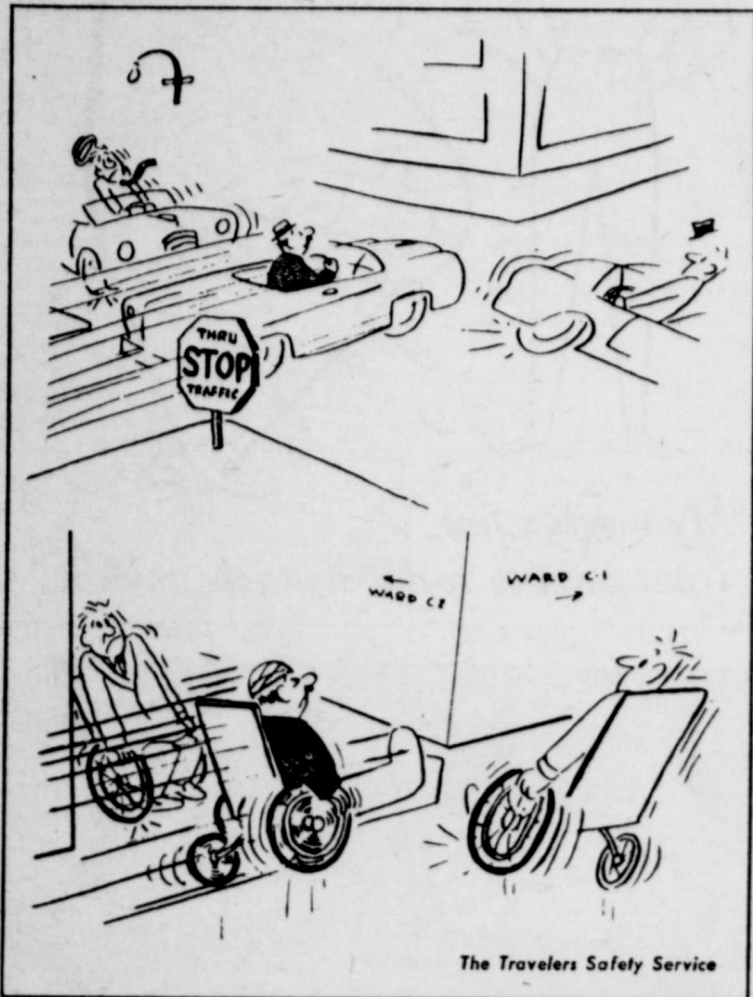

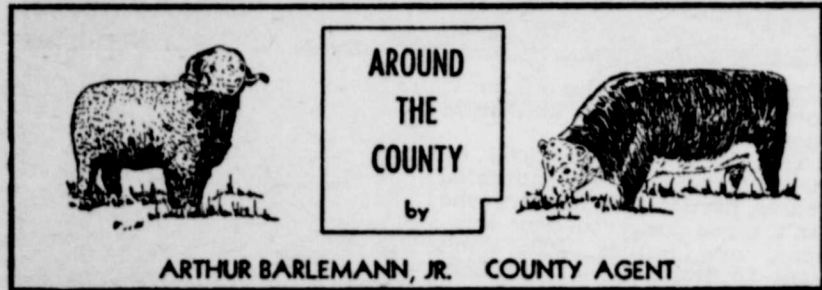

## The Road Toll

Disregarding the right-of-way increased the toll by 544,600.



We have just returned from the 4-H club district camp at Camp Rio Vista in Kerr County. 134 club members, 18 adult leaders and 50 Extension Agents were present. Club members who attended the camp from Sterling county were Mitsy Davis, Temple Ann Foster, Carolyn Payne, Clayton Stewart and David Durham. Mrs. Forrest Foster accompanied the girls.

Carolyn received a recreation scholarship from the district home demonstration club women; her job was to help teach recreation to the others attending camp. Mitsy, Temple Ann, David, and Clayton were selected by the adult leaders of Sterling County to receive the trips to camp paid out of the club fund. This is done annually and gives hard working club members a small reward for their work.

Group activities included wildlife conservation, recreation, photography, party manners and homemade games. Other activities were swimming, games and a night party each night followed by vespers just before bedtime.

A group of the club boys from the district challenged the agents to a baseball game Tuesday afternoon. The agents wore out three of the boys' pitchers scoring 21 runs. When the game was called due to other activities after about 5 innings the score stood at 21 for the agents and 7 for the boys.

We attended a television training meeting in San Angelo last week to learn the proper procedure in putting on a television program. Purpose behind the meeting was in proper procedure; KCTV obliged by having trouble in putting on the training film. The manager stated the station wanted us to see how it was really done so they had "cable trouble."

The station is starting a series of agricultural programs on Friday, June 13. First part of the program will begin at 11:45 A.M. with a film, "Agriculture Cross Country." It will deal with all segments of agriculture over the nation with reports from experiment stations, county agents, markets etc. At about 11:55 there will be a break in the film. At that time, county agents in this area will put on a five minute program. All counties neighboring Tom Green county will participate.

