

Our Nation is blest with a chairman of that committee, Howard Smith of Virginia, who has his feet on the ground and is trying to hold the line against crackpot schemes which clamor for programming, separating the good from the bad. But he can do just so much. Too many of our moderates and conservatives jump the traces when the chips are down and go off in every direction.

The housing bill includes \$11 bilion worth of socialized housing units, a politically-inspired program whereby Uncle Sam builds houses, rents them at less than half price. It serves as a political bonanza for many big city politicians. Public housing has long since served any legitimate and useful purpose it ev-

But experience shows that many so-called conservatives are wont to throw in the sponge at the last minute and respond supinely to the whip-lash of party leadership. The result: more and more socialized housing, and increased public debt, less chance for tax relief.





In accepting his new office, Mr. Linen said: "Last year's campaigns were the most successful in history. A record \$340 million was contributed in 1955 through United Funds and Community Chests. The United Way of doing this job saves time and money for volunteers and business, and also provides more services for more people at less cost."

Linen has been a vice president of TIME, Inc. since 1949. He became publisher of TIME in November, 1945, after a wartime stint with OWI. As publisher, Linen coordinates the activities of the editorial, advertising, circulation, promotion, production and distribution departments of the magazine.

Linen takes part in a variety of civic, educational and philanthropic activities. He has long been active in the Community Chest in Greenwich, Connecticut, where he resides with his wife and six children. He is a director

of the Greenwich Hospital and serves on the boards of the Cordell Hull Foundation for International Education, The Hotchkiss School, Adelphi College, Athens College in Greece, Episcopal Churchnews, Boys' Clubs of America and the United States Council of the International Chamber of Commerce.

Working for united funds and other community organizations runs in the Linen family. His father is a former president and trustee of the United Community Chest of Scranton, Pennsylvania, and his sister, Mrs. Robert Connell, is the president of the Welfare Council of Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania.

River Jordan Rolls From Mt. Hermon to Dead Sea

The sacred River Jordan rises in the sweet snows of Mount Hermon in Southern Syria, plunges downward for 82 miles in a series of corkscrew turns and comes to its fate in the bitter waters of the Dead Sea, lowest spot on earth, in southern Jordan, one of the Bible Lands.

Formed by the union of four small streams, the Jordan proper finds its source in Lake Huleh, broadens out into the Sea of Galilee and twists and turns like a great muddy serpent on a total course of 200 miles as it falls 2,300 feet to its mouth through the Jordan Rift, the world's greatest natural depression.

Known to the ancient Hebrews as the "River that goes down" and to the Arabs as "The Drinking Place," the Jordan is perhaps the most celebrated river in history due to its association with the Bible. The Greeks and Romans built their empires and the Crusaders and Moslems fought many a fierce battle on or near its banks.

From high on Mt. Nebo Moses looked down upon the Jordan as he peered into Canaan. Joshua led the children of Israel across it after the fall of Jericho. Gideon achieved victory over the Midianites within its folds. David fled over it to escape the wrath of his enemies. Christ was baptized in its waters as the "Beloved Son" by John the Baptist. His disciples fished in it and Mary Magdalena lived alongside its banks.

Oasis in the Wilderness



ANCIENT JERICHO: The Town of Jericho is one of the oldest settlements in the world, if not the oldest, and is among the memorable sights of the Kingdom of Jordan, one of the Bible Lands. Jericho was a flourishing town 6,000 year B.C. when other communities were small villages. The ruins of the Walled Town made famous by Joshua and his trumpets are still visible (Josh 6.4). Here is shown a verdant orange grove, guarded by waving palm trees and set in an oasis watered by a gurgling stream. In the background is the Mount of Temptation where Jesus spent 40 days and nights resisting the wiles of Satan. Barely visible between the palms is a small Greek-Orthodox monastery built into the cliffs. Not far away is the Dead Sea and the River Jordan where the Savior was baptized. This easis is now blanketed with the flowers and blooms of springtime.
