Four Draw Sentences In District Court Here This Week

Wheat growers are reminded that June 20, 1958 is the date to vote for or against the 1959 wheat marketing quotas.

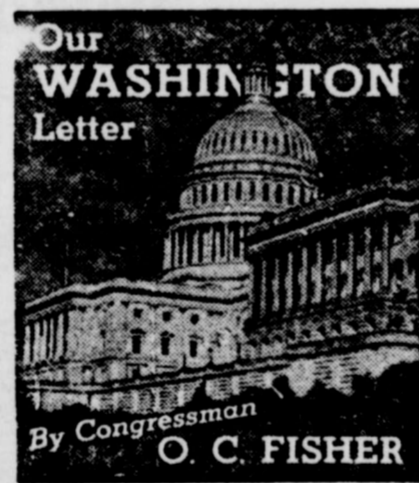
There are six allotments here in Sterling County, along with one wheat grower with no allotment.

FOREIGN AID was extended another year in a bill approved in the House last week. Strongly supported by the leadership of both Democrats and Republicans, the measure glided through by a vote of 259 to 134. I joined with a majority of the Texas delegation in voting against the \$3.5 billion measure. While some items on military aid are highly desirable, the bill contained too many grants which are only remotely connected with our own security and that of the free world. I firmly believe the amount could be cut in half and the major objectives of the legislation would be achieved.

LITTLE ROCK'S military rule came to an end the other day, and the total cost of the intervention of troops there is figured at \$4 million. That averages around a half million per student for the colored pupils for whose benefit the paratroopers were ordered in. The White House has intimated the troops may be assigned to the high school again when school opens in September, depending on how things look at that time.

PROGRESS IN DESEGREGATION has been surveyed, covering 8500 school districts in 17 states and the district of Columbia. This reports that there has been no integration in 7 southern states. But litigation is brewing in several of these, right now in Virginia, that may force the issue soon. This could lead to use of more federal (Continued on Back Page)

The Big Spring Rodeo Association has announced that plans are complete for the 25th annual performance of the Big Spring Rodeo, June 12, 13, 14, 1958.

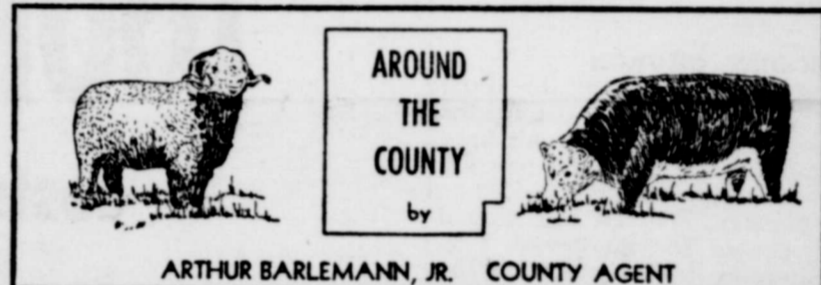

SENIORS APPRECIATED ON COLORADO TRIP

The Sterling Seniors were really appreciated on their recent class trip to Colorado. They got a letter of appreciation from the Garden of the Gods Motel Colorado Springs, Colorado Thursday of this week.



As of today, Tuesday, no case-bearer eggs have been found on the pecans on the courthouse lawn. Last week the worm was found in the tip of the new growth but evidently due to the cool, wet weather, has not undergone the change from the worm to the pupa stage to the moth stage which lays the eggs. According to entomologists, the pattern is off beat this year due to the weather and the bearer may be late.

The best thing to do is to watch the trees, checking them daily to see if the eggs can be found on the nut clusters. Usually eggs are deposited singly on the tip or blossom end of the nuts. The eggs are pearly white with a bluish cast and about one-third the size of a pin head. They hatch in four to five days and move down below the pecan or nut clusters and feed on the buds in the leaf axil. The buds are hollowed out and there is a telltale webbing and black frass around the bud. After four or five days of feeding on the buds, the worm now much larger, moves back to the nut cluster and bores a hole at the base of the nut and enters to feed. Then it is too late to achieve any effective control.

The best thing to do is to check the trees regularly for the eggs. When the eggs appear, spraying should be done. The sprays recommended in last week's article are those that have proven best over a period of years.

Now is the time to begin thinking about mesquite control if you have a mesquite problem. This promises to be one of the best years in many for spraying mesquite. Thus far the weather has been ideal; there is sufficient moisture and the tree is in good growing condition with a good food supply. Fall and spring rains combined to set up conditions that have not been available for a long time. Last year the trees never did leaf out fully during the time that they should have been sprayed.

