### Barbecue Supper Starts At 5:30 p.m.

The Annual Sterling City Parent-Teacher Association Halloween Festival will be held at the school next Monday night, October 31. The affair gets under way with the serving of a barbecue supper at 5:30 and on. Cost of admission to the building is 25c and 50c, it was said.

## EAGLES DROP FIRST CONFERENCE GAME TO GARDEN CITY

The Sterling City Eagles, defending regional champions, dropped the first conference game of the season to the Garden City Bearkats on the local field last Friday night 42-0. The Bearkats have seven seniors on their squad and they are destined to go places in the district race this season.

Sterling City kicked off to the Bearkats as the game opened. The Glasscock boys fumbled and Sterling recovered the ball on the very first play. The Eagles then lost the oval on downs and Garden City took over and determinedly went all the way to pay dirt for a TD. The point for extra tally was good (in fact, the Bearkats made every extra point that night—totaling up to another TD as scores go.) The first Bearkat tally was by Jim Smith, who also made the extra point. In the second quarter Milton Mow, a 236-pounder, got a TD as did Smith again.

Following the half Smith racked up another score in the third quarter, and Eddie Engle scored two in the final chuckle.

Sterling's lone touchdown came in the fourth and final period with Wilbur Stone loping through the field for 60 yards. Bobby Lester kicked the ball between the uprights for two more points.

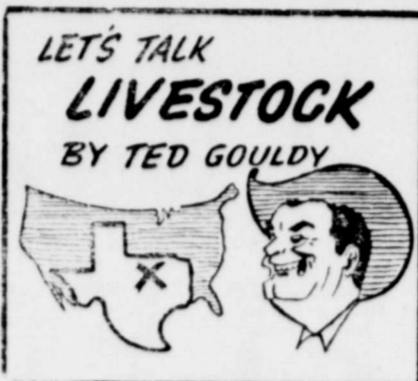

## CATTLE RUN MONDAY BIGGEST OF SEASON

FORT WORTH—The twelve major markets of the nation Monday reported 163,000 cattle, the biggest run of the Fall season. The offering at Fort Worth was of about the same size as a week ago, but the big numbers reported around the market circle put pressure on prices here as well as at other points.

Again the 12 markets reported over 100,000 hogs on Monday and this put pressure on butchers at all points as well as adding to the difficulties of beef cattle and calves.

At Fort Worth cattle and calves faced weak to 50 cents or more lower offers. Comparative prices included: good and choice steers and yearlings \$18.00—22.00; common and medium kinds \$12.00—17.00. Fat cows \$9.50—11.50; canners and cutters \$6.00—9.50; bulls \$9.00—13.00; good and choice slaughter calves \$16.00—17.10, few heavier higher; cull, common and medium kinds \$8.00—13.00; stocker steer calves \$21.00 down, heifers \$17.50 down; steer yearlings \$19.00 down; stocker cows \$8.00—12.50.

### STOCKER AND FEEDER SALE AVERAGE \$96.09 PER HEAD

The special Hereford Stocker and Feeder Sale held at Fort Worth last Friday attracted 2,219 head that sold for a gross of \$213,226.90, or an average of \$96.09 per head. Top price was \$25.50 paid for a 20 lot from the League Ranch of Benjamin. Second high price was \$25 paid for an entry from Turner Greenwade of Clifton. Top heifers sold at \$22 and came from the John R. Black Estate Ranch of Granbury.

Numerous lots of heifers sold in the \$18 to \$20 bracket and numerous lots of steers sold in the \$19 to \$23 field. Average of the sale was easily \$1 to \$1.50 above current market prices on most of the calves and yearlings.

Plans for a series of stocker and feeder sales starting next Spring were announced Friday. First such event for Herefords will be April. Angus Feeders reserved the Friday after July Fourth and the Friday after Labor Day for next year and likely will announce other dates later. Angus sales were held this year on those two dates.

Likely the Hereford dates will include three to five Spring and early Summer dates and two or three Fall dates next year.

In the five sales this year a total of 9,974 stockers and feeders sold for a gross of \$959,895.18, an average of \$96.29 per head.

