Eagles Repeat On District Title; Bi-District Game Tonight at Forsan

Beat Mertzton 43 to 26 Here Last Friday Night

Although trailing 8-0 at the end of the first quarter, the Sterling Eagles six-man football team handily pummeled the Mertzton Hornets 43 to 26 last Friday night to retain the title of winners of this district. In spite of some merciless and seemingly uncalled for penalties, the Eagles took the game right out of the Hornets hands and won a decisive victory in the last three quarters.

Sterling kicked off as the game opened. Mertzton tried a double pass play that failed on the first try. Then a lateral picked up three yards. But still lacking yardage, the Hornets kicked over the Sterling goal on the fourth down. Play started from the Eagle 15 yard line. Melvin Foster picked up five yards and Wilbur Stone picked up nine but on the next play Sterling lost the ball on a fumble to Mertzton. The Hornets went to town and their little Jim Davis took a pretty pass and went over for six points. Freddy Brooks kicked the goal and added two points to the Hornet score. Thus the first quarter ended.

Early in the second quarter Stone picked up 7 yards and then the drive lost momentum and Sterling lost the ball on downs. Mertzton fumbled the ball and Stone recovered for the locals. Melvin Foster scooted for a first down, then the Eagles tried a pass right down to the goal that Mertzton intercepted. After one play Mertzton kicked and Melvin returned the punt in a nice run. Stone got loose and went half the length of the field and on the next play he went right on over for a T.D. Then he kicked the goal for two more points. This action tied the score 8-8.

Hornet Sartain passed to Freddy Brooks as Mertzton got the ball rolling following the after touchdown kick by Sterling. The Sterling boys kept pushing the Hornets back for losses and finally got the ball. Sterling then lost the ball to Mertzton on a pass interception and when the Irion County boys had to kick our boys got underway in a real fashion. Stone flipped the pigskin to Melvin who raced it on over the goal for six points.

As play resumed following the kick, Melvin intercepted a Mertzton attempted pass, giving the Eagles possession. Stone then took the oval over for a T.D. and kicked for the two extra points. This made the score Sterling 22, Mertzton 8 at half time.

Following halftime activities, the Eagles receive the kick off. Stone passed to Nathan Morris for a 12-yard gain and then Wilbur punched

through for a first down. A pass from Stone to Quintana got the ball on the one-yard line and then Wilbur pushed over for a score.

Mertzton's Jim Davis got a TD on a pass and in very few more minutes repeated for another 6 points, making the score Sterling 28, Mertzton 20 at the end of the third quarter.

Playing was desultory for a few plays. Mertzton fumbled and Sterling recovered. Coach Young's boys saw the air route was not gaining much and took to runs and line plunges. Then Stone passed to Foster for a score. A pass from Stone to Wayne Drennan made an extra point. Before the game ended, Melvin sprinted for another counter and Stone kicked for two extra points, making the final score Sterling City 43, Mertzton 26. Brooks had picked up six points on a pass play for the Hornets in the final quarter.

Karen Young Crowned Football Queen, Wilbur Stone Football Hero

At half-time, Sterling City revealed the choice for Football Queen and Football Hero. Karen Young was named queen and Wilbur Stone was crowned hero. Following the game a homecoming party was held in the gym for students and ex-students of Sterling High.

Bi-District Game Tonight With Gail at Forsan

The Gail (Borden County) team winner of their district, was on hand for working out details of the bi-district game. Meeting after the game in the school, members of the Sterling City school board, coach, superintendent, principal met with the Gail officials and worked out details of the bi-district game.

Gail wanted to have the game at Snyder. Sterling wanted to have the game at Forsan. (Only a neutral field satisfied Gail.) The Gail superintendent and coach agreed to play the game at Forsan if Sterling City would give them 60 percent of the gate, and pay the game expenses out of the 40 percent. Sterling officials agreed to this. Sterling is to pay for the ball, pay the officials, pay for the lights, out of the Sterling 40%.

