## Our WASHINGTON Letter



THE HOUSE passed a Reserve Training bill and a foreign aid measure last week before recessing for the July 4th week-end. The reserve bill had been bogged down because of an amendment offered several weeks ago to the original bill. The amendment offered by the negro Congressman from Harlem, which would have forced desegregation of National Guard units, was tentatively adopted and that forced the bill to be pigeonholed. In the meantime the President appealed to the colored member not to persist in his move; but the latter, flushed with initial victory, said Eisenhower had bad advice and didn't know what he was talking about. The President had insisted that a civil rights amendment to the bill was "extraneous", and was the wrong time and place for that issue to be fought out. He said the move jeopardized national security.

Anyhow, the new attempt to wreck the National Guard, which except in time of national emergencies is under control of the respective Governors, failed when the Harlem member's new attempt was voted down this time by a two-to-one margin.

THE \$3½ BILLION FOREIGN AID bill also sailed through the House after lengthy debate. While I strongly favor some portions of the program, such as further military supplies for Pakistan, Turkey and others known to be in need and worthy of our help, I voted against the package bill because of a number of aid items which I felt was unjustified. For example, the \$70 million hand-out earmarked for India. And the aid to Yugoslavia, I feel, should be reexamined in view of Tito's lovey-dovey attitude toward the Kremlin of late. Should we send more jets to Tito until and unless we have more definite assurance of which side he is actually on? Maybe he will stand firm against capitulating to Moscow, but his recent behavior calls for an explanation and certain assurances that have not been forthcoming.

The late Amon G. Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and known variously as "Mr. Fort Worth" and "Mr. Texas", had many friends in Washington. We were grieved last week to learn of his death, and appropriate tributes were paid in both the House and Senate.

In the passing of Amon G. Carter, Texas and the nation have lost one of the most able and patriotic citizens of our generation. Amon G. Carter's patriotism and good citizenship began with his home town of Fort Worth. No man ever loved his city more. Few men have ever accomplished more for their city and its people than did Amon G. Carter.

I first knew Mr. Carter when I was a high school student in Fort Worth. He helped promote Boys' Week, during which Fort Worth boys were elected and served in every city and county office. My first view of public service was as Boys' Week city manager. Mr. Carter gave a banquet for us at the Fort Worth Club and encouraged us to take a keen interest in the processes of self-government. Later I served as a string reporter on his Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Through out the years he inspired boys and girls to love their city and led men and women to work for it.

### Independent Indian Tribes

The Alabama-Coushatta Indian tribes have been granted their independence from Federal supervision in accordance with legislation passed by Congress last year. All that remained was for Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay to issue his proclamation, and that terminated the supervision formerly exercised by the Bureau of Indian Affairs and transferred trusteeship of 3100 acres of lands belonging to the tribes.

For the first time since 1909, the bureau said, full independence from Federal supervision thus is being extended to an Indian tribal group. In that year, two Wisconsin tribes, the Stockbridge Munsee group, received fee patents for all their land holdings. Later they accepted the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934, which reinstated certain tribal relations with the Federal Government.

