



Nowell's Visit Hawaii On Flower, Garden Tour

Elbert and Hazel Nowell of Muleshoe returned recently from a 10-day flower and garden tour of Hawaii conducted by Rural Route Tours International of Kansas City, Mo., that included visits to the islands of Oahu, Hawaii, Maui and Kauai.

The Nowell's began their Hawaiian vacation on the island of Oahu, the state's most populous and familiar island. While there, the

Nowell's had an opportunity to shop and see the sights in Honolulu, visit Pearl Harbor and the U.S. S. Arizona Memorial, relax on Waikiki Beach and stroll through the fabulous famous Foster Garden, a menagerie of trees -- from Norfolk pine to Mindanao Gum -- and the Walker Garden, which once belonged to the granddaughter of Hawaii's legendary King Kamehameha.

After Oahu, the group journeyed to Kauai, the lush green 'garden island,' home of the awesome Waimea Canyon, a Grand Canyon look-alike. While on Kauai, the group visited the Olu Pua garden, one of the botanical wonders of the world with a collection that ranges from the delicate Coral Hibiscus to the massive Chinese Banyan with a 220-foot leaf canopy.

The island of Hawaii, next stop on the tour, is often called the Orchid Island and a visit to the Nani Mau Gardens explains

why. The Nani Mau Gardens, which cover 20 acres, contain nearly 2,000 varieties of orchids -- plus some 100 varieties of fruit trees. There also are huge assortments of Hawaiian anthuriums, bougainvillea, ginger and just about every kind of plant imaginable. The island of Hawaii also is the home of Mauna Loa, the ancient volcano that plays so prominent a part in Hawaiian folk lore, and the famous Kona coast.

The last island on the tour agenda was Maui, famous for its dazzling

white sand beaches and one of the world's best -- and few -- breeding and nursery areas for whales.

UTENSILS USED FOR MICROWAVE COOKING

Nonmetallic cooking utensils, such as oven proof glass, most ceramics, paper and heat-tolerant plastics, are suited for use in a microwave appliance. They allow microwaves to pass through them. Plastic pouches or cooking bags can also be used in microwave ovens. Most metal utensils are not suitable for microwave cooking. Metal reflects microwaves, preventing cooking and sometimes causing damage to the magnetron tube. Some models are designed so that TV dinner trays and other shallow metal dishes may be used. Aluminum foil may be used to shield areas of food that may cook too quickly. It is best to follow the manufacturer's recommendations that accompany the oven.

To test a dish for use in your appliance:

- Place a cup of water in the dish you are testing.
- Place the dish in the oven and heat for one minute.

If the water gets hot and the dish does not, the dish can be used. If the dish gets very hot, it is not acceptable for microwave use. Some acceptable containers may be warm to the touch.

Small amounts of food can be covered loosely with waxed paper or a paper towel to prevent splatters. When cooking large items that require a long time in the microwave appliance,

some heat from the food can be transferred to the covering material and the utensil. A potholder may be needed to remove these items after cooking.

For more information on utensils acceptable for the microwave and special microwave utensils, plan to attend the Microwave School on April 13, at the Civic Center. Two schools have been planned. The first one will be from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. and will be repeated from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Make plans to attend as these schools will not be repeated for some time.

