## Eagles Into Conference Play Here Tonight

### Play Garden City Tonight At Eight O'clock

The Sterling City Eagles go into conference play tonight by hosting the Garden City Bearkats on the local field at 8 p.m. This first conference game follows five warmup games with area teams not in the district.

Garden City is rated about second best in the district with Christoval sitting on the top rung now. The Bearkats are rated above the locals, but Jesse Morris is back in the line-up and the boys broke into the winning column last Friday night, by drubbing Flower Grove here.

### Eagles Win Over Dragons 44-22 Last Friday Night

The Eagles broke into the winning column last Friday night by shellacking the Flower Grove Dragons 44-22 on the Eagle Field.

During the first quarter, neither side scored. In the second, Lynn Glass ran through the middle of the line for six points for the Eagles. The extra point failed. Then Flower Grove's Robert Webb countered with a 30-yard run around the end for 6 points and the Dragons kicked the goal, making the score 8-6 in favor of the Dragons. Lynn Glass then passed to Jimmy McWhorter for a good one and McWhorter carried it on over for the Sterling team, making the score 12-8.

Then, before the half, Glass again got loose and ran 60 yards for another score. Bill Young kicked the goal, making the score at halftime 20-8 in favor of the locals.

The Dragons kicked as play resumed after the half. On the first play from scrimmage, Bobby Lester makes a score on a 50 yard run. Jesse Morriss follows along and turns in two touchdowns in a short span of time. Before the final whistle blew, Bill Young carried the pigskin over for another tally, giving the Eagles 44.

For Flower Grove, Curtis Miller and Wayne Webb racked up six points and following one TD, the Dragon kicker added two more points, giving them 22 for the night.

### \$250,000 Bond Election For Water and Sewer On October 31

The City Council of Sterling City has set the date for a bond election on water and sewer bonds for October 31. The first date set was October 24, but the required notices were not ready in time to call the election for that date.

There are four propositions to be voted on. The first proposition is one to issue \$75,000.00 of revenue waterworks bonds. Revenue bonds are the kinds that the principal and interest are paid from revenues of the system.

Proposition No. 2 is one of issuing \$50,000.00 of sewer bond of the revenue type. Both issues of the revenue bonds could be paid off by revenue from the other if such revenue is available.

Proposition No. 3 is that of issuing \$75,000.00 in tax bonds for a waterworks system. Thus, with the two bond issues, a total of \$150,000.00 would be available for putting in a waterworks system if the bonds are voted by taxpayer voters of the city.

Proposition number four is one of issuing \$50,000.00 of tax bonds for the sewer system, giving a total of \$100,000.00 for such if the bond issues carry.

### \$250,000.00 TOTAL

The total of all four bond issues is \$250,000.00. The bonds are according to the election notice, are to mature in not more than 35 years and not to have an interest rate above or to exceed 4 3/4%.

Property taxpayers that are duly qualified electors are eligible to vote, according to the election notice, printed elsewhere in this paper.

The polling place will be in the courthouse. Named as judges of the election are A. W. Dearen, presiding judge, Mrs. Taylor Garrett, assistant judge, Mrs. C. T. Williams and Mrs. C. C. Ainsworth, clerks.

### Absentee Voting

Mayor John Walraven said that absentee voting could now be by voters that would be out-of-pocket on election day. He said that the city secretary, Delbert Haralson had the supplies, and one could see him and vote.

'Shall the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$75,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty Five (35) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and Three-fourths (4¾%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing a Waterworks System for said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said Waterworks System, and if the Sewer System Revenue Bonds are voted on as provided in Proposition No. 2, to be secured additionally by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said Sewer System.'

**PROPOSITION NO. 2**

'Shall the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$50,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty Five (35) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and Three-fourths (4¾%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing a Sewer System for said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said Sewer System, and if the Waterworks System Revenue Bonds are voted as provided in Proposition No. 1, to be secured additionally by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said Waterworks System.'