LAMBS ADVANCE 50c FOR ONLY BRIGHT SPOT MONDAY  
Fat lambs of good and choice kinds sold for \$18 to \$20 at Fort Worth Monday, on a strong to 50 cents higher market. They were the only class of livestock able to make an advance at the market that day. Feeders were strong at \$16.50 down. Old ewes drew \$4.50 to \$5.50, and aged wethers \$8 to \$12. Yearling muttons sold around \$12 to \$15.50, some culls below that.

WYOMING SHEEP CHECKED INTO FORT WORTH YARDS  
Two big truck loads of fine yearling bucks pulled into Fort Worth late last week from near Cheyenne, Wyoming. They were halted here for feed and rest, en route to New Orleans. The shipment will then take a plane and their new home will be on the range lands of Peru.

Their owners reported that the combined truck and plane trip was worked out not only because of the speed, but because it would be cheaper than in a boat trip.  
That's what they said!

In district play, Sterling City has a 1-1 mark while Water Valley is 0-2.

The City Council of Sterling City has set the date for a bond election on water and sewer bonds for October 31. The first date set was October 24, but the required notices were not ready in time to call the election for that date.

There are four propositions to be voted on. The first proposition is one to issue \$75,000.00 of revenue waterworks bonds. Revenue bonds are the kinds that the principal and interest are paid from revenues of the system.

Proposition No. 2 is one of issuing \$50,000.00 of sewer bond of the revenue type. Both issues of the revenue bonds could be paid off by revenue from the other if such revenue is available.

Proposition No. 3 is that of issuing \$75,000.00 in tax bonds for a waterworks system. Thus, with the two bond issues, a total of \$150,000.00 would be available for putting in a waterworks system if the bonds are voted by taxpayer voters of the city.

Proposition number four is one of issuing \$50,000.00 of tax bonds for the sewer system, giving a total of \$100,000.00 for such if the bond issues carry.

**\$250,000.00 TOTAL**  
The total of all four bond issues is \$250,000.00. The bonds are according to the election notice, are to mature in not more than 35 years and not to have an interest rate above or to exceed 4 3/4%.

Property taxpayers that are duly qualified electors are eligible to vote, according to the election notice.

The polling place will be in the courthouse. Named as judges of the election are A.W. Dearen, presiding judge, Mrs. Taylor Garrett, assistant judge, Mrs. C. T. Williams and Mrs. C. C. Ainsworth, clerks.

## State Fair Breaks All Records

Breaking all records, the State Fair of Texas wound up with a total attendance of 2,611,271 for the 16 days and 17 nights of its 1955 exposition.

The fair broke its own national attendance record of 2,506,463, set at last year's fair, and also established a new world's record for single-day attendance at any annual fair. The big day was Saturday, October 15, when the crowds totaled a fantastic 323,224.

A total of 82,337 fairgoers saw the State Fair Auditorium attraction "The Pajama Game" and "Ice Capades" attracted over 100,000.

The junior livestock and poultry auctions for steers, lambs, pigs, turkeys and broilers resulted in total sales of \$173,027 for the hundreds of boys and girls who took part. The junior livestock shows were the largest in the fair's history.

Dates of the 1956 State Fair of Texas have been tentatively set for Oct. 6 through 21.

One important change will be made in the format of next year's fair, due to the way the calendar falls. The Texas-Oklahoma football game will be played on the second Saturday of the Fair, rather than on the first, and this schedule will hold for the next three years.

As a result, Rural Youth Day, which this year attracted over 100,000 boys and girls from all parts of the state, will probably be moved to the opening Saturday of the fair, rather than the middle Saturday.

The opening day football feature of the 1956 exposition will be a night game in the Cotton Bowl between Texas A&M and Texas Tech.

# FACTS . . .

## About the October 31st BOND ELECTION

**1. Who is eligible to vote in the election?**

ANSWER: The individual must have resided within the present city limits for at least 6 months; have a poll tax or be over age; and have either real or personal property subject to taxation.

**2. What is the total cost of the Water and Sewer Project?**

ANSWER: The total cost for both Water and Sewer is estimated to be slightly less than \$250,000.

