

GOVERNOR FROWNS ON LIVESTOCK SALES TAX

FORT WORTH-Gov. Price Daniel told newspaper men last week that he did not favor any kind of "transactions tax" on livestock sales and legislative representatives in Austin reported they considered a bill proposing ten cents per head check-off on cattle sold through auction rings or terminal markets would probably never be intro-

Governor Daniel said, "Our farmers and ranchers are having enough troubles now, and certainly I wouldn't consider loading them with any new taxes." He also professed to be unfamiliar with any bill which would project a livestock tax.

COUNTY TO HOLD BOND ELECTION HERE FEBRUARY 23

The county will have a \$145,000 bond election here on February 23. The bond issue was called by the Commissioners Court and a statement of facts and information is to be mailed to all residents next week, giving the reasons for the need of such bond issue.

The letter to be mailed is as fol-

Concerning the Special Election on the voting of \$145,000 Sterling County Farm-to-Market Road Bonds Dear Citizen:

In order that you may know and understand the purposes of and the reasons for the voting of the \$145,-000 of Farm-to-Market Road Bonds on the 23rd day of February, 1957, we, your County Judge and Commissioners' Court wish to give you the following information and facts:

The bonds, if voted and issued can not increase your County tax rate, because they will be paid from the 30 cent Farm-to-Market Tax which was voted on July 31, 1951 by a vote of 70 to 2. It is estimated that about one-half of this tax will be needed to pay off the bonds.

The money from the sale of the bonds is to be used over a period of 2 to 21/2 years, for the construction, improvements and maintenance of Farm to Market, or lateral roads and bridges; also, for right of way expenses.

During this 2 to 21/2 years, all other income to the road and bridge funds of the County will be used to pay off the present road and bridge indebtedness incurred during the last few years. The present payments on this indebtedness is leaving us sufficient money with which to operate, and maintain approximately 500 miles of unpaved lateral roads.

estimated 7,500,000 pints of whole blood, 2,000,000 bottles of albumin and 5,500,000 bottles of blood "expanders" during the first three weeks after attack. By mid-1957, FCDA expects to have enough blood derivatives and plasma volume "expanders" stored to provide for 41/4 million