### Tribute to Texas Tribes

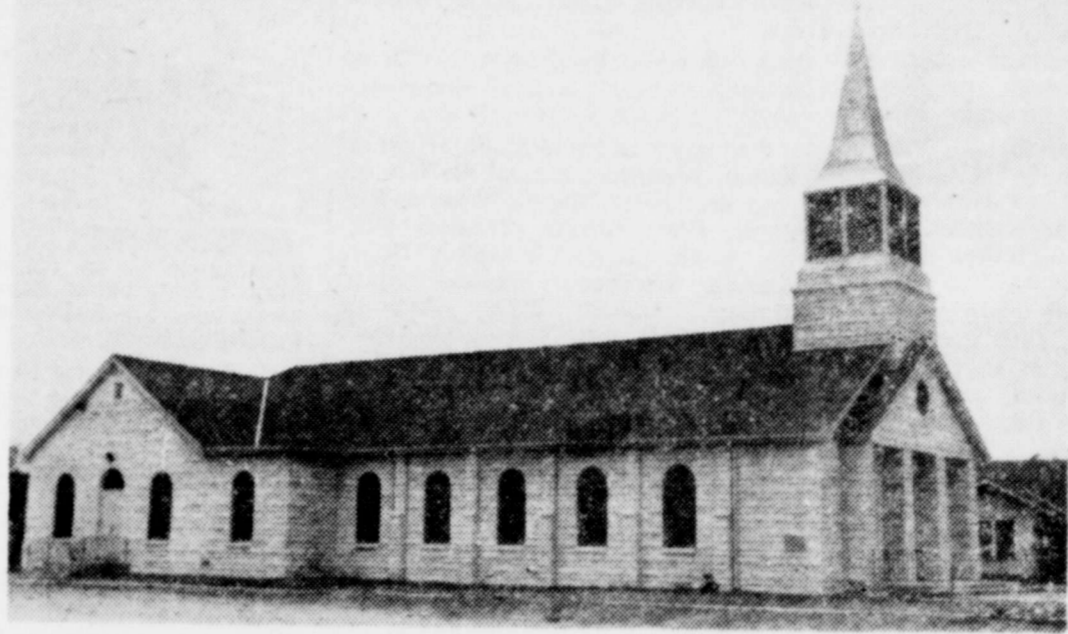
This decision by the Secretary of the Interior is something of which the Texas Indian tribes near Livingston can be proud. Such independence will be granted only to those tribes which have made progress along the road to self-sufficiency.

When Texas came into the United States, it bought 1,100 acres in Polk County and had it deeded to the Indians in perpetuity. The tribes still own this land. In the late 1920's, the United States bought about 3,100 acres adjacent to the Indian-owned land and took title in trust for the Indian group. A quitclaim deed to this Federal trust land accompanied the proclamation.

### Texas Bills

We had good fortune on two bills vital to Texas last week. First, the Senate passed the Texas City Disaster bill sponsored by Senator Johnson and myself in the Senate and Congressman Clark Thompson in the House. Then, on the same day, the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, of which I am a member, approved the Fullbright bill correcting the Phillips decision in the natural gas case by a vote of 11 to 4.

If enacted by Congress, this would exempt independent gas producers from utility rate price-fixing by the Federal Power Commission. It means much to Texas producers, to State tax revenues and conservation laws, and even more to gas consumers, who will receive a greater supply of natural gas at reasonable rates. We hope that the bill will be passed before Congress adjourns.

### County Agent's Column

Sheep raisers will soon have an opportunity to see whether or not advertising pays. According to the USDA, a referendum will be held between now and August 19th to decide whether or not sheep producers want to allocate funds to promote the sheep and wool industry. If the agreement passes, one cent per pound of shorn wool and five cents per hundredweight of lambs sold for slaughter will be withheld from the government incentive payment for the purposes of advertising and promoting in other means sheep and their products.

The funds will be handled by the American Sheep Producers Council which is a non-profit corporation set up to promote the industry. It will be charged with the handling of big business advertising and sales promotions.

The agreement will not be effective unless approved on a national basis by producers owning at least two-thirds of all sheep and lambs owned by voters in this referendum.

In a letter recently received from Garlyn Hoffman I learned he will be here on Friday, July 29, to put on a brush control demonstration.

Hoffman will demonstrate the use of hand equipment in controlling mesquite and other brush. This is a practical way, he believes, to use available labor during slack periods of the year.

The demonstration will be held on the new road being built south on I. W. Terry's ranch. It will be held just inside the fence in a place where the results can be easily seen from the new highway.

Hoffman will demonstrate the use of 2,4,5-T in Diesel oil, CMU powder and pellets. The chemicals will be applied with hand sprayers, soil injectors and an instrument known as the "bazooka." Terry is now treating some mesquite with kerosene in a nearby place, so the results can be seen with several treatments in a small place.

The demonstration is scheduled to start at 9:30 a.m. on that morning and everyone is welcome.

The 4-H Club boys and their dads will take a fishing trip to Concho County next week to get caught up on their fishing. The boys planning the trip details are Alfred Chapple, Wilbur Stone and Bill Davis. The group will leave about 8:30 a.m. Tuesday morning, July 12 and return home on Friday morning, July 15.