**3. How long will it take the City to pay off this amount of money**

ANSWER: These bonds can be retired in 30 years, with a 20 year option clause, at an annual cost of \$15,350, which figure includes both principal and interest per year. The option clause is for the benefit of the City and gives a chance to pay off all the balance at the end of 20 years if surplus money is available.

**4. Will the proposed Water and Sewer System serve the entire City of Sterling City?**

ANSWER: It would be safe to say that the City would be 90% covered by the proposed Water and Sewer lines. No city is ever completely served by their Water and Sewer System, even after years of operation.

**5. Will there be a tax levy for the first few years of the Water and Sewer System operation?**

ANSWER: The present estimates show that the entire \$250,000 in bonds can be retired strictly from revenue of the water and sewer system; however, if only three-fourths of the estimated 300 users tie on to the system, there will have to be a small tax for the general obligation bonds.

**6. Is the Water and Sewer System Project a sound business proposition?**

ANSWER: This project is just as sound as a home mortgage loan. It is the only sound way for the City to finance this project and have the chance to grow.

**7. Why build a Water and Sewer System within the City of Sterling City?**

ANSWER: This project is needed within our City for several reasons. One very important reason is to correct the health problem by providing good fresh, clean water for consumption. Another reason would be to provide water for cheaper fire insurance rates through out the City. Still another reason would be to furnish ample clean bacteria free water for school children consumption. One other important reason would be that fact a good Water and Sewer System will encourage home building, thereby contribute to the growth and development of the City.

**8. How will the Bond Election Ballot look?**

ANSWER: The ballot will consist of 4 separate propositions. Each proposition will have a line FOR and one AGAINST. The simple way to vote would be to scratch through the line to which you are opposed, thus leaving the line you favor. All propositions will have to carry by a majority vote for the whole \$250,000 to carry.

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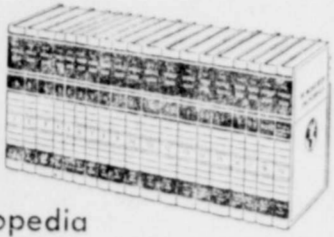
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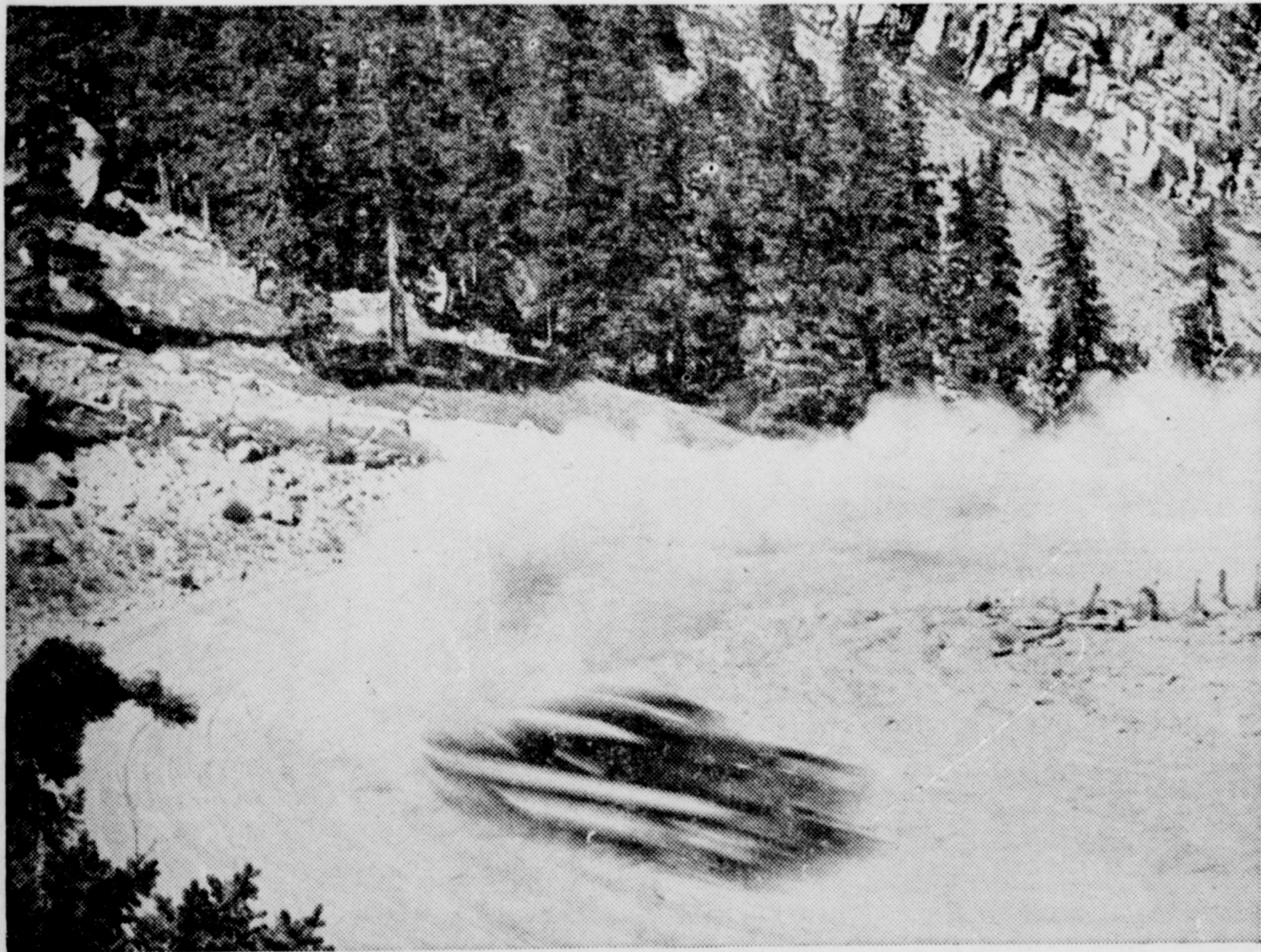

