





Dead Sea Draws Visitors As World's Lowest Spot

The mysterious Dead Sea, lowest body of water in the world, is slowly coming to life again under the impact of travel.

Located in Southern Jordan, one of the Bible Lands the Dead Sea has shrunk from pre-historic times to its present size of 47 miles by 10 miles. Its surface is 1,300 feet below the Mediterranean and its waters are fed from a single source, the River Jordan. The water flowing in has no outlet so evaporation carries it off in eerie, blue-white clouds that linger over the landscape.

Before tourists sampled the briny sea, there was no life about except for gulls plucking dead fish lying on the surface. Even fish, entering from the River Jordan, could not live in the high salt content of the sea. This content, between 23 and 25

per cent, is four times as high as other seas.

The only signs of life are dead fossils from a pre-historic age when the sea was much larger in area and actually topped the Mediterranean in height. But, in the memory of man, no life has stirred there. Greek writers started calling it, "The

Dead Sea," but the Arabs were more graphic, calling the eerie place the "Stinking Sea" or "Sea of Overwhelming."

But now there are searches underway probing the thousand-foot-depth minerals. And each year brings larger flocks of tourists to picnic on its shores and to wade into the water, the salt content of which buoys up swimmers so their shoulders are constantly above water. When they leave the Dead Sea stays with them as considerable effort is necessary to scrub off the

Social Security Payments

Social security beneficiaries were receiving monthly checks at the Or If You're Scared rate of over 2 million dollars a year at the end of 1955 in the San Angelo district, according to figures just released by Ed Bowers, District Social Security Manager. The district is composed of 13 counties which includes Sterling county.

When announcing the figures, Bowers said that many persons still thought of the social security program as providing protection only for retired persons .He pointed out that, nationwide, at the end of 1955 there were 1,275,000 children under 18 getting monthly payments. Of these, 120,000 were children of a retired parent, and the others were hildren of a deceased parent. About 300,000 mothers of children nder 18 also were receiving bene-

"With the bringing in of many roups of employed and self-emloyed persons previously excluded, he social security system achieved lmost universal coverage at the befinning of 1955". Bowers said. He ointed out that 68 million persons ad taxable earnings under the program in 1955, and that 70 milon were insured at the end of the year. Of this number, 32 million re permanently insured and can ualify for benefits at 65, regardess of future employment. Also in case of death, their survivors can ualify for payments.

WHILE BURNING OIL is played on stairways and other key spots in the ruins by a remote control panel, students at the national rescue school enter the flaming structures and actually rescue the volunteer "victims.
Some "victims" pretend

unconsciousness. Others simulate situations the rescue workers would meet in an actual civil defense disaster by becoming "hysterical," and even by kicking and fighting their would-be "rescu-

Seldom, however, do professional rescue instructors standing by actually have to enter the ruins to help out their students during the "final exam" of the two-week course. And never are the volunteer victims actually in danger, for they have been placed in areas known to be safe from the hidden flaming oil jets.

Between-Meal Refresher

Cool, refreshing milk drinks made with rennet powder are especially popular in summer as between-meal snacks or at mealtime. They are nourishing, yet not filling. And, thanks to the magic of the rennet enzyme, these milk drinks are more easily digested.

A rennet milk drink is made without adding sugar since rennet powder is already sweetened. choose from too - vanilla, chocolate, strawberry, maple, lemon, orange and raspberry - a flavor to suit every taste. What an excellent way to increase the appetite appeal of milk!

Rennet milk drinks are so easy to make that even the youngest children can prepare them. The recipe below is for a single serving, but one package of rennet powder will make a whole quart. Why not keep a pitcherful ready in the refrigerator? It's an excellent drink any time of year for everyone in the family.

Recipe

Stir 1 tablespoon rennet powder* into a glass of cold milk. Mix until sugar is completely dissolved. Serve immediately. *Use 1 rounded tablespoon chocolate rennet powder.

For a "frosted" milk drink, serve with a scoop of ice cream.


