COMMUNITY CENTER RULES AND REGULATIONS OUTLINED BY COMMITTEE

The Community Center committee, set up by the Lions Club and given authority to do so, have set up the rules and regulations governing the operation of the center and such rules will be posted and adhered to by all who are concerned—such as users of the center and the hostess, etc.

The rules and regulations are as follows:

1. All persons who wish to use Center will make appointment with follows:

2. Center will be open for use Monday through Saturday. In event any church desires use of Center on Sunday, Hostess will not be responsible for supervision or cleaning that day.

3. In event more than one engagement in Community Center in one day or night, the parties involved in the first occasion will be held responsible in helping clean up Center, getting ready for second party. (There will be at least 2 hours between engagements—for clean-up.)

4. All parties, meetings, etc., must be properly chaperoned, and in no case will meetings be held later than 12 o'clock at night.

5. In event there is a conflict in use of Center for two parties, the priority will go to any young people's gathering provided they have planned the occasion, and spoken for the Center on or about the same day.

6. There will be no use of intoxicating beverages on or about the premises, and any damage resulting from any party will be paid for by that group before leaving.

7. Appointments will be kept in a register, showing date, time, sponsor and intended use. Same information will be written on calendar inside entrance, and any conflict in dates will be the responsibility of the hostess.

8. Use of Center for dancing classes, etc, is encouraged, but if some group schedules a party that conflicts with these classes, the priority will go to the group planning a party.

9. The kitchen is a part of the Community Center and will be used by all when needed, but must be left in good order before the party or meeting adjourns.

10. Any complaint concerning use of center will be turned in to the committee.

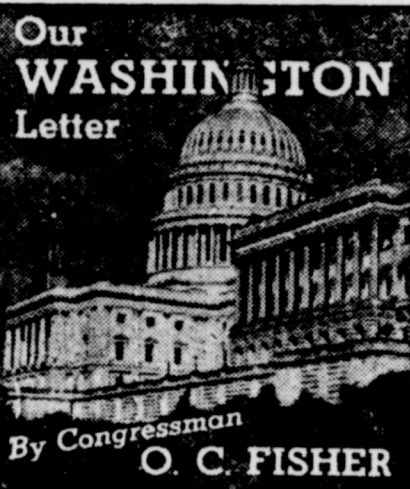
All requests for use of Center will be made by an adult sponsor, who will be present at meeting or party.

12. Hostess will live in building and will be present in the building during all parties and meetings, or will have an adult representative in his or her place, if absent.

13. All rules and regulations are subject to revision and change, but must be brought to the attention of the Lion's Club Committee for their revision and change.

A KERRVILLE HOUSEWIFE inquires: "Just what is meant by 'interposition', is it legal, and has it ever been practiced before?"

Interposition is a form of orderly, lawful resistance to encroachment upon basic rights; is usually employed by states in opposition to federal encroachment upon rights and sovereignty reserved to them by the Constitution.

Regardless of whether its employment at a given time is desirable or ill-advised, the fact remains that interposition is a legitimate democratic process.

It is nothing new. Indeed, it was strongly advocated by Jefferson, who joined with Madison in 1798 in preparing resolutions for the legislatures of Kentucky and Virginia which declared that when the Federal Government exceeded its constitutional authority, it was the duty of the states to "interpose their authority."

Interposition was first—and successfully—asserted by the State of Georgia against a decision rendered by the Supreme Court in 1793. The result was the adoption of the 11th amendment to the Constitution, which established the right that the Georgia interposition had contended for.

THIS DOCTRINE OF RESISTANCE to abuses and encroachments has been given new life and meaning in recent years because of a succession of rather strange decisions handed down by the Supreme Court, gnawing at the rights reserved to the states in the 10th amendment. Were Jefferson alive today he would undoubtedly be a fiery defender of the right on the part of states to invoke interposition.

Indeed, it is said that in the last 20 years the Supreme Court has reversed more established Constitutional constructions than were changed by that Court in all the preceding years of its history. And mostly at the expense of Constitutional states' rights.

A recent Supreme Court doctrine of pre-emption—holding that a state law is invalid if there is a different federal law on the same subject (even though the states have a constitutional right to legislate on the matter, is giving rise to deep concern on the part of Jeffersonian states' righters.