**PROPOSITION NO. 3**

'Shall the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of \$75,000.00, maturing serially in such install-

ments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity date being not more than Thirty Five (35) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and Three-fourths (4¾%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of constructing a Waterworks System for said City, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.'

**PROPOSITION NO. 4**

'Shall the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of \$50,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity date being not more than Thirty Five (35) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and Three-fourths (4¾%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of constructing a Sewer System for said City, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.'

2. That said election shall be held at the Sterling County Courthouse, within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed directors of said election:

- A.W. Dearen, Presiding Judge,
- Mrs. Taylor Garrett, Assistant Judge,
- Mrs. C. T. Williams, Clerk,
- Mrs. C. C. Ainsworth, Clerk.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1,

Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

Concerning each of the above propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Sec-

retary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, supra. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first pub-

lication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.

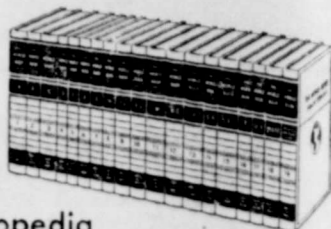

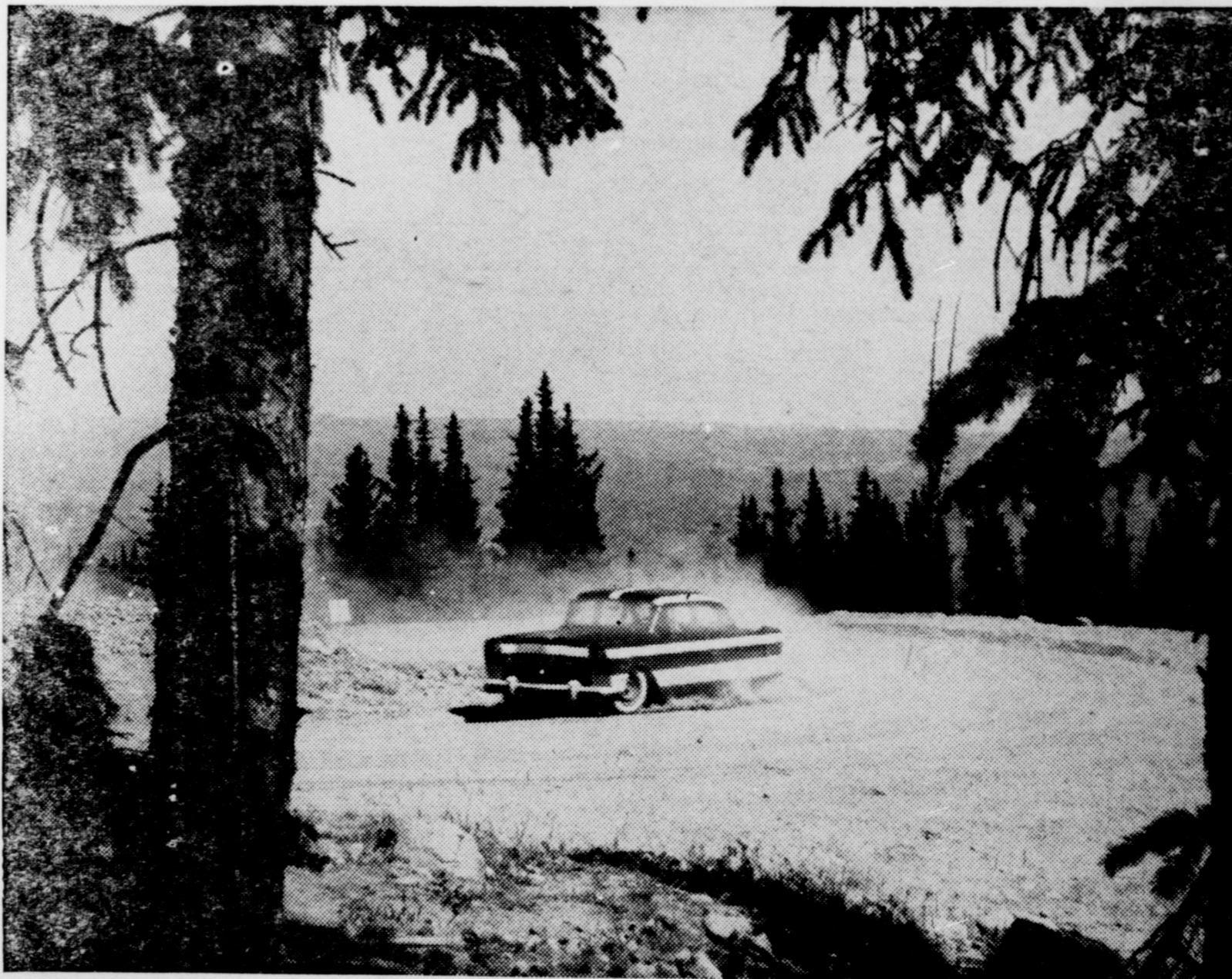

WORKER SHOULD BE SURE OF HIS SOCIAL SECURITY ACCOUNT

"The value of the social security account depends on the worker. Not just on how much earnings are credited to that account, but also on how the worker carries out his responsibility in keeping his account straight." This statement was made today by E. M. Bowers, manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"All social security benefits, whether they are retirement benefits after age 65 or survivors benefits to your family in case of death,—all benefits are based on your social security account. It follows that if your account is correct, the benefits will be correct." "There are two things that happen occasionally," continued Mr. Bowers, "and when they do happen, they jeopardize the correctness of your social security account. The first is when the social security number is left off the return and the second is when the account number is incorrect, or perhaps the name reported is incorrect."

Both of these mistakes are usually caused by carelessness on the part of the employer or the worker. A little care in the beginning would assure the correctness of the account.