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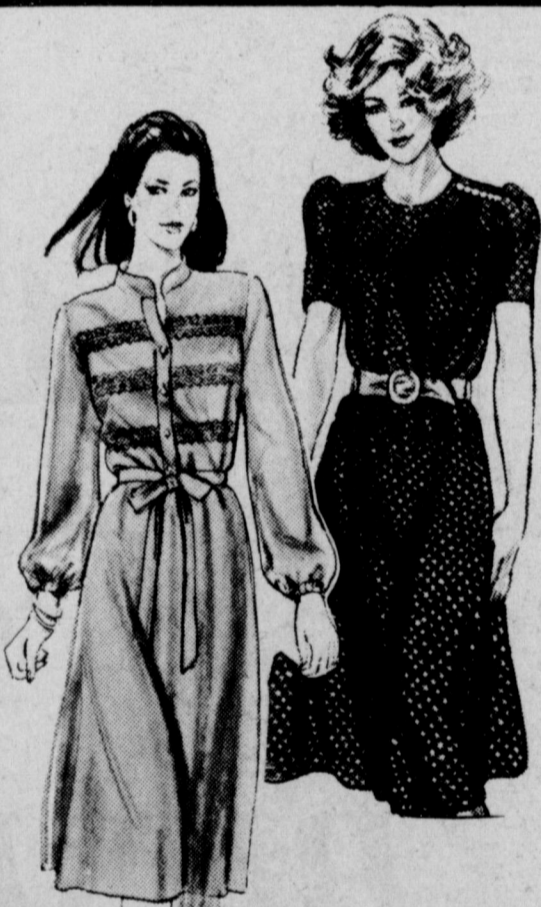

Easter Egg Cake

EASTER EGG CAKE

1-3/4 cups sifted flour
1 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1-3/4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup shortening, butter or margarine
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk

Sift flour, sugar, salt and baking powder together into bowl. Add other ingredients and beat well with a wire whisk or electric beater for three minutes. Pour mixture into 9" x 13" generously greased and floured pan. Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees and bake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until cake tests done.

EASY-SPREAD ALMOND BUTTERCREAM FROSTING

2 cups sifted powdered sugar
1/3 cup soft margarine
3 tablespoons cream
1/2 teaspoon almond extract (use vanilla, if you prefer)

Beat powdered sugar into margarine gradually. Add cream to mixture one spoonful at a time. Add almond flavoring. Beat until mixture reaches spreading consistency. Add more powdered sugar, if necessary. Frost top and sides of cake. To achieve a smooth

surface, dip spatula frequently into hot water and lightly skim spatula across cake surface.

To Cut Egg Shape--

Let cake cool. Remove cake from baking pan and place on serving platter. Or, place cake on stiff cardboard cut slightly larger than egg-shape oval and covered with colored foil wrapping paper. Cut a piece of lightweight cardboard or rigid paper to 9" x 13" size. Then trim to egg-shape oval. Set oval on top of cake and trim cake. (If you have kitchen helpers, treat them with the cut away pieces of cake as a reward for helping.)

The Muleshoe Lodge went to Lubbock on April 3, where the state president was present. Each

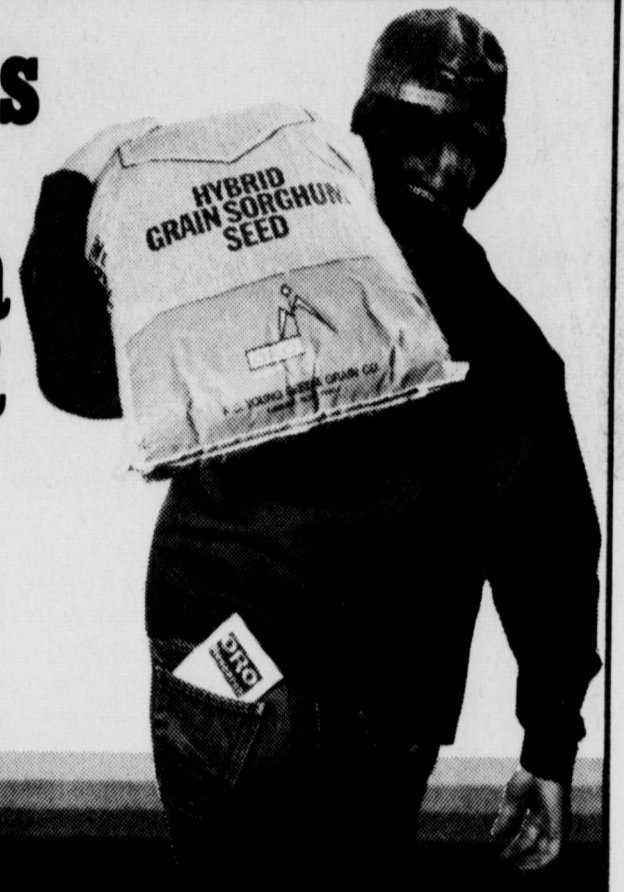
lodge had some part of the program and the Muleshoe Lodge was in charge of draping the charter.

