#### Fire Fillers

The first President to proclaim a full week in observance of fire prevention was Warren G. Harding in 1922.

Sparks on flammable roofs last year caused 13,300 building fires and over \$9 million damage according to estimates of the National Fire Protection Association. The increased use of fire re-

tardant roofing such as asphalt and asbestos shingles, slate and tile, is credited by fire protection authorities as being one of the principal safeguards against citywide conflagrations once so common in America.

Children left alone and trapped by fire accounted for one out of every three child fire victims last year in this country, estimates the National Fire Protection Association.

The greatest number of people ever killed in a single fire in this country was 1152 when a forest fire wiped out the town of Pesh-tigo, Wisconsin on October 9, 1871—the same day of the great Chicago fire.





### Fire Losses At Record High



The United States in 1955 experienced its worst "fire" year in history, reports the National Fire Protection Association. Fire last year cost the country \$1,140,768,000 in direct loss, the international fire safety group estimated.

This was nearly \$120,000,000 more than the previous record high in 1953. A very large increase in the number of building the safety state of the NFPA.

This latest sharp rise in fire losses continues the upward trend of recent years as shown in the graph above. Apparently 1954 was only a temporary deflection of that trend.

Here's a fable for Fire Prevention Week:

FITCHBURG, MASSACHUSETTS - Fire snuffed out the lives of 11,475 men, women and children here and severely burned or disfigured for life 30,000 others. Total population is 43,000.

No, it didn't happen in Fitchburg, Mass., or in any other city or town in the United States — not at once. But it did happen in these United States last year — in cities, towns, villages and hamlets from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the

Rio Grande to the Canadian border; in a 12-month period.

The figures are correct—11,475 dead by fires, 30,000 more injured; 31 dead by fires every day. These are National Fire Protection

Speculate on the possibility of a city of 43,000 being swept by fire, suffering 12,000 deaths, 30,000 injuries. A horrible catastrophe. Is it any worse if the 12,000 needless deaths are spread over 365 days? Do 31 fatalities per day by fire lessen the shock and the

One death by fire is one too many.

This is to look for the seal of approval of the American Wood Window Institute affixed to each window frame.

At a series of meetings held for officials of 70 regional FHA offices, it was explained that the AWUI seal "makes it possible to be sure at a glance that high standards of workmanship have been met or exceeded," according to Practical Builder magazine.

The seal certifies that the window has been made according to a Commercial Standard of the a Commercial Standard of the U.S. Department of Commerce. It is now being applied only to double-hung windows, but plans are being made to extend the certification to awning, sliding, and casement windows as soon as appropriate standards have been prepared.

FHA's interest in the seal lies in the fact that the agency has the power to grant a higher mortgage insurance commitment when a house is built with materials that exceed minimum FHA requirements.

Practical Builder explains that the seal assures a purchaser that the window has been made of properly dried lumber, that it is satisfactorily weatherstripped, that it has been treated with a water-repellent chemical, that the sash operate easily, and that the frame is accurately machined and free of defects.
