Under that theory, state sedition laws, labor relations laws, etc., are automatically quashed by laws on such ically quashed by laws on such topics enacted by Congress, even though the federal laws do not so state such to be the intention of Congress.

Pending bills simply provide that if Congress intends to nullify state laws it should say so and not have its intent presumed by the Courts: preserving, however, the supreme authority of Federal Courts, in case of conflict between State and Federal laws

HEARINGS ON these bills have been held in both House and Senate, but committees are dragging their feet on reporting them for floor action.