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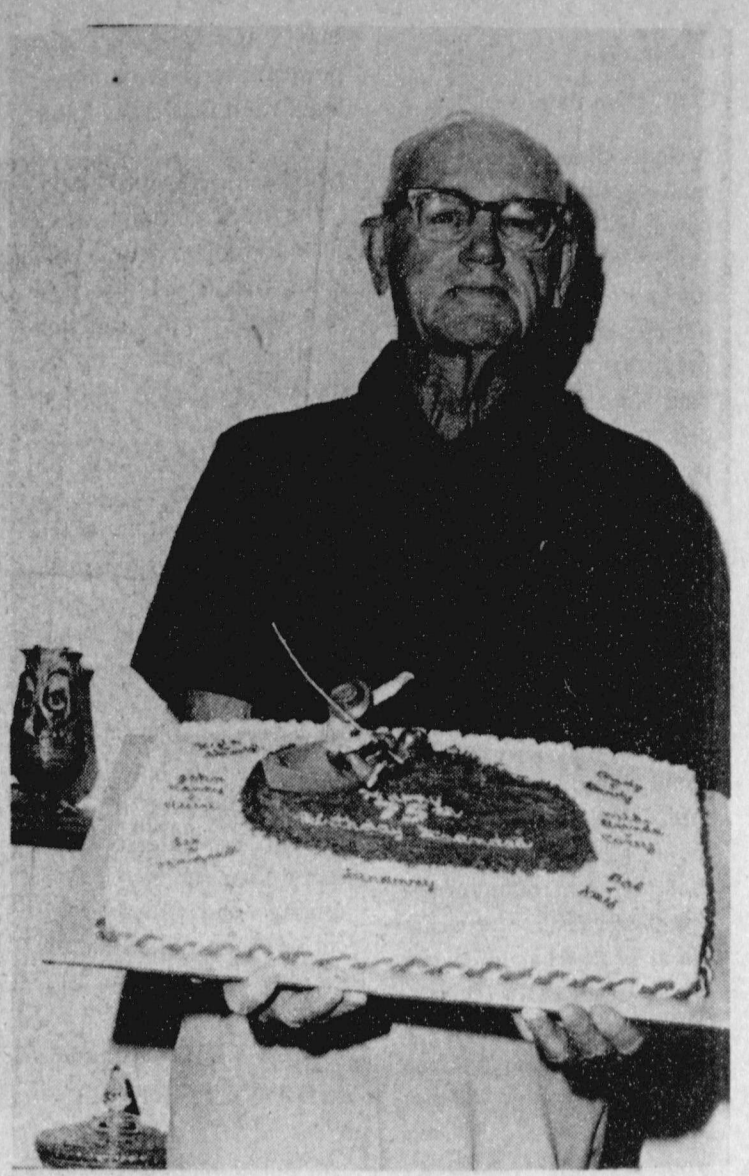

 ty South Plains Region normally produces 3 million bales of cotton annually. "In 1980, this cotton sold for approximately 75 cents per pound and brought the producer about \$375 per bale. In 1981, farmers received only about 35 cents per pound for the same cotton. This 40 cents per pound reduction represents about \$600 million of gross revenue loss to our area farmers on cotton alone," Lubbock Chamber officials said.

Noting that each farming dollar turns over at least three times before leaving the area, the chamber said that the low cotton prices this past season represents a loss of purchasing power of at least \$1.8 billion. "When translated into a factory, and using the average weekly wage of labor at \$300 per week, this loss would be equal to a factory that employs 120,000 persons for 50 weeks per year closing in our city."

Grain producers in the northern half of the Panhandle-South Plains region have been facing the same price problem, with grain prices also half of what they were following the 1980 harvest.

In a different approach to its past tractorcades, AAM has secured the services of Martin Haley Co., of Washington, D. C., to direct activities of the new PAC. The firm is one of the oldest, largest and most comprehensive private government relations services organization in the world.

