City Incorporated By Vote of 117 to 90

Election for City Officials In About 15 Days

Sterling City voters at 86.2% of voting strength, voted by a margin of 27 votes to incorporate the town in an election here Tuesday. The percentage for incorporation was 56.9 and against was 43.5% of the votes cast.

There will be an election to elect a mayor and five aldermen in about 15 days, it was said. The ballot on that day will be blank with lines in which to write in the names of persons wanted for mayor and aldermen, it was said.

The Board of Community Development had sponsored the election. Taking the city route as a means to securing a water and sewer plant, the board had pushed the election with that in mind.

Voting was close on the incorporation decision. Following an election of city officials, a vote on a bond issue will come, it was said. The bond issue will be decided by property owning taxpayers to decide if such bonds for water and sewer should be issued.

The board had started out at first to try put over a water district for Sterling County. They later switched to incorporation as a more fair method of a water district.

The Board of Community Development is to meet at the community center in a called meeting Friday night, August 26, said president John Stuckwisch. A slate of candidates for city office will be discussed, it is understood.

Stuckwisch urges all members to be present at the meeting.

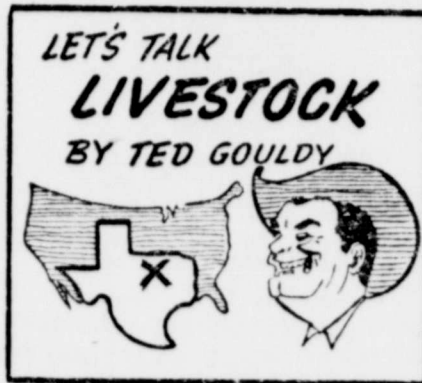

CATTLE AND CALVES ABOUT STEADY; TOP \$23.50

FORT WORTH—There was the usual effort on the part of buyers to lower livestock prices on the market at Fort Worth Monday, and the usual resistance on the part of the salesmen. The result was about a steady market compared with the close last week.

Fat steers and yearlings, stockers and feeders, and canner and cutter cows were most active.

Comparative prices: Slaughter steers and yearlings of good and choice kinds \$19.00—23.50, the top for steers that were feedlot mates to the New Mexico cattle at that price last week.

Unusual feature was that the two loads sold Monday weighed 941 pounds, exactly the same as those last week. Common and medium beef cattle \$12.00—18.00. Fat cows \$10.50—\$12.00; canners and cutters \$7.00—10.50. Bulls \$10.00—13.50. Good and choice slaughter calves \$16.50—18.50, some baby beef yearling weight creepeds \$19.00—20.00. Common and medium \$12.00—15.50 culls \$9.00—12.00. Stocker steer calves \$16.00—21.00, yearling stockers \$19.00 down. Stocker cows \$8.00—12.50.

ANGUS FEEDER JUDGES ARE CHOSEN FOR SEPTEMBER 9

Secretary Glen Tole of the Texas Aberdeen-Angus Association announced this week that Harris Mullin, Dalhart, had accepted a bid to judge the steers in the Angus feeder calf show to be held at Fort Worth Stockyards September 9. The heifers will be judged by Marvin Couey of San Angelo.

The show and sale will start early, with judging beginning at 6:30 a.m. to be completed in time for selling to start at 8:30 a.m. Inquiry has been heavy from both potential buyers and exhibitors, and with the big feed crop developing all over the corn belt demand for feeders should be broad at that time.

EWES OPEN WITH 50c ADVANCE ON MONDAY

Slaughter ewes 50c higher and sold mostly at \$4.50 to \$5.50 at Ft. Worth Mon. Other kinds of sheep and lambs were steady. Fat lambs topped at \$18, but something strictly choice or prime could probably sell above that, easily enough. Feeders sold readily at \$14 to \$16, and load lots of choice feeders could bring more.

Old wethers drew \$7 to \$12. Yearling muttons were quoted from \$8 to \$16. Old bucks around \$4.50.

The West Texas sheep country continues to get rains and some observers there say some sections look "like Spring." Restocking is already very active, and will increase as the cooler weather approaches.

Stocker cow dealers on the yards report activity in their pens the greatest in a long time. Despite the continued relatively low prices on finished cattle, the stocker and feeder demand remains good.

The improved pasture and water conditions in the Southwest has put most sheep and cattle in very strong hands, and efforts of Northern buyers to weaken prices have been unavailing so far this season.