Admission will be 25c for students and \$1.00 for adults. Game time will be 8:00 p.m. Officials will be the same as last Friday night with Mertzton — R. V. Bennett, referee; Ralph Ellis, linesman, and Clayton Caffey, umpire.

Coach of the Gail aggregation is Eddie James. He has a large squad of 24 players. They won their district handily and are expected to play a real game tonight at Forsan.

Should coach Diddle Young's Sterling Eagles win the bi-district

game tonight, they will play the winner of the Dell City—Pyote bi-district tilt. Last year the Eagles played the Pyote team in the regional title tilt at the Odessa field. The Eagles took the Pyote team by a score of 55-50 then. Should the Eagles win the regional championship game this year, it will be the third time in four years.

Forsan Service Club To Serve Chili Supper

The Forsan Service Club members are going to serve a chili supper in the school cafeteria from 6 to 8 p.m. it has been announced. This supper, to be served to visitors at the bi-district game between Gail and Sterling City will cost adults 75c and students 60c. It will consist of chili, beans, pie and coffee.

However, he said, the military commitments in foreign aid had to be carried out according to commitments. He said some frozen funds had been restored to our missile program by the new secretary of defense. Fisher, a member of the armed services committee, said that Russian satellites of themselves, were not a threat to us, but the Russian's ability to launch satellites from the guided missile angle, did constitute a threat to our security.

District Court Cases Heard Monday

District Judge Joe L. Mays accepted two pleas of guilty on criminal complaints in 51st District Court here Monday and forfeited bonds of two defendants charged with second offense drunk driving.

Justin A. Kever, district attorney, acted for the state in the cases. W. A. Brinson of Coleman was assessed a four-year suspended sentence on a charge of worthless checking. Kever said the \$105 check purchased 2,630 feed sacks from Foster and Hildebrand on May 22, 1954.

