



"WONDERFUL eating for little

Empty cake mix into bowl. Add water and eggs. Beat 3 minutes until batter is smooth and creamy. Pour batter into 13x9x2-inch pan, which has been lined on bottom with paper, and bake in moderate oven (375°F.)

30 to 35 minutes. Cut in squares and serve warm with a topping of vanilla ice cream and Quick Chocolate Sauce.

and Quick Chocolate Sauce. Combine 1 cup chocolate chips, $\frac{3}{4}$ cup light corn syrup, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water and $\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon salt in saucepan. Heat over low heat until chocolate is melted, stirring constantly. Then increase heat and boil 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Makes about $\frac{1}{6}$ cups.