Explaining AAM's change of lobbying direction, Key Crawford of Hereford, state AAM coordinator, said that in the past the farm organization used a "rather unsophisticated approach in trying to effect a change in policy."

While a healthy agricultural economy is still needed to aid the rest of the economy in general, and, since agriculture consumes 40 percent of the nation's industrial output, the organization is taking a more conventional and accepted approach, Crawford said, through the formation of a Political Action Committee. that PACs are the most powerful force in obtaining legislation that is favorable to a cause in American politics," Crawford said. "They are nothing more than a group of people with a common cause, who pool their money into a common fund to be used to influence legislation to their cause."

The AAM-PAC will be controlled by a board of directors chaired by Marvin Meek with funds primarily being used for political contributions to candidates with views compatible with those of rural America. While only individuals, by law, may contribute to the PAC, the organizations will also maintain a Program Fund, containing contributions from corporations and other businesses, to be used for support purposes.

While a contribution from a PAC cannot "buy a vote" from a candidate, Crawford explained that it is a gesture of friendship and support to a politician's election campaign which should pave the way to increased communication and understanding.

 On the other hand, if a farmer or rancher has temporarily ceased his operations (e.g., for crop rotation), he may still claim the exemption so long as he intends to remain in the agricultural business.

Finally, implements of farming or ranching are only partially exempt. The amount of the exemption is limited to \$15,000 for each single adult who is not a constituent of a family, or \$30,000 for a family. Jones cautioned, "Please note that the exemption application form prescribed by the State Property Tax Board asks whether the property, is owned by an individual, a partnership, or a corporation. One cannot determine from this form whether the owner is a single adult or a constituent."

To choose the correct amount of exemption, the chief appraiser must decide whether the applicant is a single adult or a family constituent. The term "family" is not defined in the statutes, but the courts

have determined its meaning over the years. "Generally, the family relationship is created by social status and not by contract. There must be a legal or moral obligation on the head of the family to support the other members, and there must be a corresponding dependence by those members for support. The exemption is not available to persons who congregate under a common roof under mere contractual terms for social or business purposes," said Jones.

One person cannot be a member of two or more families. Nor may the same exemption be claimed by more than one member of the family. Thus a husband cannot have one exemption and the wife another.

Family status is somewhat broader than marital status. The following relationships have been recognized by the courts as constituting a family: parent and infant child; an adult child and parent who is dependent on the adult child for support. Where the parent is supporting an unmarried adult child, the child must be dependent on the parent to support the adult child. Where an adult child is supporting a dependent parent, the child's subsequent marriage will not destroy the family relationship with the parent. In addition, the law treats an adopted child the same as a natural child. Brothers and sisters can

also create a family relationship, where one has a moral obligation to support another, and the latter has a need for the care and support of the former. Similarly, an unmarried adult

and a dependent niece or nephew can make up a family. A family relationship may even exist between a grandparent and a grandchild, where the child has no parents financially able to support and care for him and a moral obligation rests on the grandparent.

"Whichever dollar amount is applied, the exemption must be subtracted from the total value of all implements owned by the applicant. In other words, each implement which a taxpayer owns does not receive a separate exemption. Instead, the values of each commonly owned implement are added together, and the exemption is deducted from that sum." The chief appraiser said.

One final reminder is: The Property Tax Code requires an annual application for this exemption.

Another reminder goes back to the "case by case" basis and should questions arise as to the definitions of property which constitutes implements of farming and ranching, they should be submitted to the local Bailey County Appraisal District for review.

 wants done and that means enforcing the law," Bullock said.

Games operated where the au -- 30- ill th pl -- bingo elections already useu games in some areas of the state.

Saturday's election is the second opportunity local voters have had to vote to legalize bingo in their towns and counties. Last January, voters approved the game in 17 cities, 21 counties and nine justice precincts. According to the bingo law, August 14 will be the last opportunity to vote on the issue in 1982. To call an election, local governments must receive a petition bearing signatures of 10 percent of the number of voters in the last gubernatorial election.