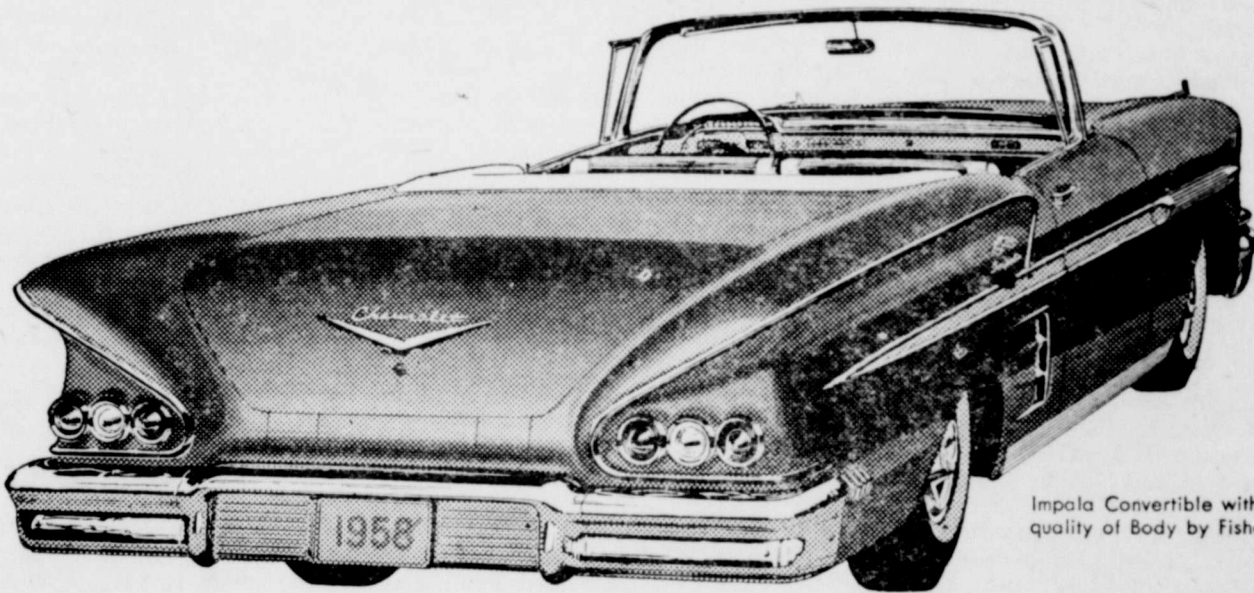

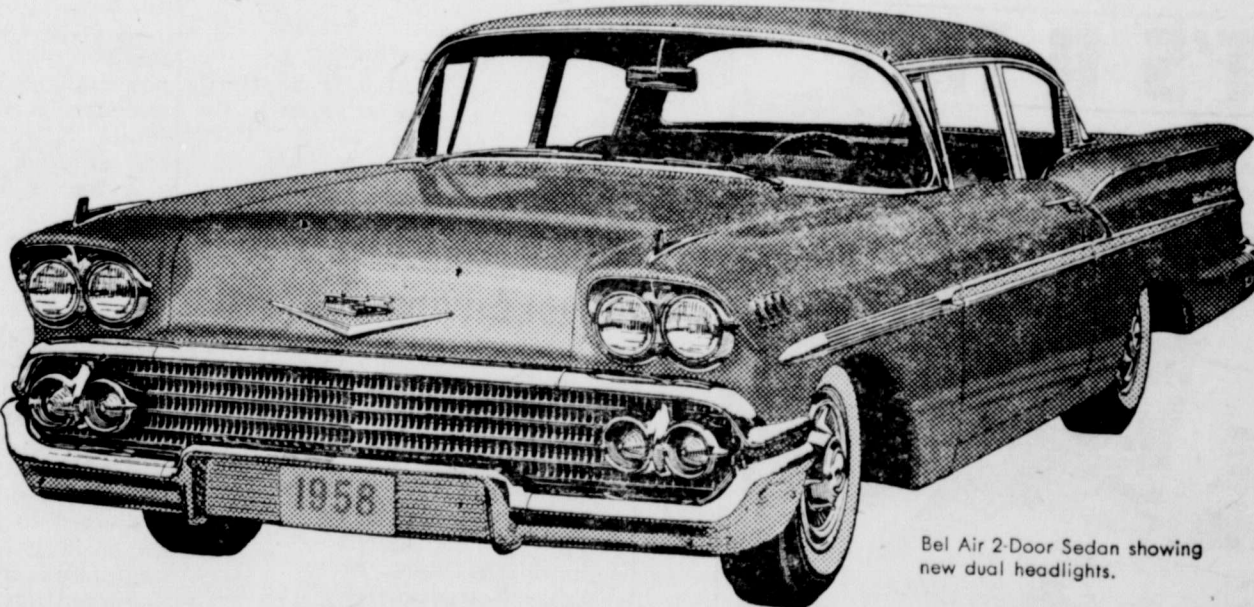

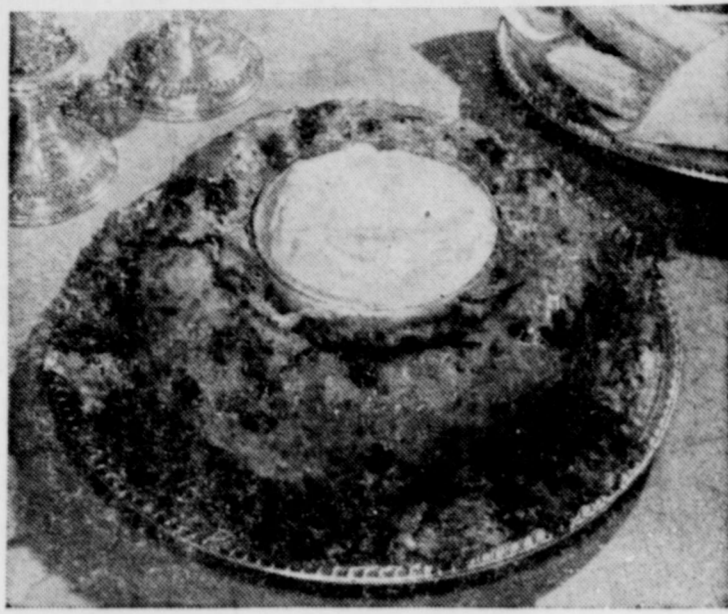

- 1/2 cup Real Mayonnaise
- 1 1/2 oz. (1/2 a 3-oz. pkg.) cream cheese
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 oranges, diced
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Pour juice into dissolved gelatin. Blend Real Mayonnaise and cream cheese. Add to gelatin mixture with lemon juice and salt. Blend thoroughly with rotary beater. Turn into freezing tray of refrigerator and chill (without resetting control) 20 to 25 minutes, or until firm about 1 inch from edge but soft in center. Turn into bowl and whip with rotary beater until fluffy. Fold in remaining cranberry sauce, diced oranges, celery and nuts. Pour into 1-quart mold. Chill until firm (about 1 hour). Unmold and garnish with salad greens. Makes 6 servings.

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Heat cranberry sauce until melted. Strain to get 1/2 cup juice.

A report just received from the Agricultural Marketing Service's Crop Reporting Board indicates that the Texas pecan crop will be considerably higher than it had previously estimated. Texas crop is now estimated at a prospective 45 million pounds. This consists of 7.2 million pounds of improved varieties, budded, grafted or topworked, and 37.8 million pounds of native nuts. This is an increase of 64 per cent over last year's crop.

Growing conditions this fall have been favorable and the nuts have been sizing and filling well. They are maturing a little later than usual however.

Heavy damage last spring and summer by the casebearers had caused some speculation on the size of the crop. Most felt that it would be down considerably but damage was not as heavy as expected. Buyers also report that the quality of the nuts bought so far is good.

Nationally, Texas produces, or will produce according to estimates, 36 percent of the pecans marketed in the United States this year. The national crop is estimated at 121,550,000 pounds or 30 percent less than last year and 12 percent below the average crop. Georgia has a very poor crop in prospect due to unfavorable weather, insects and disease damage. In Alabama the situation is about the same as in Georgia; an early freeze caused nuts in Arkansas to fall rapidly and harvest is delayed. Oklahoma's prospective production improved during October even though the early freeze there may have caused some damage.

