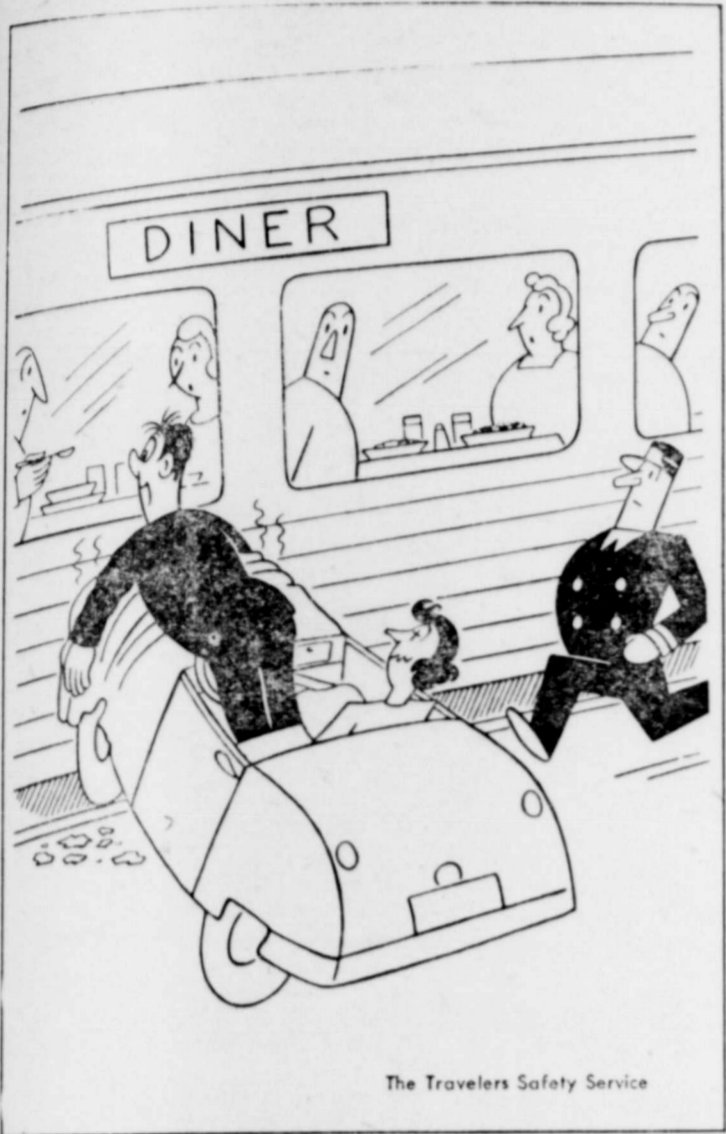
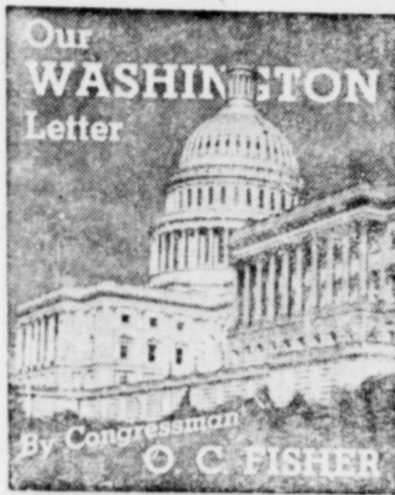
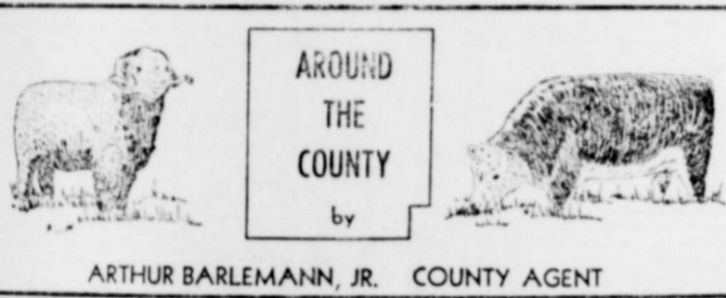


Heedless Horsepower by O. Soglow

BY A FIVE-VOTE margin, the House last week killed the controversial multi-billion dollar Federal aid school construction bill. I joined with every other Texas member in defeating the measure, after an amendment had been tacked on prohibiting any aid to segregated schools.

