Mayor and Five Aldermen

There will be an election today in Sterling City to vote for a mayor and five aldermen. No names are to be printed on the ballots.

There are lines for write-in of names for mayor and the five aldermen.

Voters eligible are qualified electors or voters residing in the city limits. That takes in all persons living in the city boundaries and who have a poll tax or an exemption, said Judge Murrell.

Once officials are elected and installed, they will handle all the problems that arise confronting a city governing body. In all likelihood a petition for a water and sewer bond issue will be one of the first problems.

Sterling City was incorporated by a vote of 117 to 90 on Tuesday, August 23. The Board of Community Development has sponsored incorporation as means to secure a water and sewer system for Sterling City. Presumably a bond issue for such plants will be held in the future.

County Agent's Column

The analyses of green prickly pear for feeding to livestock have been worked out by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station as follows:

Crude Protein	1.4 to 4.4%
Digestible Protein	0.5
Fat	1.55
Potash	3.04
Phosphoric Acid	0.33
Crude Fiber	8.65
N.F.E.	57.85
Water	up to 85%

From these analyses, prickly pear would be classed as a fair roughage. However, prickly pear alone is not considered a maintenance feed for livestock. At the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Sonora, a daily feeding of 11.49 pounds of burned and chopped prickly pear, 0.35 pounds of cottonseed meal and 0.34 pounds of alfalfa proved a satisfactory emergency ration for ewes. Prickly pear as an emergency feed, can be used most efficiently to supply the bulk of roughage supplemented with a protein concentrate and alfalfa hay.

This material came from a new publication put out just recently by the Extension Service entitled "Prickly Pear—Good or Bad". Copies may be obtained in my office.

Plans are being made to hold another brush control demonstration in the county. G. O. Hoffman, Range Specialist with the Extension Service has made arrangements for some equipment to be sent to Sterling County for demonstration purposes. When definite plans have been made concerning the program, more will be put in this column.

A Right Pretty Economy Salad

TOMATOES are plentiful . . . and there's always a cup or so of leftover vegetables in the refrigerator. So, here's a right pretty salad, that is right smartly economical, too—using as it does, both fresh tomatoes and leftover vegetables.



Economy Salad

8 firm, medium-sized tomatoes; 1 package lemon-flavored gelatin; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1 cup hot water; 1 cup strained tomato juice; 1 1/2 cups mixed cooked vegetables.

Wash tomatoes, remove a thin slice from top, and scoop out centers. Use tops and centers for juice. Place tomato cases upside down on plate and set in cool place until ready to fill. Dissolve gelatin and salt in hot water. Add tomato juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in vegetables. Fill tomatoes with mixture. Chill until firm. When ready to serve, cut each tomato in quarters, using a sharp knife dipped in hot water. Arrange on crisp lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Makes 8 servings.
