

# **Old Cairo** Attracts **Droves Of Visitors To Modern Skyline**

Cairo, capital of Egypt and metropolis of the Bible Lands, is an eight square mile city of 2,100,000 people, the largest in Africa and the Arab World. It is surrounded on all sides by sand but watered by the River Nile, which brings life to its magnificent gardens and palm groves. Ancient Cairo-the name means "victorious"-dates back more than 1,300 years to the time of the Arab conquest of the Mediterranean world under the banner of Islam.

As a tourist center Cairo attracts thousands of visitors a year who come to see the Pyramids, the beautiful mosques, the Tut-Ank-Amen treasures at the Egyptian Museum, and to shop in Cairo's famous Musky bazaar. There are modern hotels to house about 3,000 persons, and with the completion of the new Shepheard's Hotel and the Nile Hilton Hotel, now under construction, hotel accommodations will be considerably increased. Cairo has some sixteen museums and palaces to visit, more than eighty important mosques and Arab monuments and a score of Christian churches and monasteries, dating back to the early days of Christianity.

Three major Egyptian Universities with an enrollment of more than 35,000 students are located in Cairo and there are many other colleges and technical schools, including the American University of Cairo. Cairo has an Academy of Oriental Music, a Society of Arts, which has frequent showings of modern painting and sculpture and an Opera House. The winter season brings to Cairo annually an Italian Opera Company, a ballet and the Comedie Francaise from Paris.

Cairo is a city of beautiful squares, spacious parks and a cool, tree-shaded drive along the Nile, where tall masted feluccas skim the waters in stately silence, their huge sails billowing in the breeze. Cairo's Zoo has many rare animals and its tropical gardens many exotic plants and flowers. Town planning is one of the projects of the New Egypt and a long range plan for Cairo is well under way. Traffic is being regulated, parking areas provided, and many streets resurfaced. Two large produce markets are planned to expedite of foodstuffs and the delivery provide for their refrigeration. Cairo's distinguishing landmark is the Citadel, which overlooks the city from one of the ridges of the Mokattam Hills. It was first built by the Crusader hero, Saladine. On its broad plaza is the Mohammed Ali Mosque, its great dome and tall minarets rising skyward, a contemporary symbol of Egypt's antiquity.







Here is a recipe for wonderful, tender pastry that can be made quickly and easily into perfectly shaped tart and pie shells. Use it in preparing a wide assortment of mouth watering summer desperts for your family and friends.



No-Roll Pastry Tart Shells 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons sugar 1¼ teaspoons salt cup Mazola Oil 3 tablespoons milk

Sift dry ingredients into medium bowl. Combine salad oil and milk in measuring cup. Whip with fork and pour all at once over flour mixture. Mix with fork until completely dampened. Di-vide pastry into 8 medium tart pans. Press evenly and firmly with fingers to line bottom of pan; then press dough up to line sides and partly cover rim. Be sure dough is pressed to uniform thickness. To flute, pinch dough lightly with fingers. Do not use a high fluted edge. Prick bottom and sides. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool; then remove care-fully before filling. Fill shells with prepared pie filling mix, preserves, or sweetened fresh fruit, topped with whipped cream.

Mr. Kellis was always hunting Indian artifacts and he dug up the grave in his quest - and found the old cup. It had been awarded to someone in a horse show back east and some Indian had acquired it. It was a treasure to the Indian and as such, was buried with him.

The Indian had been killed by a rifle ball in back of his skull. The gun (metal part) was found nearby and used by a camp cook as a fire stake for many years thereafter, said Kellis.



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amended by adding after Section 11 there-of a new Section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows: "Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in first lien real estate mort-gage securities guaranteed in any manner in whole by the United States Government or any agency thereof and in such cor-poration bonds, preferred stocks and com-mon stocks as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may deem to be proper investments for said fund; and the interest and dividends accruing from the securities listed in Section 11 and Section 11a, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of prin-cipal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropria-tion by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution. In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall excuss the provail-ing which men of ordinary prudence, dis-cretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, con-