This thing was fraught with danger. It could easily have been the opening wedge for federalizing education in America and giving the central government some control over what is one of the last strongholds of local democracy—the education of the youth. Surely, surely local people can chip in and build their own school houses without looking to Washington on the Potomac, faced with a \$276 billion public debt, a tight budget, and a need for some tax relief for the American people.

A GOOD MANY PEOPLE are writing me about the Supreme Court, and what can be done to curb its abuses of judicial powers. A lot of people now think of the Supreme Court as making new laws by the decisions, rather than interpreting the laws enacted by the Congress. But what can be done about it?

I have drafted a resolution calling for a constitutional amendment which is designed to treat the disease rather than the symptoms. The basic trouble with that court is that most modern appointments are political—depending more on political philosophy rather than judicial capacity. I propose to let a Judge from each of the highest courts in the 48 states meet together and choose a man to fill a vacancy when one occurs, subject to Senate confirmation. Such appointments should be fairly free from political maneuvering, and should give us about the best judges that can be picked.

CATTLEMEN RESIST LOWER PRICES, MARKET BETTER

FORT WORTH—The sharp break in cattle and calf prices of a week ago met with firm resistance from cattlemen who have the best water and grass conditions in a long time. The movement of cattle and calves to Fort Worth was less than half the numbers offered for sale a week earlier.

Result of the hold-off was an uneven market, however, changes were all on the upside of the price schedule.

Slaughter calves and stocker and feeder cattle and calves rebounded sharply with 50 cents to \$1 per hundred higher prices. Cows were strong to 50 cents or more above the low close of last week. Bulls ruled steady. Fed steers and heifers were in small supply and were steady.

Good and choice slaughter yearlings and heifers sold from \$20 to \$25, and medium and lower grades bulked at \$13 to \$19.

Fat cows cashed at \$12.50 to \$14, with a few heiferish kinds to \$15. Cannons and cutters cashed at \$8 to \$12.50.

Bulls scored \$11 to \$15, a few to \$15.50. Good and choice slaughter calves ranged from \$18 to \$21, and common and medium offerings cashed at \$12 to \$17.50. Culls sold from \$10 to \$13.

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$19 to \$23, and stocker steer yearlings sold from \$21 down. Feeder steers weighing up to 900 pounds sold from \$20.50 down. A few replacement cows sold from \$10 to \$13.50. Estimated supply of cattle and calves here Monday was 3,800 cattle and calves compared to actual salable receipts a week earlier of 8,063.

SHEEP AND LAMBS SELL ON STRONG MARKET

The offerings of sheep and lambs cleared very early and prices were fully steady to stronger at Fort Worth Monday.

Top end of the price range got a rather poor test due to the very small numbers of high grade offerings in the run.

Good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$20 to \$22, and cull to medium lambs cashed at \$14 to \$19. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$15 to \$18.

Good slaughter yearling wethers sold at \$15 to \$17, and strictly choice kinds were quotable above that level. Cull to medium yearlings cashed at \$11 to \$15. Stocker yearling ewes sold from \$13 down.

Slaughter ewes sold from \$7 to \$8. Aged wethers drew \$13 down. Two-year-old wethers sold from \$15 down. Aged bucks drew \$5 to \$5.50.

HOGS STEADY TO 25 CENTS HIGHER, SOWS STEADY

Butcher hogs were steady to 25 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday. A few closely sorted meat type hogs scored \$22.75, and other choice hogs sold from \$22 to \$22.60. Medium to good hogs sold for \$18 to \$21.50. Sows sold for \$17.50 to \$19.50.

LANE TEXAS COMPANY GETS TEST WELL CONTRACT

The City Council of the City of Sterling City opened bids on test well and water well, elevated water storage tanks and water distributive system at a meeting here Tuesday afternoon. Fifty-eight persons were present at the opening of the bids, including interested bidders, city council men, the city secretary, interested citizens, and the consulting engineer, Hugh Dickson and Ransom Galloway, bond company representative.

