Sterling Livestock Show Set For Saturday

Judging to Start at
10:00 A. M.

The Sterling County Livestock Show will get underway here Saturday morning with the judging beginning at 9 a.m. Oliver Werst, county agent of Glasscock County will judge all classes.

The show will be held at the local show barn (old tabernacle) and many boys and girls have animals in the show.

Entered in the show will be fat lambs, commercial ewe lambs, and registered Rambouillet sheep from the 4-H club and FFA members. There will be around 150 lambs, 25 ewe lambs, and about 10 head of breeding sheep shown.

The auction sale of the local show will get underway around 2:00 p.m. that afternoon. Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell one lamb in the sale. To be eligible for the sale, a lamb must have been exhibited in one class at least.

Show officials for the 1958 show are: superintendent, William Foster; assistant superintendent, Ewing McStire; sale clerk, Worth Durham; assistant sale clerk, Marcus Loaders; auctioneer, Riley King.

The concession stand at the show will be operated by the 4-H and FFA mothers again this year. The Methodist church ladies will serve the dinner in the community center as is their custom.

There was a junior division consisting of junior high students and a senior division for the high school students.

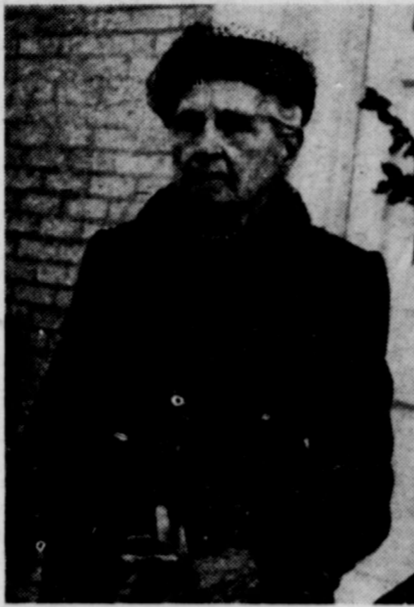

Mrs. Neal Reed, 92, was buried here Sunday afternoon. She had died in the Sterling County Hospital Saturday afternoon. Services were held at the local Church of Christ with the minister Marion H. Hays, and former minister, A. A. Berryman, officiating. Arrangements were in charge of the Lowe Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were grandsons and great grandsons, with the exception of Dr. Wm. J. Swann. They were David P. Wallace II, of Dallas, Dean Johnson of Vincent, Martin C. Reed, Mims Carl Reed, Neal J. Reed, Don Reed McDonald, and Chesley McDonald, all of Sterling City.

Surviving sons are John, Bill, Lee and Nick Reed, all of Sterling City. Grandchildren are Martin C. Reed, Neal J. Reed, Mrs. Chesley McDonald, and LeRuth Reed, all of Sterling City; Mrs. Dean Johnson of Vincent, and Mrs. David P. Wallace of Dallas. There are ten great grandchildren surviving.

Mrs. Reed, who passed her 92nd birthday Christmas day, was a life long member of the Church of Christ and the last surviving charter member of the local church. She was a very lively little woman and very active in the affairs of the church until her health began to fail.

Mrs. Reed was born December 25, 1865 at West in McLennan County. She was reared an orphan. She was married to Neal Reed in 1888. They moved to Erath County that year and six months later moved on to here, then a part of Tom Green County. They settled on the North Concho River up from Sterling City. He bought a half section of railroad land for \$3 an acre and later bought another half section for \$1.50 per acre.

Mr. Reed passed away March 27, 1924 and two children, Rollie and Annie preceded him in death.