For best results, trees should be fully leafed out and growing vigorously. Proper time is from 50 to 80 days after the leaves have first appeared. This year the first

leaves began to appear around the first of May which would make the spray time around June 20 to mid-July. Leaves should be fully developed and show a dark green color. If sprayed before the leaves are fully developed and dark green, they will be tender and the spray will burn the leaves. They will fall off and the chemical will not be translocated to the root system as it should. If it rains during the spray season, wait about 20 days to give the new leaves a chance to develop before spraying.

On mesquite which has not been sprayed before, use 1-3 pound of 2,4,5-T mixed in 1-2 gallon of diesel oil with enough water to make 3 gallons of spray per acre; this is for aerial application. On regrowth mesquite that was sprayed before, use 1-2 pound of 2,4, 5-T per acre. This re-sprout or regrowth should be at least four feet tall.

The best control will be on upland mesquite where the kill should run from 25 to 30 per cent; heavy soils in the bottom land will usually have a percentage kill of 25 per cent or less. Kill on regrowth should run 10 per cent or possibly a little more.

Spraying is a control program only. It will be necessary to spray in good seasons killing as much as possible, letting the grass grow and manage the range properly. The rancher should figure on re-spraying every five to seven years. Cost of aerial spraying will vary with the cost of the chemical used. On the average, the cost will run around \$2.25 per acre including the plane and diesel oil. Figured on the basis of retreatment of the mesquite every five years, the cost amounts to 45 cents per acre. It will be necessary for the rancher to figure all these factors when deciding whether to spray or not.

The mesquite is an invader, moving in when the range is in poorest condition due to drought, overgrazing, or a combination of factors. It takes five times as much water to produce a pound of mesquite as it does to produce a pound of grass; there is no doubt in anyone's mind which is the most valuable.

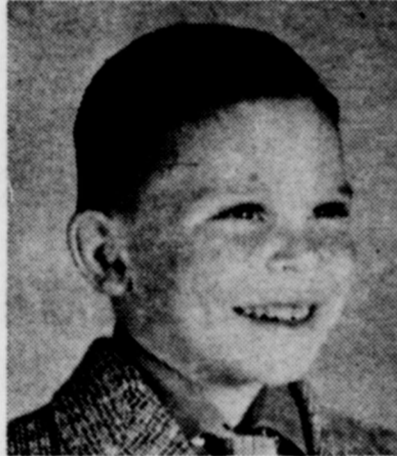

Over \$15,000 in purses and prizes will be distributed to the winners in the five performances.

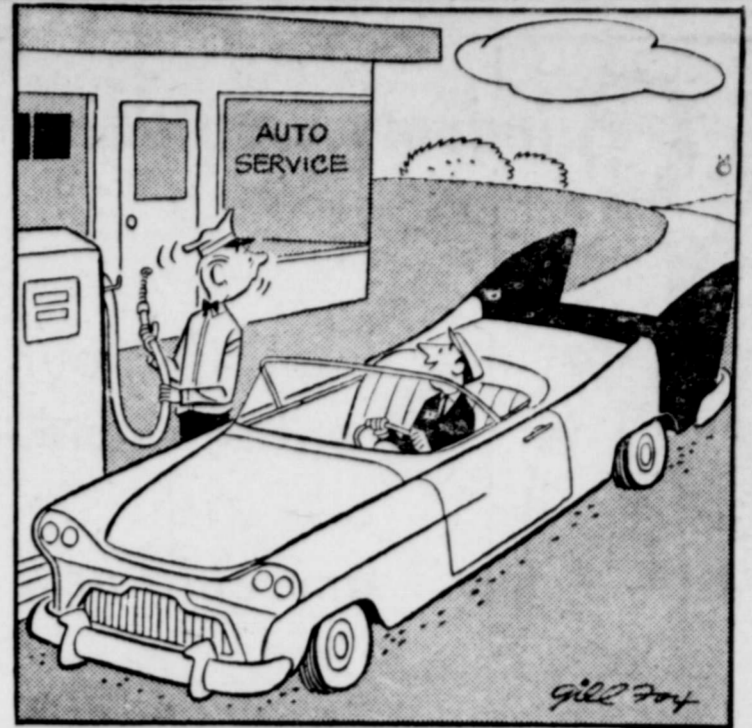