There were twelve bids on the water distributing system, three on the elevated tank and three on the test well and water well.

The Lane Texas Co. had the low bid for the test well and water well. The city council decided to let a contract to that company for a test well only to see about the water supply. It is thought that a test well will be put down on a dead end street at the south end of the street down by Hubert Williams resident in the southwest part of town. The city owns the dead end street, thereby saving the cost of a site.

The three low bidders were kept on all bids and will be acted upon within the next thirty days, said John Walraven, mayor. He and City Councilman, said that it looked very much like the system could be built well within the limits of the money available.

Consulting engineer Hugh Dickson read the bids at the meeting. Among those bidding on the test well and the 8-inch water well included Clevis W. Smith, local driller, Lane Texas Co., and Irrigation Well Service of Abilene and Kent and Preston of Abilene.

Bidders on the 50,000 gallon elevated storage tank were Chicago Bridge and Iron Co. They bid \$31,920 for the tank as specified and \$28,750 on a tripod job. The Pittsburgh Des Moines Steel Co. bid \$29,950 for the tank as specified and \$24,550 on an alternate tank set-up. The Water Tank Service of Dallas bid \$17,645 on a 50,000 used tank that has been in use for 3 years in Dumas, Texas. Dumas is getting a larger tank, it was said.

The bids on the distributive system had alternates as to asbestos cement pipe, cast iron pipe and/or galvanized pipe. Bids ranged from \$73,000 up to \$123,000, depending on the pipe specified. Only the 3 low bids will be considered and action will be taken soon on those bids, it was said. Outcome of the test well is being awaited.

Rowe Construction Co. of Farr, Tex.; Rhodes Construction Co. of Dallas; Panhandle Construction Co. of Lubbock; Austin Engineering Co. of Austin; Wilkes Dake and Steve of Tyler; Walter D. Bellamy of Monahans; Brantje Gail Construction Co. of Port Lavaca; Clyde Yarborough, Inc. of Odessa; Moore Pipeline Co. of Lubbock; Swilling & Boyd of Whitney, Texas; and V. Clouse, Contractor of Abilene.

