

Bowers explained, "This social security credit will mean much to farm and ranch families. Suppose we take the case of a young and prosperous farmer or rancher with a wife and child. His earnings up to \$4200 a year are taxable for social security. In the event he should die soon after the close of his second crop year under social security and had made the maximum of \$4200 in both years, the widow and small child would receive a monthly benefit of \$162.80.

During the drouth years, a few farmers or ranchers make \$4200 a year, Bowers continued. "Let us consider an instance where the farmer makes \$1200 a year on an average. The Seventh Grade History Club met last Friday, with president Barbara Clark presiding. Officers of the club are as follows:





Frozen Lime Pudding

11/3 cups (1 15-oz. can) sweetened condensed milk

- cup lime juice 1 teaspoon grated lime rind
- 2 eggs, separated 1/4 cup sugar

Set refrigerator control at coldest point. In a mixing bowl, com-bine condensed milk, lime juice, lime rind and egg yolks; stir until mixture thickens. Beat egg whites until almost stiff enough to hold a peak. Add sugar gradually, beating until stiff, but not dry. Slowly pour condensed milk mixture over beaten egg white, folding in carefully. Pour mixture into refrigerator tray. Place in freezing compartment and freeze until firm, about 2 to 3