Turn bananas and sprinkle with coconut mixture. Return to broiler for about 2 minutes longer, to brown coconut lightly. Serve hot as meat accompaniment. Makes 4 servings.

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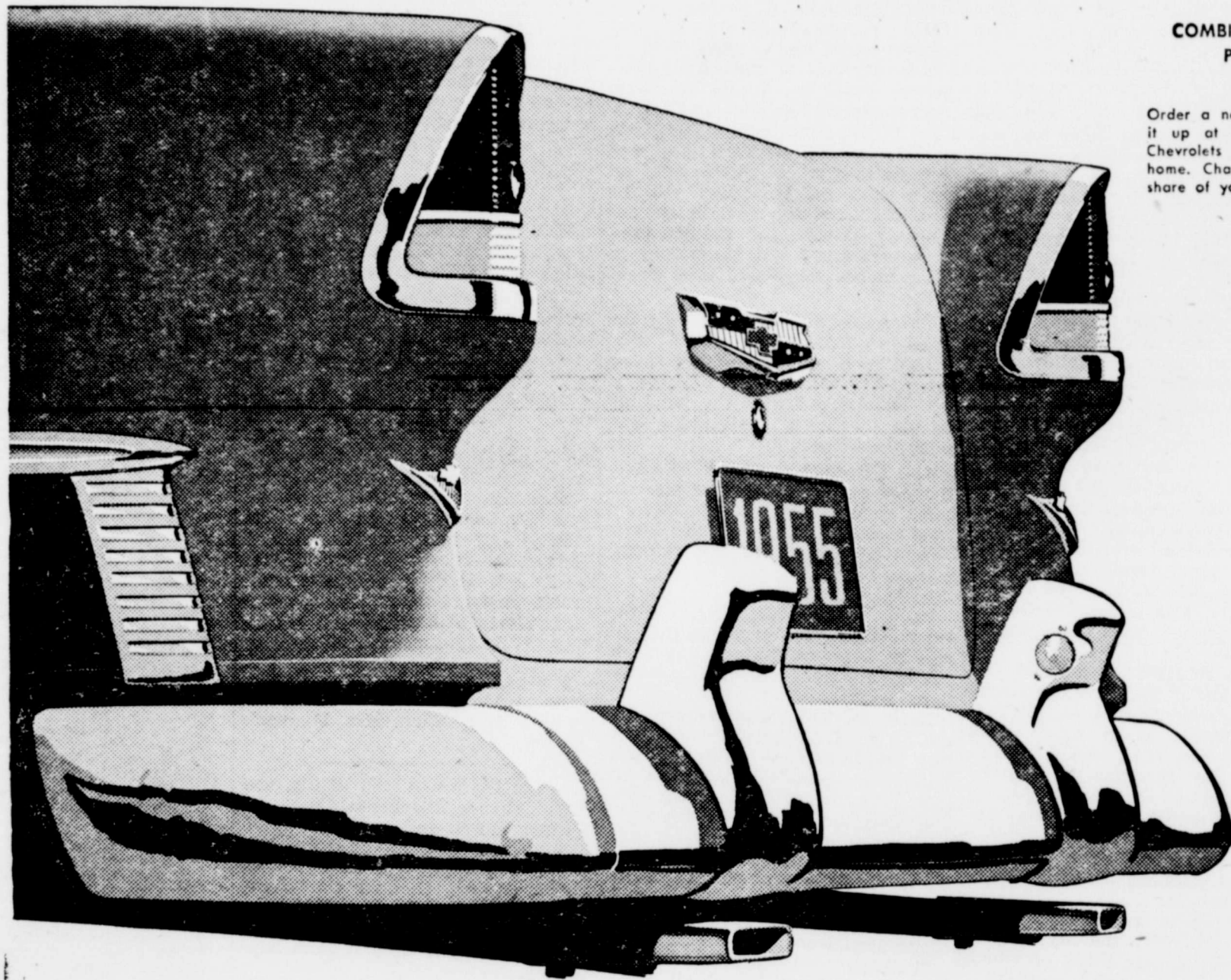

