Billy Kidd, associate county agent in sheep and goat work, was in the county last Thursday to help select replacement ewe lambs for Tom Collins. Billy's job has been to help county agents work sheep and goats and mohair as well under the improvement plan set up by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Association and Extension Ser-The plan is aimed at im vice. proving the quality of the wool clip and getting more money for the rancher where it can be sold on the improved basis.

Mr. Collins had about 200 ewe lambs this year. From this group we selected the top 100 ewe lambs to go into the breeding herd. Selection was on the basis of body confirmation and wool. In selection each is given full consideration as they go hand in hand. Too much attention or emphasis on size will result in a big rangy sheep with poor wool while if wool is emphasized too strongly, size will suffer and shearing weights go down.

Some time ago a number of buck lambs were topped out in the same manner. These will be used as re placement bucks. To improve the quality of the herd, replacements selected must be better than those being replaced.
