

THE FIRST SESSION of the 84th Congress, just concluded, was about the mildest one I have witnessed during my 12 years in the House. While there have been clashes here and there, in the main the tempers have been restrained and things have gone along rather smoothly. But next year it will be different, with their eyes on the national conventions both parties will, if history repeats, be weighing the effect of their actions on the approaching campaign.

BEFORE CLOSING for the year, the House passed by a 6-vote margin the Gas Bill, designed to keep the sale of natural gas at the well competitive. If enacted into law, this measure will help restrain the hand of the Federal Government in local affairs and reduce concentration of power in Washington.



Frosted Peanut Squares

11/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 11/2 teaspoons baking powder

% cup shortening % cup brown sugar

% cup light or dark corn syrup 2 eggs, beaten 11/2 teaspoons vanilla 1/2 cup milk 1 cup salted peanuts, chopped

Sift together flour and baking powder. Cream shortening; add sugar and cream until fluffy. Add corn syrup; beat well. Add eggs and vanilla; mix well. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk, stirring just until smooth after each addition. Stir in peanuts. Turn into 2 greased 8-inch square pans. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 30 minutes. When cool, frost with a creamy butter frosting. Cut into squares.
