Two injured in Toke Plant accident

Two employees were injured Wednesday, Jan. 7, shortly after 11 a.m., outside Xcel Energy's Toke Plant west of Muleshoe.

One person was airlifted to a Lubbock Hospital, while the other was transported to Muleshoe Area Medical Center, according to Wes Reeves, a spokesman for Excel Energy.

Both employees, whose names were not released, suffered broken bones and lacerations, but Reeves said neither suffered life-threatening injuries.

The accident occurred outside the coal-fired electric generation plant where repairs were being made on a pipeline that recycles water into the plant, Reeves said.

"A rubber bladder was being installed to isolate a valve for replacement," the spokesman said. "The bladder burst full force

Brown 1lb. ground meat and 1/2 cup of chopped onion. Drain off any fat. Add 1 can pork and beans, baked beans, lima beans, kidney beans and pinto beans, and 1 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup catsup, 3-4 tbsp. vinegar and 1 tsp. prepares mustard. (Do not drain the beans).