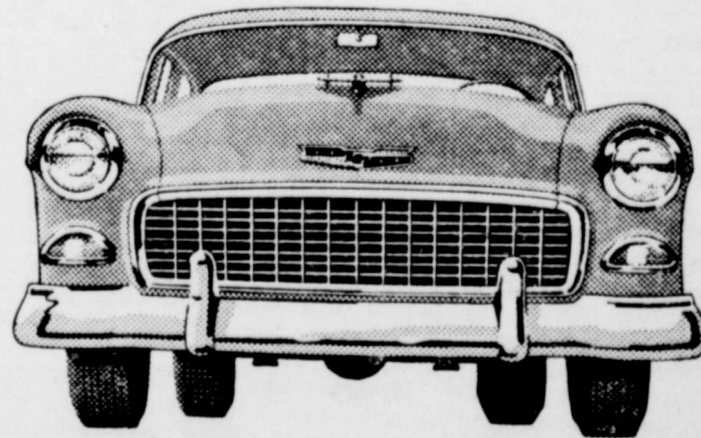

### U.S. Army Recruiting News for Young Men

The San Angelo U. S. Army Recruiting Station, under SFC John E. Bush, will conduct a recruiting drive in this area during July aimed at enlisting qualified young men under two of the most attractive recruiting programs ever offered by the U. S. Army - "Operation Gyroscope," and the Technical School Program.

The object of the recruiting drive will be to enlist as many qualified young men as allowed by quotas set by the Department of the Army for the two programs running through July 31.

Men enlisting in the U. S. Army from now until July 31 will be allowed their choice of either of these two splendid programs, both of which offer much to the prospective enlistee.

If a young man chooses to enlist under "Operation Gyroscope" he will be enlisted for the 3rd Armored Division, now stationed

at Fort Knox, Kentucky, but scheduled to depart soon for its new station in Europe. Such an enlistment will guarantee the enlistee of service in the European Command as a member of one of the most outstanding armored divisions in the world. Enlistees will be sent to Camp Chaffee, Arkansas, for preliminary processing for approximately one week, and then sent directly to Fort Knox in order to receive basic training before joining their regular unit departing for Europe in the near future.

The advantages of such an enlistment are plain; a stabilized tour of overseas duty, followed by a stabilized tour in the United States as long as the enlistee remains a member of the organization.

The other program—called the Technical School Program—is open only to high school graduates and will allow an enlistee to choose the technical training of his choice before enlisting, and receive a guarantee in writing of attending the school of his choice before he actually enlists. More than 100 technical schools are open under this program to young men of this area who desire to learn a profitable trade or profession. Such schools as Helicopter Repair and Maintenance, Guided Missiles, Automotive Repair, Signal Corps, Engineer, Public Information, and many others designed to produce highly skilled technicians for a modern, up-to-date Army.

Both "Operation Gyroscope" and The Army Technical School Program are controlled by quotas set by the Department of the Army so interested young men are advised to take immediate advantage of either of these programs by contacting Sgt. Emmitt L. Price at the Post Office in Sterling City between 12:30 and 3:00 p.m. on the 1st and 3rd Friday each month.

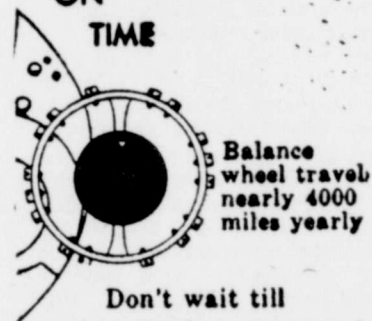

### Pause for Reflection

The following quotation from the late Dr. Charles Steinmetz provides a prediction of hopeful things to come of vast implications:

"The greatest discoveries in years to come," declared the great scientist, "will be made along spiritual lines. Some day people will learn that material things do not bring happiness and are of little use in making men and women creative and powerful. Then the scientists of the world will turn their laboratories to the study of God and prayer. When that day comes, the world will see more advancement in one generation than it has in the last four."