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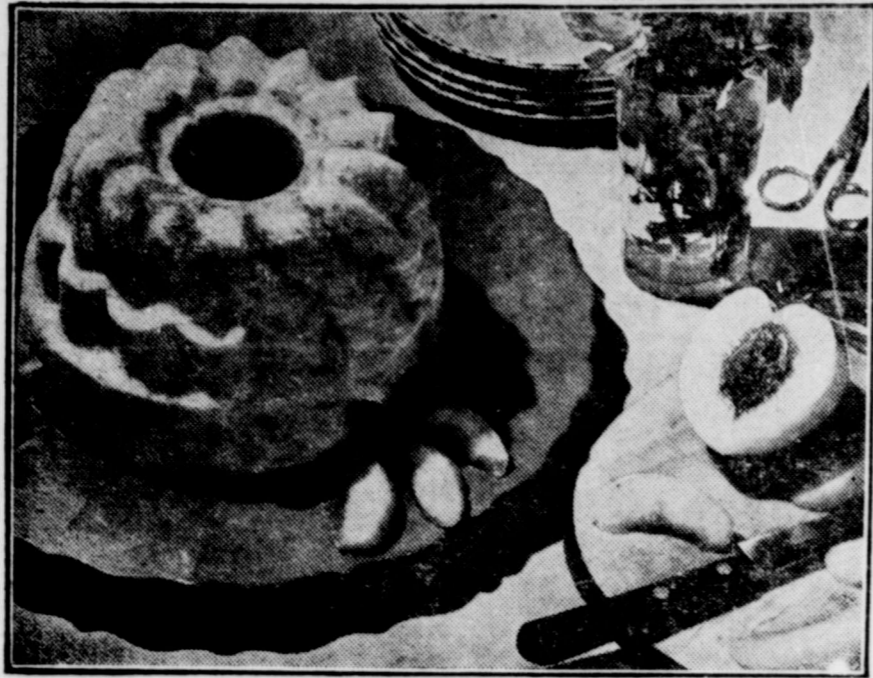

On SEPTEMBER 30, 1955

Cookies are in great demand these days—for the lunch box and after school snack. Here is a family favorite, a rich refrigerator type cooky with excellent keeping qualities.

