





Remodel or tear the old house down to the ground and build anew?

As the "before" and "after" photographs show, remodeling changed the awkward-appearing house into a modern-looking home, giving greater comfort and more space, plus the con-veniences of up-to-date living. The total cost was less than a third the price of a new house downstairs rooms, new windows of comparative size. Principal structural changes included removal of an upstairs These are stock units consisting included removal of an upstairs wing, enclosing one front porch for a kitchen, and another porch for an office. The house was given a com-plete new look by reroofing it with a deep shade of asphalt shingles to make it appear low-er, and choosing a color for sid-ing that harmonizes with the ing that harmonizes with the new roof. Haines specified asphalt shinlaines specified asphalt shin-gles, since they had given years of trouble free service on the old house and are available in a wide choice of colors.