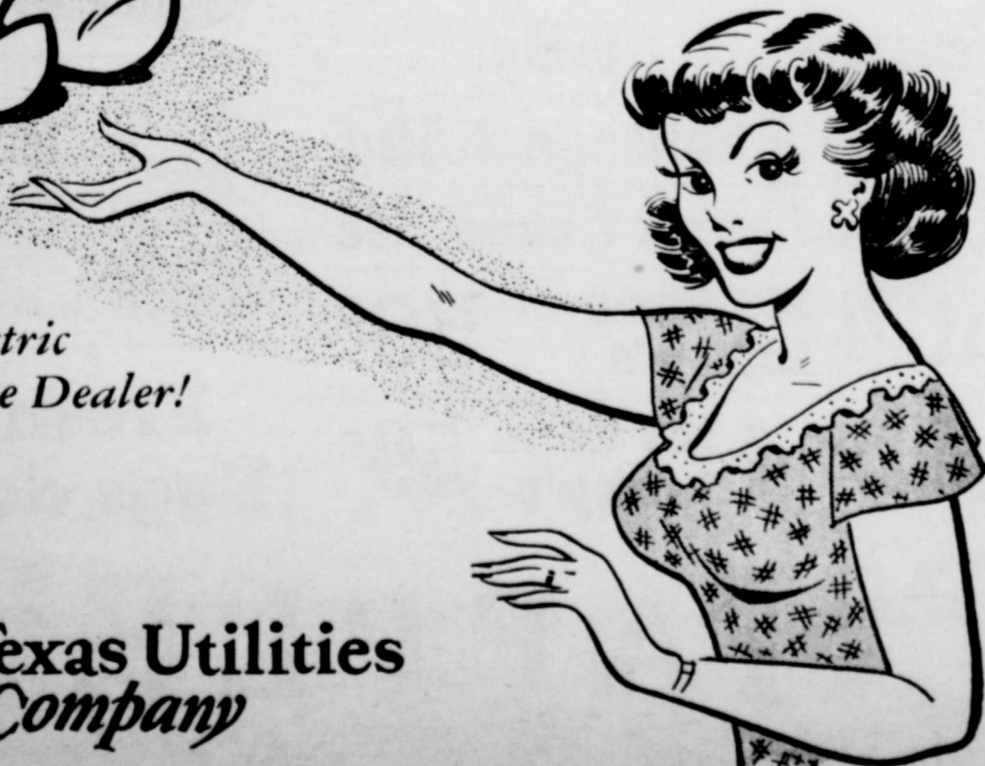

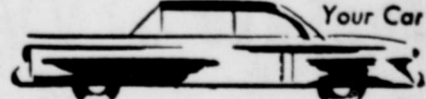

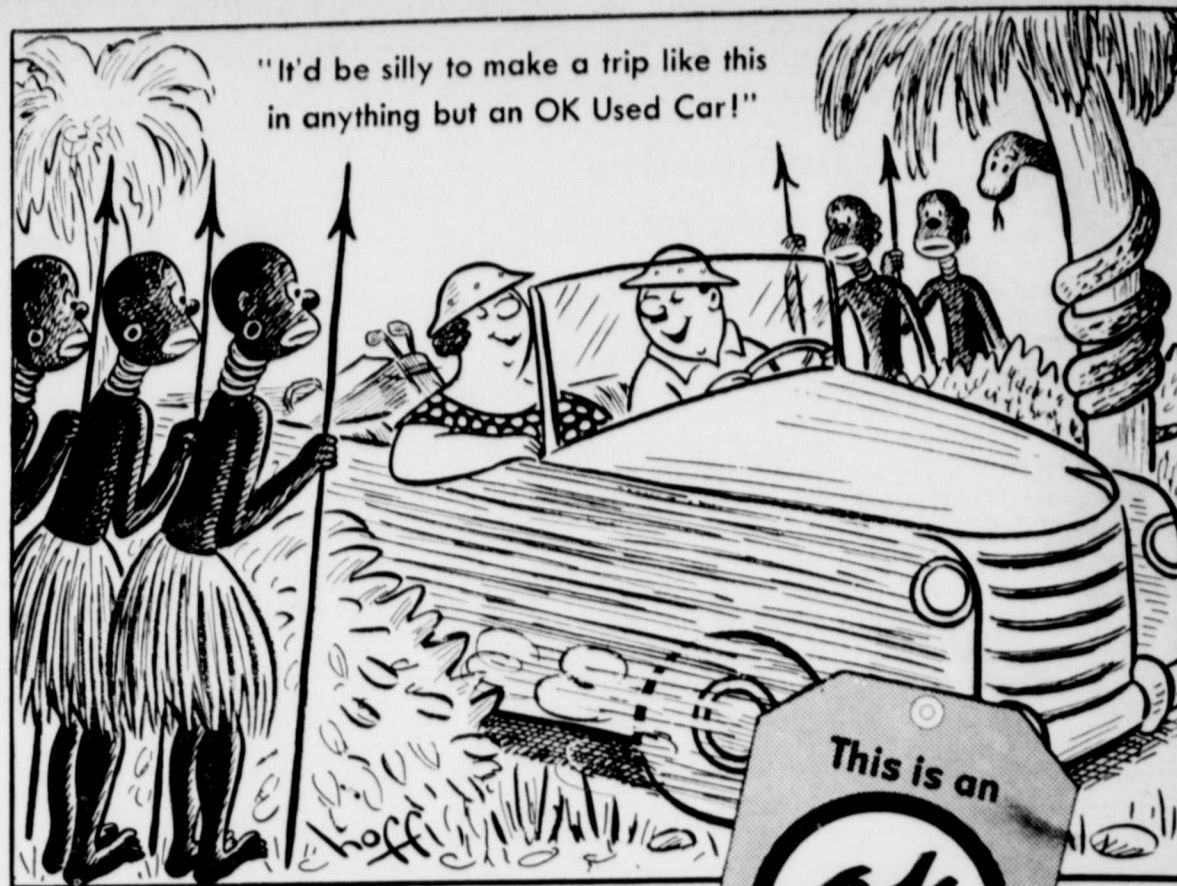
**Pause for Reflection**

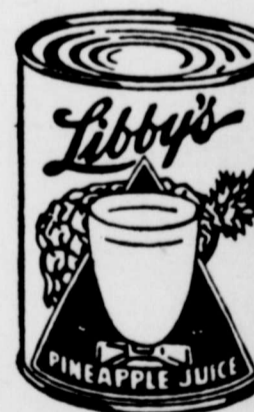

**COWS OPEN LOWER;  
GOOD STOCKERS STEADY**

FORT WORTH—Cows opened weak to 50 cents lower to slaughter interests at Fort Worth Monday, but stocker buyers were active on kinds of suitable to go back to the country and bought these steady. Mature steers and fat year-

