But the proposed amendment would apportion the presidential vote of each State according to the popular vote. The chief effect would be to make every vote cast for President count.

Here is an example of how the proposed vote would work out: A State has. let us say, 12 electoral votes (depends on the number of Senators and Representatives), and has a turnout of 2.4 million voters. The Republican got 1.6 million, the Democrat 600,000 and a third party candidate 200,000.

Under the present system, the Republican would get ALL 12 electoral votes. Under the new system each would get his proportional share—the Republican 8, the Democrat 3 and the third-party candidate



CVER try a packaged hot L roll mix as the easy base for a rich fruit tea ring? Saves time and produces first-class results. This recipe makes two 7-inch rings.

Maraschino Tea Ring

One 141/4-ounce package hot roll mix, 1/2 cup mint jelly, 1 cup dried apricots, chopped; 1 cup chopped maraschino cherries, well drained (about 40 cherries); 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine.

Prepare roll mix according to package directions. When dough is ready to shape, divide into 2 equal portions.

Roll out half of the dough on lightly floured surface to a 14x8inch rectangle, about 1/4-inch

Spread with half of jelly and sprinkle with half of apricots, cherries and walnuts. Dot with 1 tablespoon butter or margarine. Roll up, jelly-roll fashion, and

Shape into a ring on lightly greased baking sheet. Seal ends of ring. With kitchen shears, make cuts two-thirds of the way through ring at 1-inch intervals. Turn each section on its side. Let rise until double in bulk (about 30 minutes).

Meanwhile, prepare another ring with remaining dough and remaining ingredients. Bake rings in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 30 minutes, or until