- Chocolate Refrigerator Cookies**  
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1 cup butter or margarine  
1/2 cup Karo Syrup, Blue Label  
2/3 cup sugar, brown or granulated  
1 egg, beaten  
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup nuts, chopped
- Mix and sift together first three ingredients. Beat butter until soft and creamy. Add corn syrup and sugar, and beat until thoroughly blended. Add egg; blend well. Stir in melted chocolate, then vanilla and nuts. Add sifted dry ingredients; mix thoroughly. Chill dough about 1 hour. Shape into 2 rolls about 2 inches in diameter. Wrap in wax paper and chill in refrigerator at least 4 hours or overnight. With a very sharp knife, cut in thin slices. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 8 to 10 minutes. Make about 5 dozen.
- Variations:**  
**Butterscotch Cookies:** Omit chocolate from recipe.  
**Orange Coconut Cookies:** Follow recipe for Chocolate Refrigerator Cookies. Omit chocolate, substitute light corn syrup for dark corn syrup. Use granulated sugar. Stir in 2 tablespoons grated orange rind, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg and 1 cup coconut, chopped, before adding sifted dry ingredients.

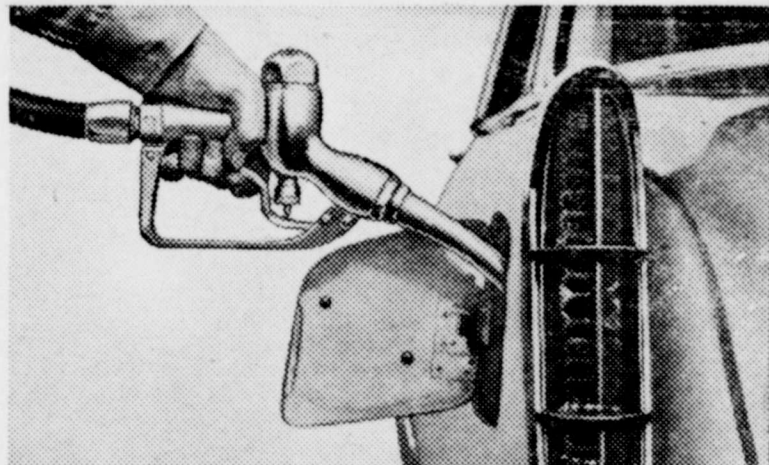

**WORKER SHOULD BE SURE OF HIS SOCIAL SECURITY ACCOUNT**

"The value of the social security account depends on the worker. Not just on how much earnings are credited to that account, but also on how the worker carries out his responsibility in keeping his account straight." This statement was made today by E. M. Bowers, manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"All social security benefits, whether they are retirement benefits after age 65 or survivors benefits to your family in case of death,—all benefits are based on your social security account. It follows that if your account is correct, the benefits will be correct."

"There are two things that happen occasionally," continued Mr. Bowers, "and when they do happen, they jeopardize the correctness of your social security account. The first is when the social security number is left off the return and the second is when the account number is incorrect, or perhaps the name reported is incorrect."

Both of these mistakes are usually caused by carelessness on the part of the employer or the worker. A little care in the beginning would assure the correctness of the account.