lings were steady, and bulls brought firm prices.

Stocker demand was again dominated by strong Southwestern demand, and good and choice sorts were sold at prices that were steady with last week's advances. However, the plainer kinds were inclined to lower levels.

Choice slaughter calves were steady, and the others sold around 50 cents lower. Cornbelt interests were still talking lower prices on all replacement cattle and calves, but the greening pasture in much of the Southwest influenced prices at Fort Worth more than Northern conditions.

Packers were uniformly pessimistic in view of the heavy cattle offerings of recent days.

Comparative prices included: Good and choice slaughter steers

and yearlings \$18.00—22.00; common to medium \$12.00—17.00; fat cows \$10.00—12.00; canners and cutters \$6.50—10.00; bulls \$9.50—13.00, few \$13.50. Good to choice slaughter calves \$16.00—18.00; yearling weights to \$19 or better when fancy; common and medium calves \$12.00—15.00; culls \$9.00—11.00. Stocker steer calves \$21.50 down; heifers \$18.00 down; steer yearlings \$19.75 down; stocker cows \$8.00—13.00.

**CATTLE ON FEED UP  
19 PER CENT OCTOBER 1**

USDA Crop Reporting Board report of cattle on feed in 13 states, released at Fort Worth's Agricultural Market News Office, says that 19 per cent more cattle are on feed October 1 than a year ago. Texas, Arizona and Colorado are included in this report for the first time.

Cattle on feed in Texas October 1 were estimated at 84,000, against 49,000 July 1. Nine Cornbelt states report an increase of 25 per cent above a year ago.

Feeders in the 13 states reporting said that 73 per cent of their cattle would be marketed in the next three months.

**SOUTHWESTERN FEEDER LAMB  
DEMAND NARROWS, RAIN  
NEEDED**

Feeder lamb prices which have been very strong for the past month has been unevenly lower late last week, and Monday trade was very weak at Fort Worth on the class. Cornbelt feeders have been talking sharply lower prices right along, but the prospects of winter grazing and demand for feeding lambs in Texas and other Southwestern states had kept price

well above Cornbelt offers.

