





American educational methods have long been practiced overseas, but in no area have they been more successful than in the Middle East. In the countries of the Arab World there are fourteen colleges and schools operated and financed by Americans. The colleges have an influence far beyond the borders of the nations in which they are located, because young people from all over the region come to learn and, returning home, infuse new ideas and concepts into their own societies.

The best known of the American institutions is the American University of Beirut in Lebanon. Founded in 1866 in a rented stone house as the Syrian Protestant College by American missionaries, the school had a great effect in stimulating Arab minds from the start. While Christian in spirit, A. U. B. has never tried to proselyte its students. As the institution has grown through the years (it became a university in 1920) it has become the largest American educational plant outside the continental limits of the country.

The first addition to a liberal arts and science curriculum was a School of Medicine, established in 1867. Schools of Nursing, Pharmacy, and Commerce soon followed. Later the School of Engineering and the School of Agriculture were started. Enrollment today numbers more than 3,000 young men and women, from 51 countries and twenty different religious sects. To care for them and a faculty of 359, the little stone house has been replaced by fifty buildings, on a seventy-acre campus at the western end of Beirut.

International College, whose campus adjoins A. U. B.'s, is affiliated with the university and serves as its preparatory school. This institution has an elementary division, which prepares young people for a Lebanese certificate, a preparatory division, which prepares for the Lebanese government examinations and entrance into the freshman class of A. U. B., and a "section secondaire," which trains for the Lebanese and French baccalaureate and entrance to the sophomore class of A. U. B. Almost 1,400 students are currently enrolled.

Syria has two institutions, Damascus College and Aleppo College. In Iraq are the Eaghdad College for Boys and the American School for Girls.

With education on the march all through the Arab World, American institutions are an important leaven in an area where trained leadership is prized. The students of today will, in all probability, be the leaders of government and private enterprise tomorrow.
