Governor reported: "It was the consensus that this minimum of \$1.25 was necessary to protect the state's industries from unfair wage competition in other states".

The trouble has been, in many areas, that during the past 10 years labor has virtually priced itself out of the market, causing industry to move south where they could obtain advantages not available to them up north. This included lower wages. Now, to off-set some of this, the unions are in a mammoth drive to push minimum wages upward, and the New York Governor very frankly admits the reason for it.

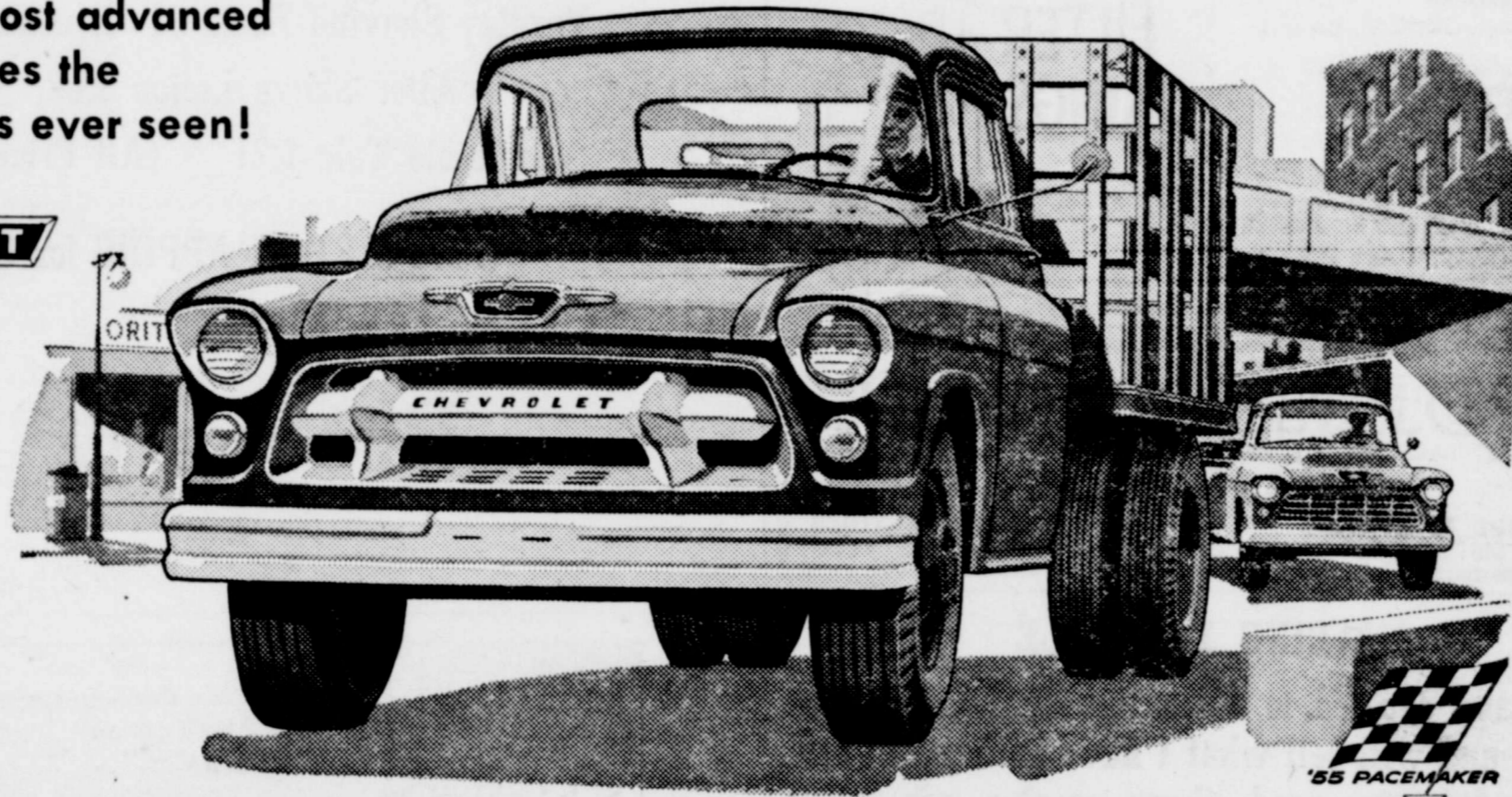

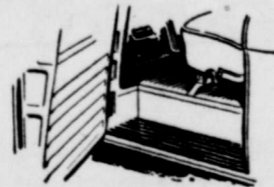

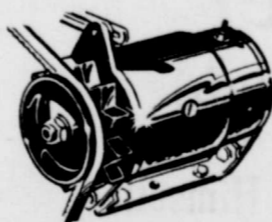