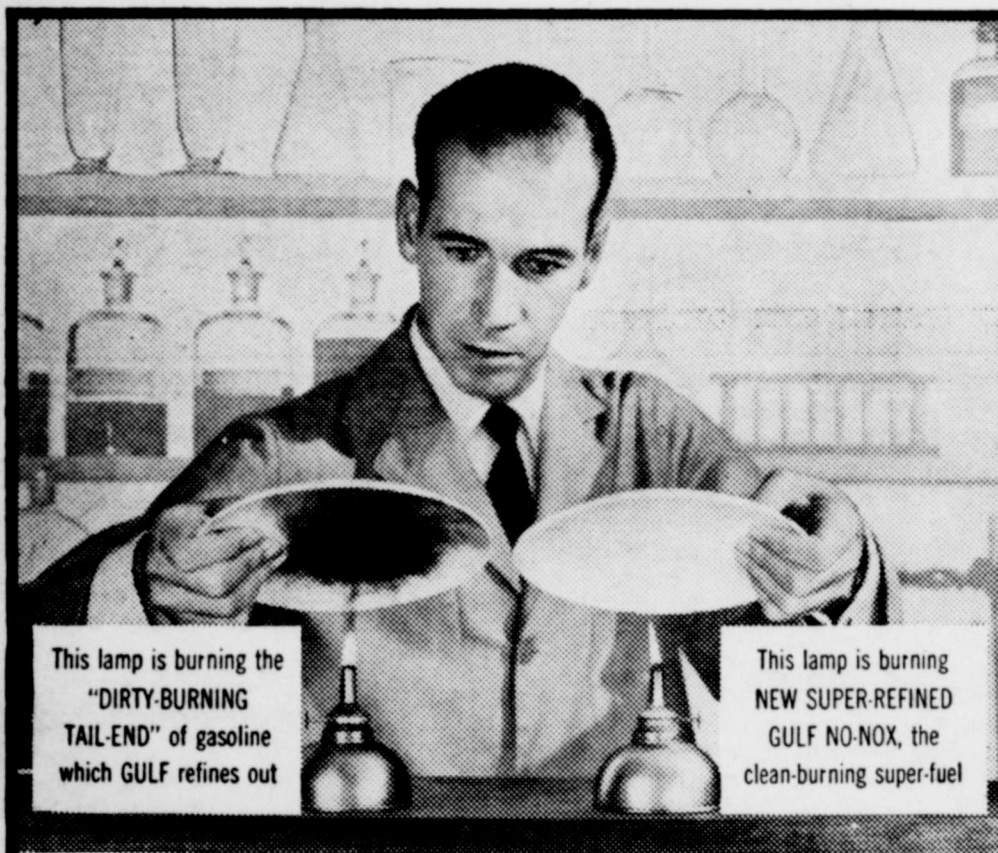
However, many spots where winter pasture had been in good prospect, were in need of more rain and feeder lamb trade slowed accordingly. Texas feeders were meeting heavy competition from Western States lambs across the important Western Cornbelt feeding areas, too.

At Fort Worth slaughter classes were fully steady Monday. Good and choice fat woolled lambs \$18.00—20.00; choice shorn lambs with No. 2 pelts \$18. Cull to medium grades \$12.00—17.00. Feeder and stocker lambs mostly \$13.00—15.00. Good to choice slaughter yearling wethers \$15.00—16.00; cull to medium yearlings \$11.00—15.50. Old wethers \$8.00—12.00; old ewes \$5.00—5.50; old bucks \$4.00—5.00.