Cotton producers in Sterling County and the rest of the nation will vote on whether or not marketing quotas and acreage allotments will be continued for another year on December 10. This will be the twelfth time since 1938 that producers have voted. In order to carry, two-thirds of the nation's upland cotton farmers must approve. Last December, 92.4 percent of the farmers voting approved.

Under legislative provisions of the program, the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim a national marketing quota and acreage allotments when the total supply of upland cotton exceeds the normal supply or what is needed for domestic use, export, and a carryover reserve. Presently, the total supply is considerably above the normal.

When marketing quotas are approved, each grower is given an acreage allotment. Failure to stay within the allotment results in a penalty amounting to 50 percent of the parity price being assessed the producer on all cotton above the allotment.

The USDA range and livestock report for November 1 shows that most of the state is in better condition at this time than it has been for a good many years; the ten

year average of 1945-1955 is lower than conditions at present in most areas. Soaking rains during September and October fell in all parts of the state except the extreme south, particularly the lower valley region. In those counties and the Trans-Pecos region winter grass prospects are not too favorable. Elsewhere grass is doing well and small grains are furnishing grazing. In most areas, wheat, oats, barley and like crops are being grazed.

Livestock are going into the winter in good condition all over the state. In many areas grass will be just about ample to carry them through the winter and supplemental feeding will be cut considerably.

Demand for replacement cows, stocker yearlings, calves, and ewes is very strong. Ewe lambs are demanding 1 to 2 cents over mutton lambs. Most older ewes that are good for at least one more lamb are being held.

Nationally, the scene is similar to the Texas picture. In the western range states, conditions are the best since 1942. Cattle and calves are in the best November 1 condition since 1945. Sheep likewise are in the best condition of 12 years. Demand for brood stock is high everywhere on both cattle and sheep with ewe lambs demanding \$3 more on the national scene.

All in all, it looks like prospects for livestock and range are the best in many years. Maybe the rancher can devote more time to ranching and less time to opening feed sacks.
