

FALL CATTLE MOVEMENT UNDER WAY EARLY?

FORT WORTH-Numbers of cattle and calves being moved in the Southwest indicate that the Fall movement is underway from 30 to 90 days ahead of normal shipping dates, in the opinion of many observers at Fort Worth this week. Rail car movements of cattle out

of principal grass areas lend strength to this belief, and the runs at Fort Worth's Stockyards in the past few weeks have been well ahead of the same interval last

The situation is not limited to Texas alone. Conditions in the Flint Hills of Kansas and the Osage of Oklahoma recently have lead to some early movement out of these sections. Unless conditions change abruptly the general exodus from those areas will be under way at least a month ahead of normal shipping dates.

Dry conditions are blamed for the situation and all observers agree that to avert serious price breaks the livestock producers will have to stay in close touch and avoid excessive bunching of shipments.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23
proposing an amendment to Section 9 of
Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas