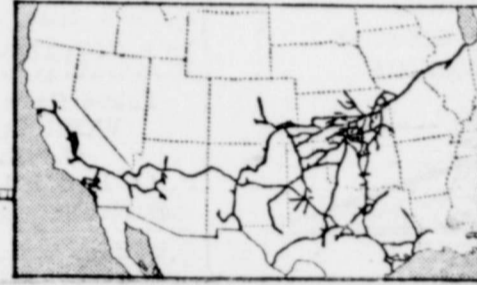

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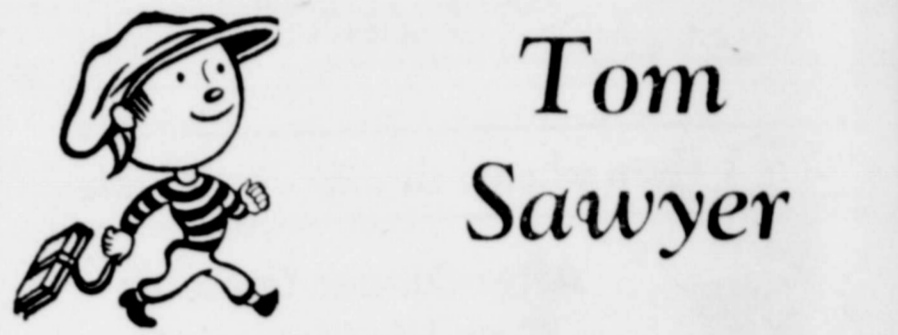
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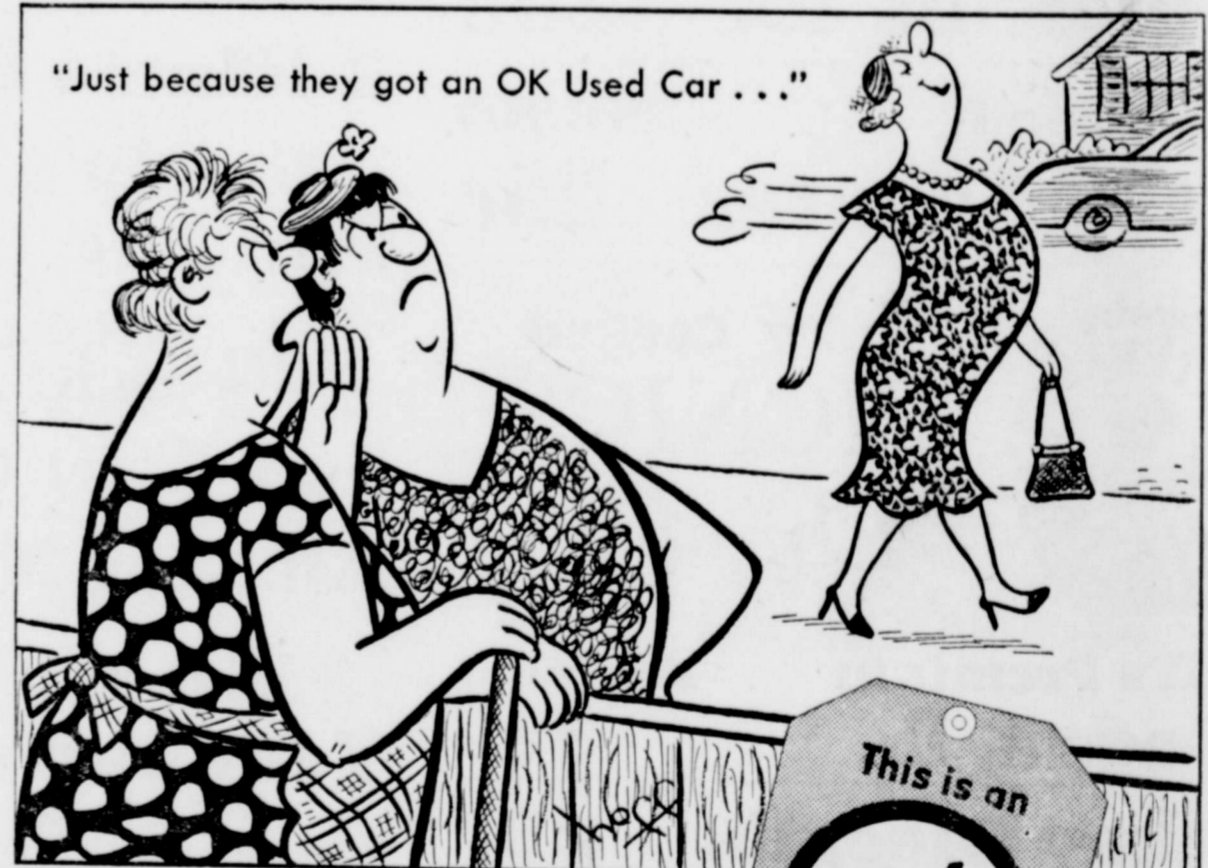