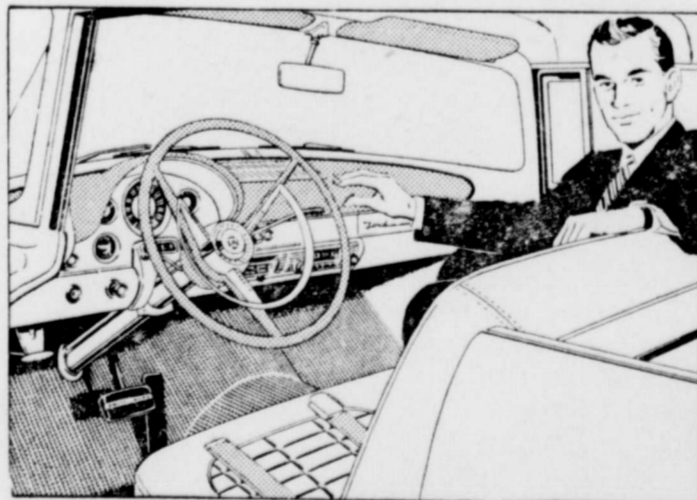

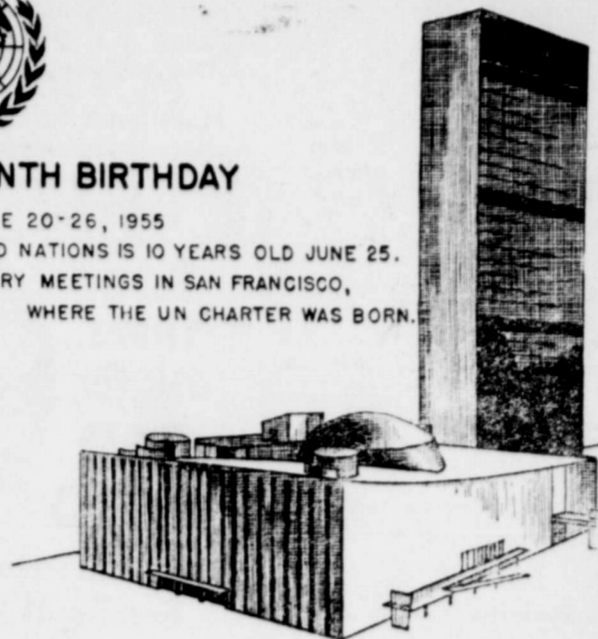

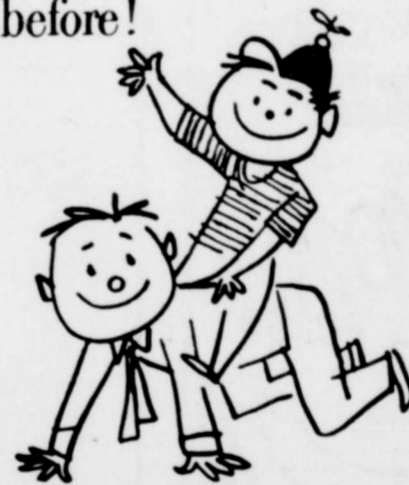

Turn bananas and sprinkle with coconut mixture. Return to broiler for about 2 minutes longer, to brown coconut lightly. Serve hot as meat accompaniment. Makes 4 servings.

