## Democratic Primary Election Saturday

The Democratic Primary election will be held in Texas on Saturday, July 28. This primary election is almost the same as election for all Texas Democrats. Winners of the primary election are nearly always elected to office in the general election in November.

### Returns Posted Saturday Night

Sterling County returns on the election results will be posted on boards in front of the West Texas Utilities Co. office, it was said by Democratic County chairman Jack Douthit. The results will be posted as soon as the election judges can phone in their box results. Judges are urged to phone in results to the Utilities Company office as soon as possible.

### Precinct Conventions Saturday

All precincts in the county should hold precinct conventions Saturday afternoon and elect delegates to the county convention, reminded the chairman. The county convention will be held a week later on Saturday, August 4.

## Thunderbird Jets To Put On Flying Show Exhibition

WEBB AFB, Texas, July 23—The THUNDERBIRDS, flying in the new supersonic F-100, will stage an aerial demonstration August 2nd at 9:00 a.m. at Webb Air Force Base at Big Spring, Texas. "Open House" at Webb begins at 8:00 a.m. and the public is invited to attend.

Flying in tight formation, the Thunderbirds will perform such daring maneuvers as their famous "Bomb Burst", barrel rolls, loops, "cork-screws" and many other precision acrobatics, all of which are based on training received in the flying training program, coupled with fighter tactics used in combat by USAF units throughout the world.

The Super Sabre, or F-100, has a wing sweepback of 45 degrees, 10,000 pounds of thrust. It is capable of reaching and maintaining a supersonic speed, reach an altitude of 50,000 feet with a range of over 1,000 miles.

The Thunderbirds have thrilled millions of spectators in more than 200 performances in the United States, 12 Central and South American countries, during their three years of operations.

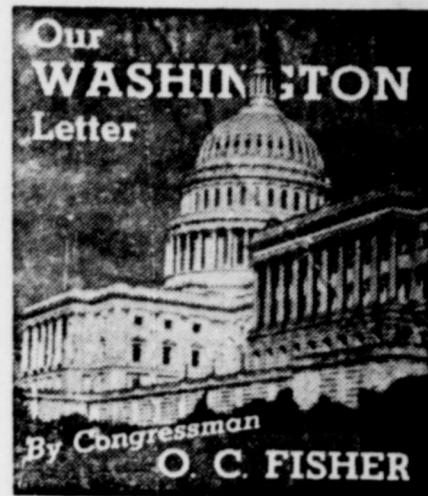

In a last minute desperate appeal for the Negro vote in November, the politicians forced the House to spend all of last week on a civil rights bill which would have taken away more civil rights than it even pretended to protect.

The philosophy behind the measure was that the white folks against whom most of its provisions were aimed, would not be offended (since it will not become law, anyhow) and the Negroes would be "set on fire" at election time by the vote-catching ingredients which sets them up into a sort of privileged class of Americans.

In fact, Congressman Joe Martin, Republican leader in the House, frankly admitted during debate that the measure was political and he mentioned the November election. Both Northern Democrats and Republicans were running over each other trying to claim major credit for what was in the bill.

As expected—and intended—the bill will die in the Senate.

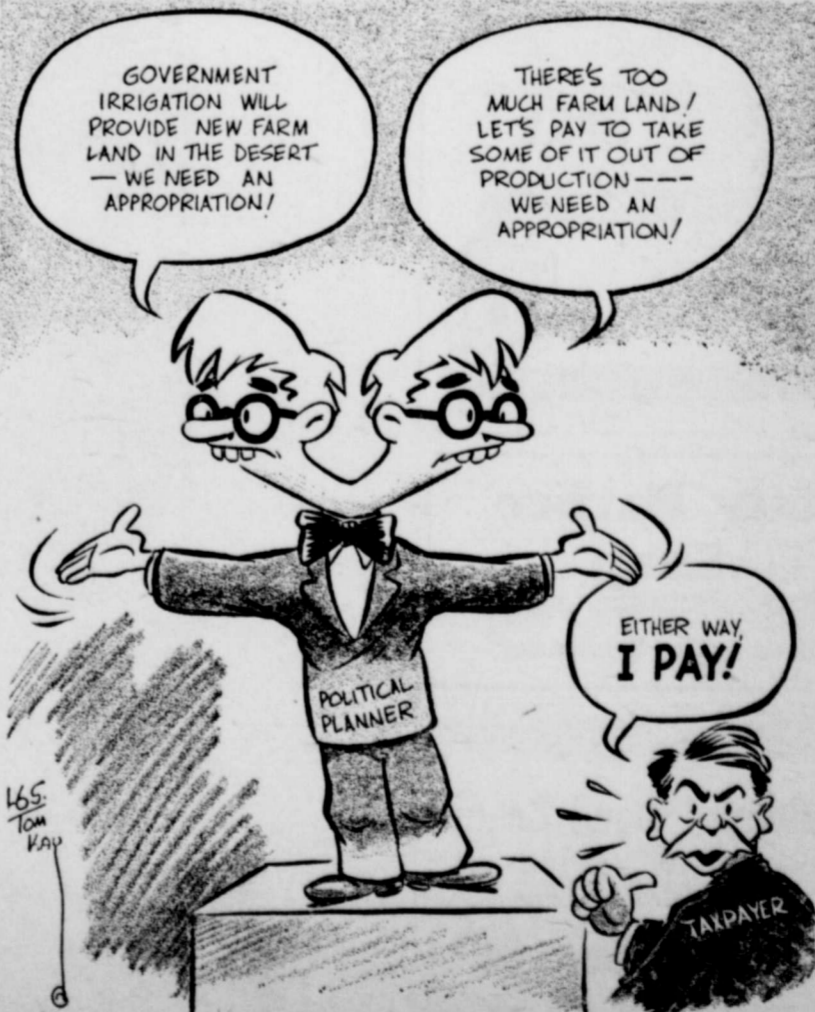