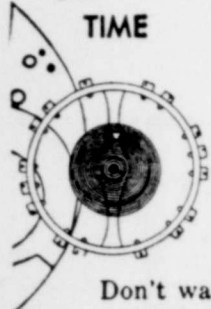

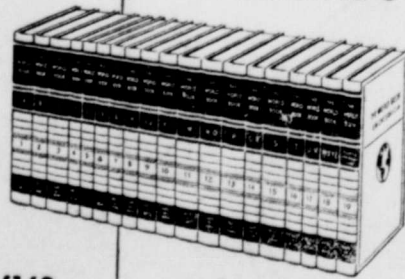

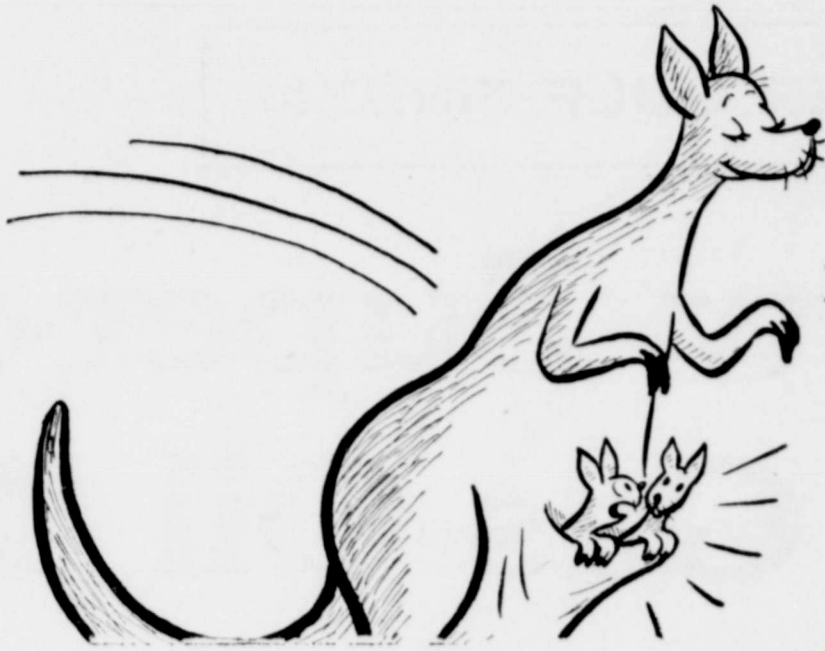

**To Sterling City Voters:**

It has been said, "there is one thing to be said about ignorance or lack of information—it sure causes a lot of interesting arguments."

Following a whirl-wind campaign, Sterling City recently voted to incorporate, and elected its officials, for the purpose of obtaining and furnishing a soft water system and sewage disposal, on a revenue-paying "no-tax" basis.

Admittedly now, the soft water is out, as well as the "no-tax" theory.

Bond Election Notices are now up, calling for an aggregate of \$250,000.00, with a maximum maturity date of 35 years and a maximum interest rate of 4 3/4%. If each of these maximums are allowed—as well they might be, under the existing circumstances --the total interest charge will be \$415,625.00, or a total of \$665,625.00 that the tax-payers and water and sewage users of Sterling City will have to pay for the installation (not including expense of upkeep, maintenance, repair or replacement) of the system during that period of time.

That much we know—what the voters should further know is:

**What Portions of the City Will Be Served?**

The Engineer has admitted that not all of the City will be covered by the System. The City Taxes will be city-wide—everyone will be paying them. Yet, if some will not receive water and sewer service, then they and their neighbors are entitled to know the facts.

**What Are the Plans for the Future Extension of Service to Those Not Now To Be Included?**

As they are to be taxed to pay on the original bond issue, they are legally entitled to water and sewer service. Will another bond issue be necessary (undoubtedly it will), and can the City with its size and population, get the additional credit without extreme penalty?

**Where Are the Proposed Tentative Plans of the Engineer, So That the Voters Might See Them?**

To give a good-faith estimate of the costs of such a system, an Engineer would have to have a beginning point and an ending point, just as an architect would for a house. The voters are entitled to know this.

**How Much City-Wide Valuation and Rates Will Be Necessary to Pay the Bonds and Interest?**

The average man likes to estimate his costs, to determine if he feels it is a wise expenditure. The City Council will be actually spending the money, but it will be money belonging to the tax-payer.

**Are the Proposed Bonds Payable "on or Before?"**

The average man likes to make an "on or before" note (and a bond is like a note with security) so that if he has surplus money, he can pay the note and stop the interest. Also, he may want to re-finance, or can get money elsewhere at a cheaper rate of interest, and he wants to be able to pay off the old indebtedness without paying interest for the future. This can be done—even in City business.

**Why Was Competition Eliminated for Purchase of Bonds?**

Competition for low interest rates between commercial purchasers of the bonds (who are merely investors of money to earn interest) was eliminated when City Council passed an Ordinance granting the election sponsoring Bond House an exclusive option to purchase the bonds when issued, at an interest rate to be later mutually agreed upon. Normal business procedure—particularly with reference to public business—is for sale of bonds on sealed bid basis, with the bonds going to the one bidding the cheapest interest rate and best terms (commonly called "to the best interests of the taxpayer.").

**How Will Our Insurance Rates Be Reduced?**

The idea has been tossed that savings on insurance will offset the taxes. To obtain lower insurance rates, the State sets minimum standards for the water system (size and location of pipes, fire plugs, etc.) and requires equipment of stated specifications (Pumper Truck capable of pumping 500 gallons per minute for a certain number of hours, a Hose Truck with 1000 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose, etc.) This equipment is expensive, and from what source—except from an additional tax levy—will the Council obtain money to purchase them, as the bond money is earmarked for construction purposes only.