Just last week Idaho's attorney general, Graydon W. Smith, speaking for the National Association of Attorneys General, called for legislation to outlaw that theory of pre-emption, except when expressly stated in the law. Thus, he and his associates are employing a form of interposition in resistance to that line of alleged judicial abuses.

"If the theory of pre-emption is not curtailed by Congress", warned Graydon, "local and state government activities and jurisdiction

Bomb Clearing Crews Here
 The Army Engineers have a unit here in Sterling City clearing away the old practice bombs that were used by bombers in World War II. Major Dallas Lynch, head of the unit, said the group would be stationed in Sterling City for about two months. They are presently engaged completing the clearance of the Big Spring and Midland ranges. Lynch said an average of 10,000 bombs are recovered from each range with an average of 3 to 4% of them still "hot."

Sunday morning worship will be at 11 o'clock June 3. All members are urged to be present at Sunday School and church.

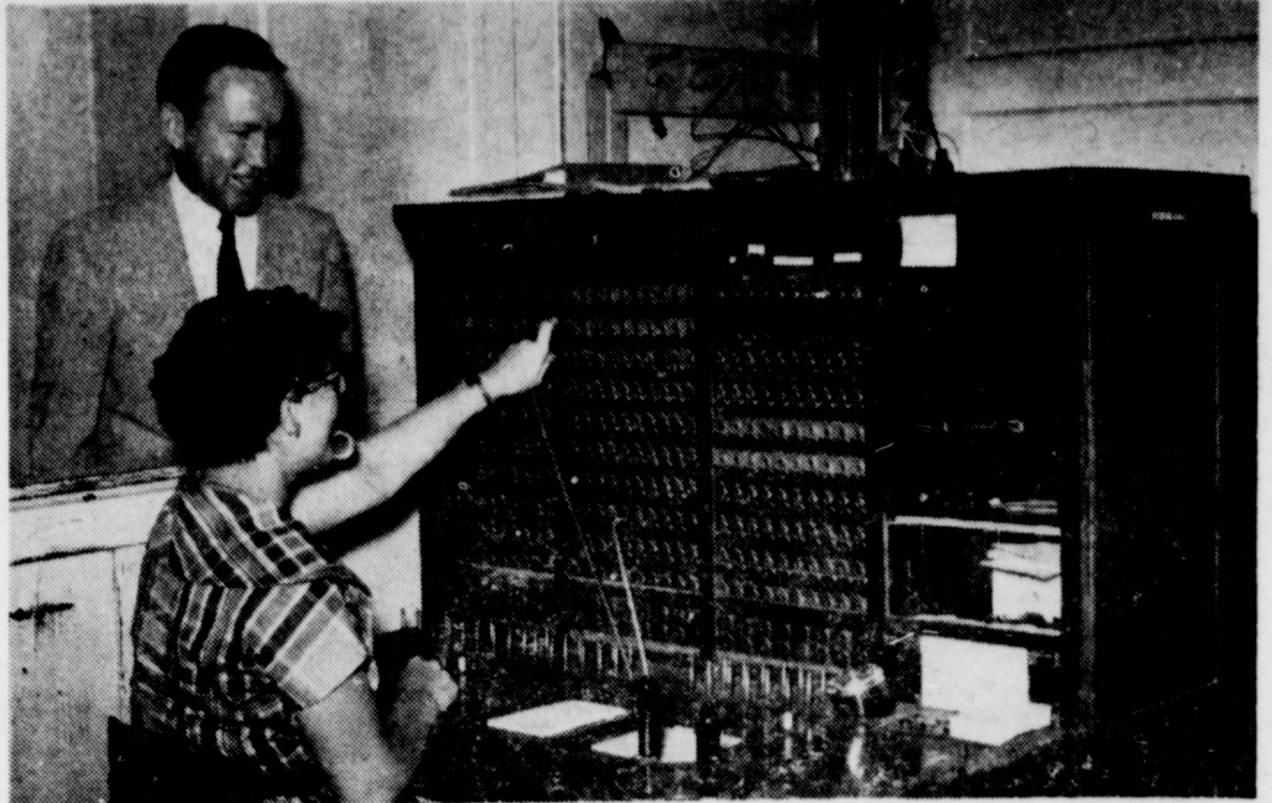
Installation services for the new pastor will be held June 10 at 7:30 p.m.