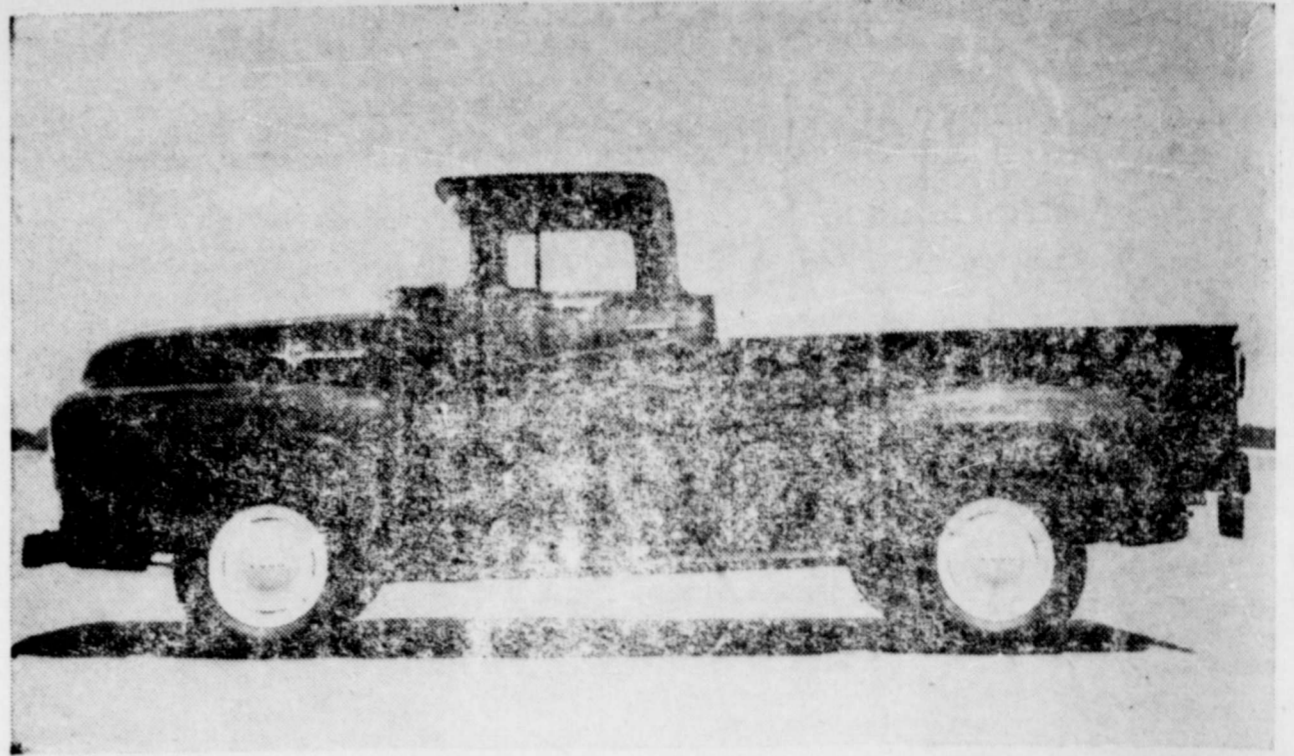

To show how other municipalities and public officers handle the interests of their constituents and taxpayers, your attention is called to the article "Lake View's Building Bond Issue Vote Set for Nov. 12", on page 1, of the San Angelo Standard-Times of last Tuesday morning, October 25, 1955. The following are excerpts from said article, with comments:

**FROM THE STANDARD-TIMES STORY—**

**COMMENTS—**

"A bond election asking approval of a \$250,000 building program in Lake View School District has been tentatively set for Nov. 12. During the two-hour session, trustees also unanimously:  
1. Accepted a bid of 2¾ to 3¾ per cent interest on the proposed bonds . . ."

(Within 2 hours after being sworn into office, the City Council of Sterling City sold our proposed bonds—and at an interest rate even they don't know—except that it cannot exceed 4¾ per cent.)

"2. Employed . . . as architect . . . at a fee of six per cent."

(Our City Council employed an Engineer, within 2 hours after they had been sworn into office, at a fee of 7½ per cent—without a blueprint, map, plan or anything else to show what he has proposed for you, the taxpayer.)

" . . . The proposed program calls for 5 classrooms and a cafeteria at Bradford Elementary, a science room . . . and a stadium and field house. . ."

(Our City Council has not found out yet—nor informed the taxpaying voters—how many blocks are to be watered or sewer—where they are to be located—or where the water is to come from—or where sewage disposal (phew!) plant is to be located.)

" . . . In the bond sale last night, the board accepted the combined offer of the four bond company representatives at the meeting. . ."

(At the first City Council Meeting, within two hours after taking oath of office, our councilmen accepted the pre-typed contract to sell our proposed bonds to the one election-sponsoring Bond House representative present—thereby eliminating all competition to force down the interest rates and manner of payments to be paid by the taxpayers.)

" . . . Based on a 34-year schedule, their proposal was 2½ percent interest from 1956 through 1965, 3½ percent from 1966 through 1975 and 3¾ percent from 1976 through 1989. . ."

(All our City Council knows and the taxpayers who have to pay what the Council signed, is that interest is to be future agreed upon, but shall not exceed 4¾ per cent—and with no competition, how can the City Council talk it down very much)

" . . . A 20 year redemption option is included . . ."

(Our City Council forgot to look out for the Sterling City taxpayer there, for no similar provision is contained in the contract signed by them—so don't dream too much of paying these bonds off early and avoiding interest for the remainder of the 30-35 years, even if money could then be gotten at a much cheaper interest rate.)

" . . . Bonds would be retired at a rate. . ."

(Shucks, nobody knows, so why comment on this!)

If you doubt the accuracy of these comments, demand of any of the City Council the right to see and read the Contract submitted and executed by Henry, Seay & Black (By Ransom Gallorey), and accepted and approved on September 14, 1955, by official action of the City of Sterling City, Texas, through its mayor and attested to by its Secretary.