Perhaps what Dr. Steinmetz envisioned is approaching faster than a lot of us realize. At any rate, I think its advent is being hastened by the very spirit of scientific inquiry which, in its earlier, adoles-

### New No-Roll Pastry



By JANE ASHLEY

Here is an amazing new quick and easy method for preparing a pastry that is mixed in the pan and shaped in the pan. The pie crust is unusually rich and tender and keeps its perfect shape.

**Mazola No-Roll Pastry Shell**  
(Single 8 or 9-inch Crust)  
1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup salad oil  
2 tablespoons cold milk

Sift dry ingredients into pie pan. Combine salad oil and milk in measuring cup. Whip with fork and pour all at once over flour mixture. Mix with fork until flour is completely dampened. Press evenly and firmly with fingers to line bottom of pan; then press dough up to line sides and partly cover rim. Be sure dough is pressed to uniform thickness. To flute, pinch dough lightly with fingers. Do not use a high fluted edge.

**For Baked Shell:** Prick entire surface; bake in hot oven (425° F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Cool; fill as desired.

**For Unbaked Shell:** Fill as desired and bake in hot oven (400° F.) 15 minutes, then reduce to mod-

erate (350° F.) and bake until filling tests done.

Always prepare filling before making pastry.

Use a baked 9-inch No-Roll Pastry Shell in preparing this delicious pie.

**Strawberry Pie**

1 envelope gelatin  
4 tablespoons cold water  
2 egg yolks  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1 cup crushed strawberries  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
2 egg whites  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped

Soften gelatin in cold water. Beat egg yolks slightly in top of double boiler. Add corn syrup. Cook over boiling water, about 5 minutes stirring constantly, until mixture is slightly thickened. Add gelatin; stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool slightly. Combine strawberries and lemon juice and add to gelatin mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat egg whites and salt until stiff but not dry; gradually beat in sugar. Fold in strawberry mixture; then lightly fold in whipped cream. Pile into baked pie shell. Chill thoroughly.

**Keep Corduroy  
Colorful!**

By Betty Barclay

**N**EXT thing you know, we'll be wearing corduroy evening dresses! Corduroy is that popular—and one of the many reasons is its easy upkeep... It takes to soap and water beautifully! Here's a special recipe for washing your corduroys.



**Regular Washing:** Whether you launder corduroy by hand or by machine, treat soiled places first... with sponge, rub bead-bluing suds into spots. Fill tub or washer with warm water, add a half cup of the new laundry bead-bluing (the one with nylon brightener) and a good soap or syndet, plus a water conditioner (according to the manufacturer's directions).

Since corduroy tends to pick up lint, and since colors also tend to run—wash colors separately from whites. If washing by machine, run machine 5 minutes; rinse thoroughly, spinning about 3 minutes. Squeeze gently by hand, or put through loosely adjusted wringer. Remember that twisting corduroy makes unnecessary creases!

**Washbowl Washing:** Identical, except that gentle scrubbing will be necessary.

**Drier Drying:** Dry corduroy at high heat, but remove while still slightly damp to prevent creasing. Place on hanger and smooth out—especially at seams. Drier action brings up nap nicely. Ironing is usually unnecessary, but if you prefer to touch up garment, then place nap-side down on a Turkish towel and iron from wrong side. A steam iron does especially well for this type of pressing.

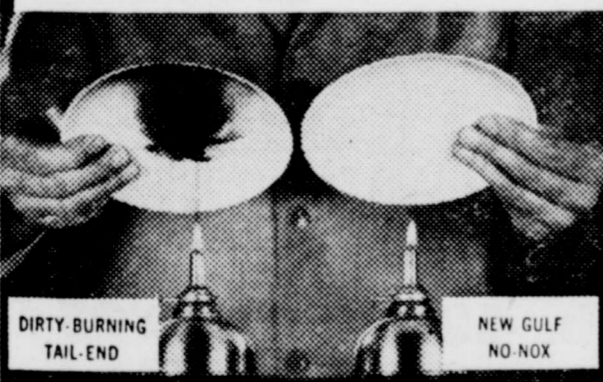

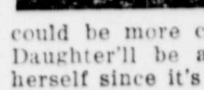