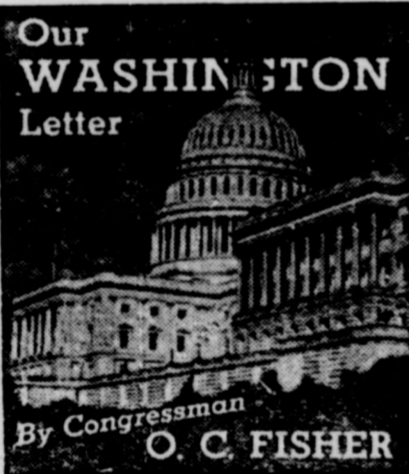
Voting Talked at Club Meeting

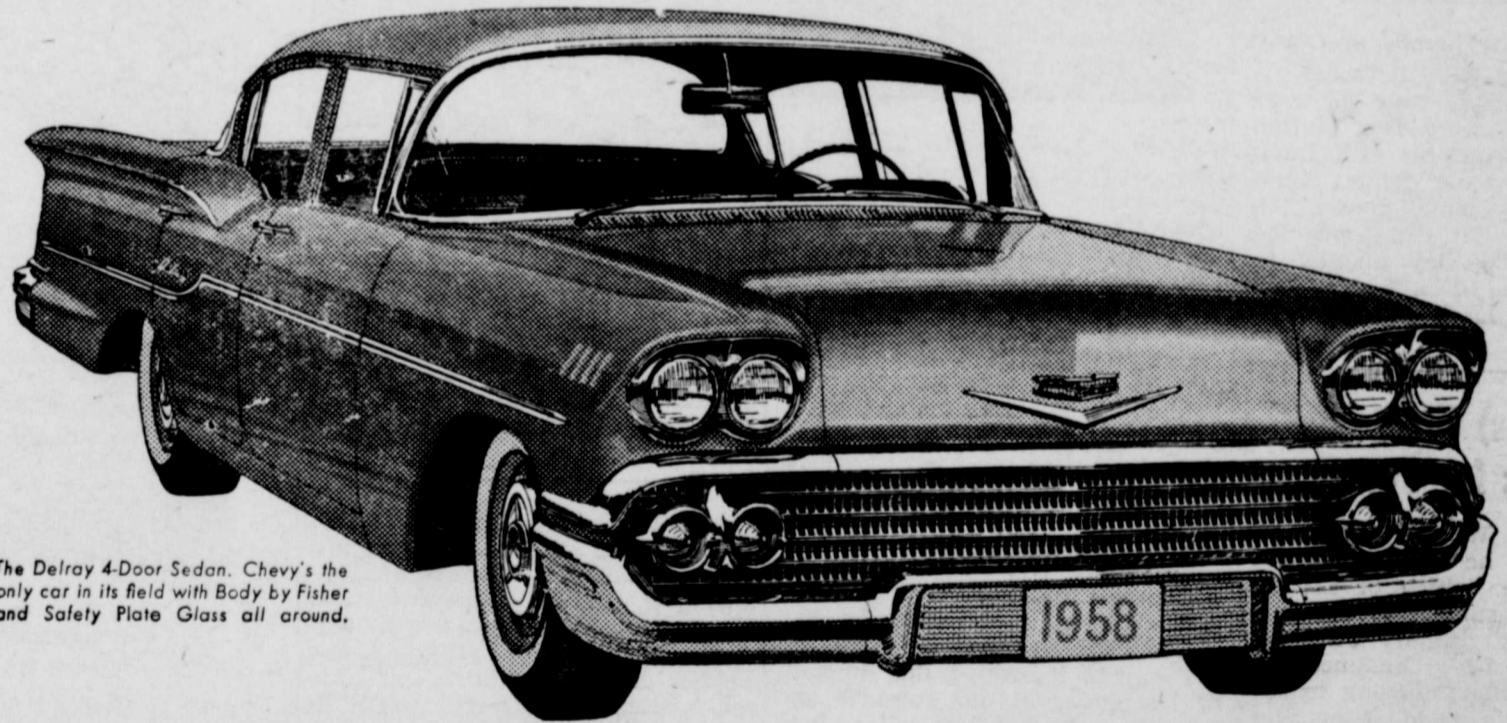

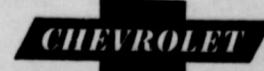

THE GREAT PLAINS CONSERVATION PROGRAM

SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE

A long-term conservation program for 65 counties in Texas has been set up and is now ready to offer to farmers and ranchers in these counties. Counties included initially in the program are Midland, Glasscock, Coke, Howard, Runnels and counties to the north of these. Other counties may be added later if local interest and problems warrant. Tentative distribution of funds has been made to counties designated for activation in the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The program is designed to promote land and water use through a more coordinated conservation program. Emphasis is placed on permanent type practices based on land capabilities. Long-term financial aid is being offered through cost-share contracts to carry out needed land treatment. This program does not replace any other going program.

The Great Plains Program is not a drought relief program, an annual program, a production adjustment program, or an income supplement program. Acreage allotments and marketing quotas will not be decreased during the life of the contract.

Anyone who owns or operates a tract of land is eligible under this program. The producer must develop and carry out complete conservation program on his farm or ranch. Technical assistance is available thru all agencies of the Agriculture Department. Applications and contracts will be made through the Soil Conservation Service as they have been given full responsibility for administration of the program.

For further information contact the Soil Conservation Service office in the county where you own land. For Glasscock County, come to the office in the Sterling City courthouse.



AROUND THE COUNTY

The Sterling County Livestock Show will be one of many to be held in this section of the state Saturday. Other local shows beside the Sterling show will be at Ozona, Mertzon, Winters, Eden and Menard.

This concentration of shows on one day is brought about by the early date of the Abilene show in most cases. Abilene will have its district show next week starting Monday, January 13. The Abilene district show is limited to entries from 65 counties. It is for fat steers, lambs and hogs only. Lambs will be judged Tuesday, January 14, starting at 9:00 a.m.

The lamb tour on December 21 was well attended. The weather was favorable and the turnout, especially for the barbecue dinner, was excellent. One hundred and forty people ate and helped the show association raise money for their fund.

In the junior division of the judging contest, Cecilia McDonald and Clayton Stewart tied for first place; Jerry Payne and Reynolds Lee Foster tied for third. In the senior division, Melvin Foster won first, Danny Stewart second, and LeRuth Reed third. David Foster won the trophy in the junior division of the trimming contest and Don McDonald won the senior division trimming contest.

1 package instant chocolate chip cake mix; 1 cup water; 2 eggs, unbeaten; Vanilla ice cream; Quick Chocolate Sauce.

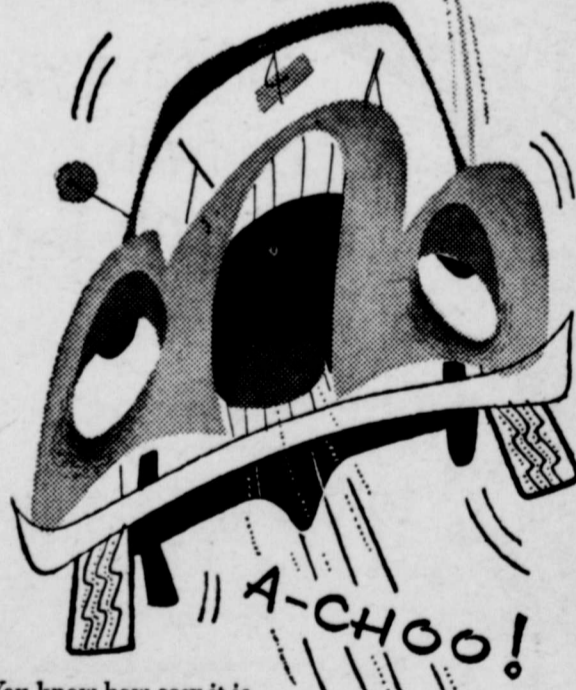