Where the local government imposes it, the Comptroller's office will collect a two percent gross receipts tax that will be returned to communities where the games are authorized.

The Comptroller this week sent letters to local authorities in all 161 communities who will vote Saturday explaining the steps needed to certify elections and if they elect to, levy the tax.

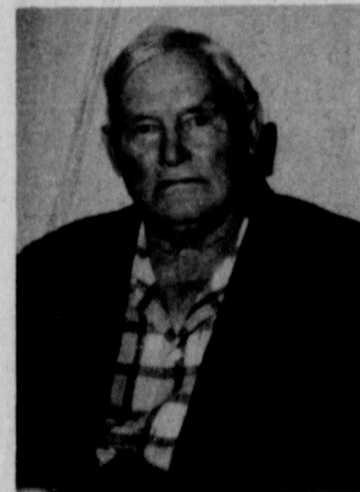
Services Held For Former Maple Resident

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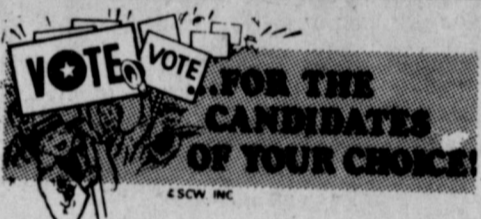

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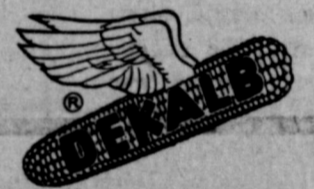

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Producers Asked To Vaccinate For Brucellosis Control

AUSTIN--Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission are launching a statewide program aimed at encouraging livestock producers to vaccinate their animals for brucellosis control.

"Vaccination is a key element of the Texas brucellosis control program. We can build up immunity in the Texas cattle population by vaccination of all eligible heifers," explains John Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission.

He noted these are other advantages for vaccination:

1. Vaccinated cattle can move more freely in accordance with brucellosis regulations;

2. Vaccinated cattle have more value.

"Financial assistance is available. You should contact your veterinarian or area Texas Animal Health Commission office for details," Armstrong said.

The program to encourage vaccination is a part of the ongoing efforts of the TAHC in this phase of the Texas brucellosis program.

Recently, a statewide committee, made up of several livestock organizations, recommended that the TAHC pursue an educational program among livestock producers and the general public informing them of the economic advantages of vaccination.

"In the past three years, Texas cowmen have shown their awareness of the need for vaccination for brucellosis. In 1979, about 20 percent of the eligible calf crop in Texas was

vaccinated; in 1981, this figure had increased to almost 32 percent. This is a good record, but we need to improve it," Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, TAHC, said. He said a 70 percent level of vaccination of eligible calves is needed to significantly reduce the disease.

Vaccination ages for heifers as official vaccinates are four to 12 months of age. A one-time vaccination is normally sufficient for the life of the animal. Bulls are not vaccinated. The reduced dosage of Strain 19 is recommended.

"Although vaccination alone is not the single answer to the Texas' brucellosis problem, it is the single most important thing cowmen can do now in their efforts to control brucellosis," Armstrong said.