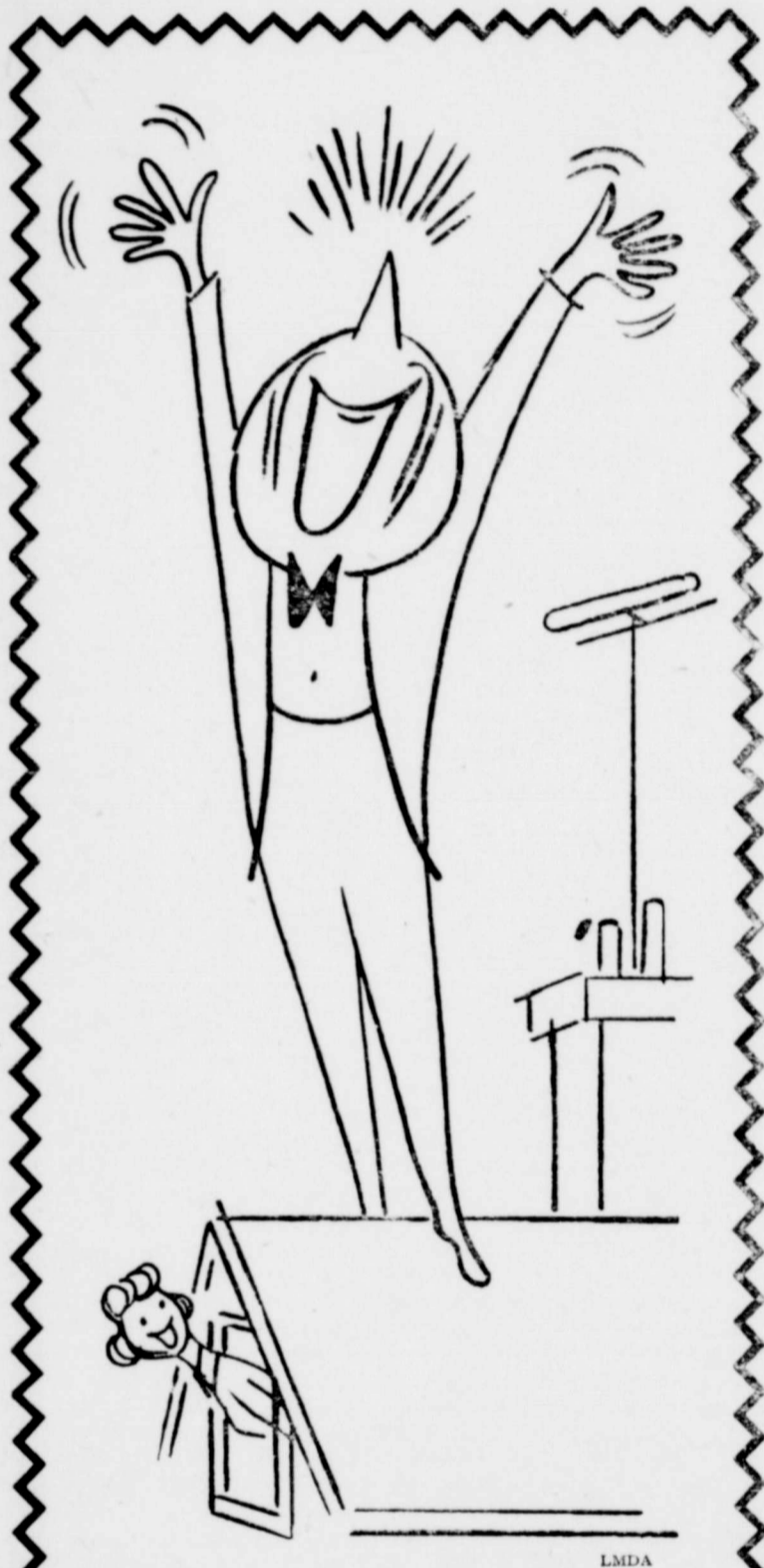

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children and allocating and supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual unit and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year of age who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

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not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions, for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein.

The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform the duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows: "Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized hereafter shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds,' shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, and the interest on such bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal, corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1957, moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water Development Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1952, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that such amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

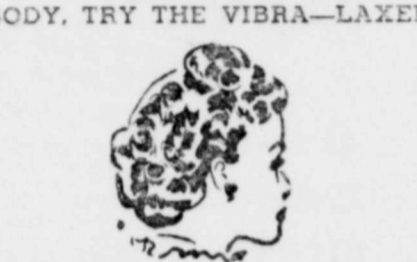

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 18 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-d of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform the duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-d, as follows: "Section 49-d. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). 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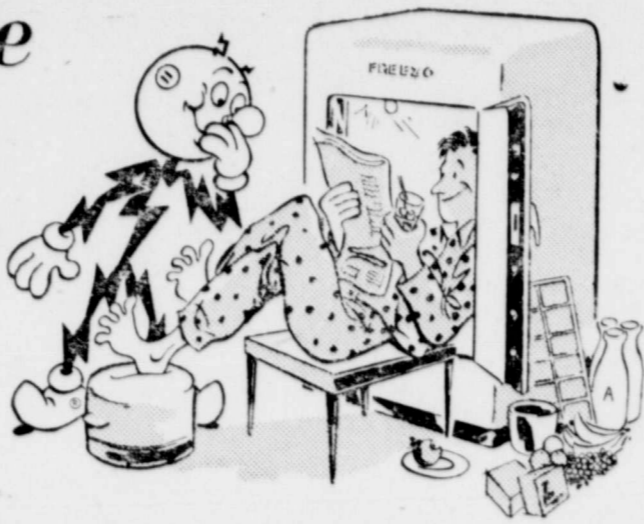
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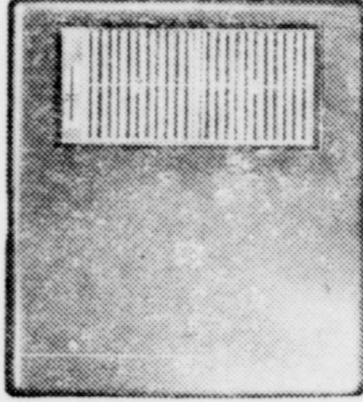