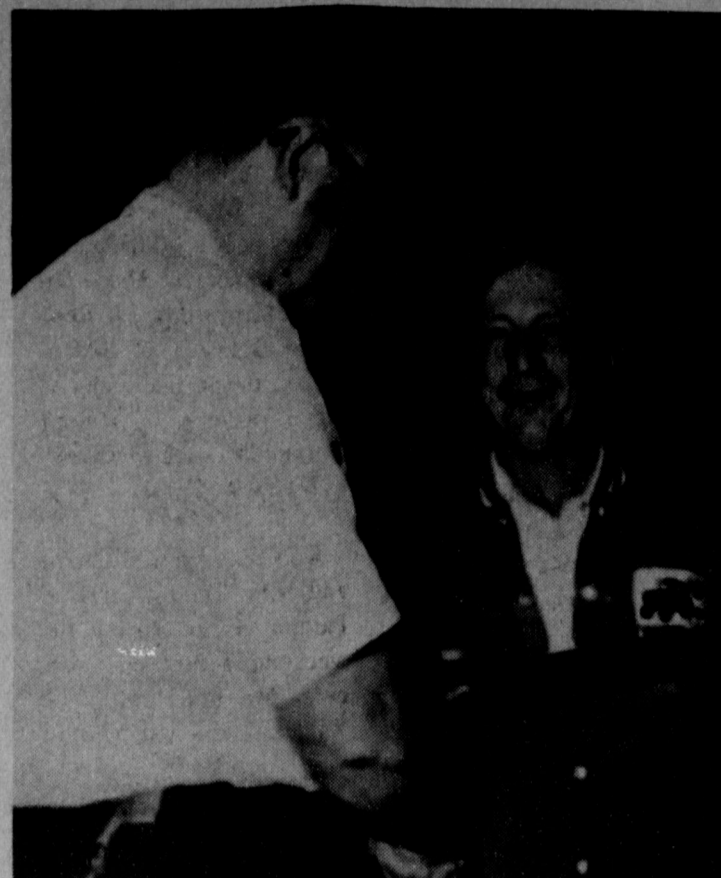

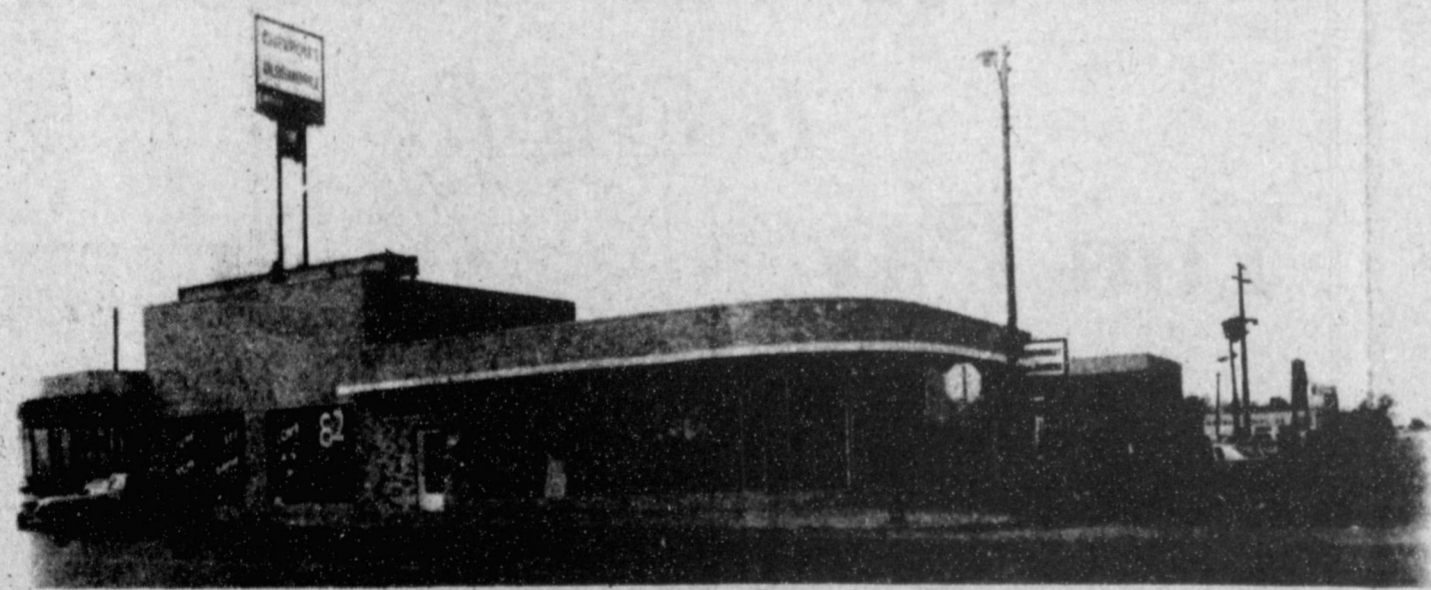