Curtis Henderson, county agent of Irion county will lead off on Friday, June 13 with a program on marketing milk lambs. I will have the Friday, June 20 spot with high lights from the Sonora Wool Show. Coke county agent, Sterling Lindsey, will follow me on the 27th; the rest of the schedule will include

Menard, Schleicher, Tom Green and Concho county.

Dr. Omer Sperry is in the county this week checking on the plots of bitterweed which were sprayed in April. He is on the staff of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and also a professor in the Range Department at A&M. He is making counts on the weeds killed and living on the plots on Fowler McEntire's place and will do the same on the plots on Riley King's place. His assistants are Henry Pearson, graduate student and Neill Sperry, his son.

The plants, both living and dead, on the plots are being taken from squares selected at random. They will be taken back to college where seed counts will be made, seeds will be checked for viability by a germination test, and results will be tabulated on the different rates of herbicide used.

As soon as the calculations are completed and results known, Dr. Sperry will release them. This will probably take two or three months to complete as the counting is a tedious process.

Sperry feels that the tests made this year in Sterling county will give them some good material to work with. He feels that they are as complete as was possible this year and will be a good basis for making recommendations in the future. However, as is the case with all research, the testing and searching must continue. Each year new chemicals come onto the market with a potential future. These must be tested before the Experiment Station and the Extension Service can make any recommendations to farmers or ranchers. The tests here this year are being watched with a great deal of interest throughout West Texas; the results are being watched for by many ranchers who have bitterweed trouble.

Mrs. Bill Brooks was Noratadata Club hostess Monday evening at the community center. A salad course and cookies were served.

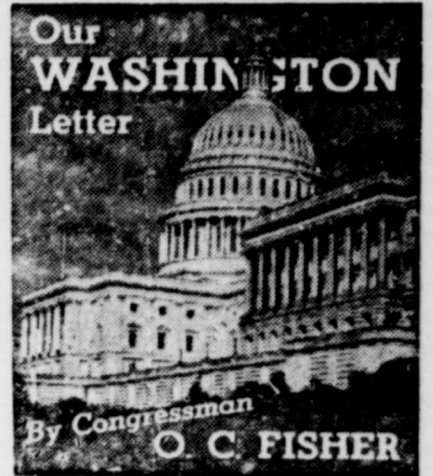
The new president, Mrs. Reynolds Foster, announced the committees for the coming year. The club voted a hundred dollars to be set aside for the club room kitchen.

TUG OF WAR Tactics appear in the Senate mill, as maneuvering to act on the House-approved Alaskan Statehood bill is shaping up. Senator Knowland, Republican leader, wants no part of Alaskan statehood unless he is assured a Hawaii bill follows. If not so promised, then he says an amendment will be offered to tie the two together in one package.

To further complicate the picture, Senator Eastland, who opposes both, threatens to offer as an amendment to the statehood bill the controversial bill to curb the powers of the Supreme Court. And that would be like waving a red flag in front of the liberals who unanimously favor Alaskan statehood but uncurbed liberal opinions by the Supreme Court. And it could set off a talkathon that could smash the whole works. The Senate liberals foresee two CIO-minded liberal Senators from Alaska if it is admitted.

VAN CLIBURN, the Texan who won an international piano playing contest in Moscow and became the toast of the Russian capitol, added luster to his shining star the other day in Washington when he appeared in famous Constitution Hall. Before a sell-out crowd he held them spell-bound, and was given one of the biggest ovations in the history of that historic hall. Never before has Washington given such a tribute to a musician.

IN WASHINGTON last week to attend a series of lectures and conferences with heads of government departments, was Major John J. Mahoney of Comfort. One of the 36 loan fellowship students at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Mahoney is concluding a year's study there with a Masters degree in Industrial Management. ### Big Spring Rodeo Set For June 12-14

The Big Spring Rodeo Association has announced that plans are complete for the 25th annual performance of the Big Spring Rodeo, June 12, 13, 14, 1958.

Everett Colburn, veteran producer, will again be at the helm of this show, with his usual fine array of rodeo stock, tops in announcers, clown, acts, and specialty acts. Among the 3 specialty acts this year will be the famous Moore family.

Comprising the 6 major events will be calf roping, saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, bulldogging and bull riding. There will also be a wild cow milking contest. The girls' barrel race will be still another feature of the rodeo.

A big parade will proceed through the downtown section of Big Spring at 4:00 p.m. and June 12. Attractive prizes are offered the first three winning floats in the amount of \$50, \$30 and \$20.

Sheriff's posses and riding clubs from the neighboring towns and counties have been invited to march in the parade. An appropriate trophy will be presented the outstanding posse at the first night's performance. After the parade the posse will be honored with a barbecue at the rodeo grounds, with the rodeo association and the Big Spring Mounted Patrol acting as hosts.

This year's purse will amount to \$3,300.00 plus entrance fees.

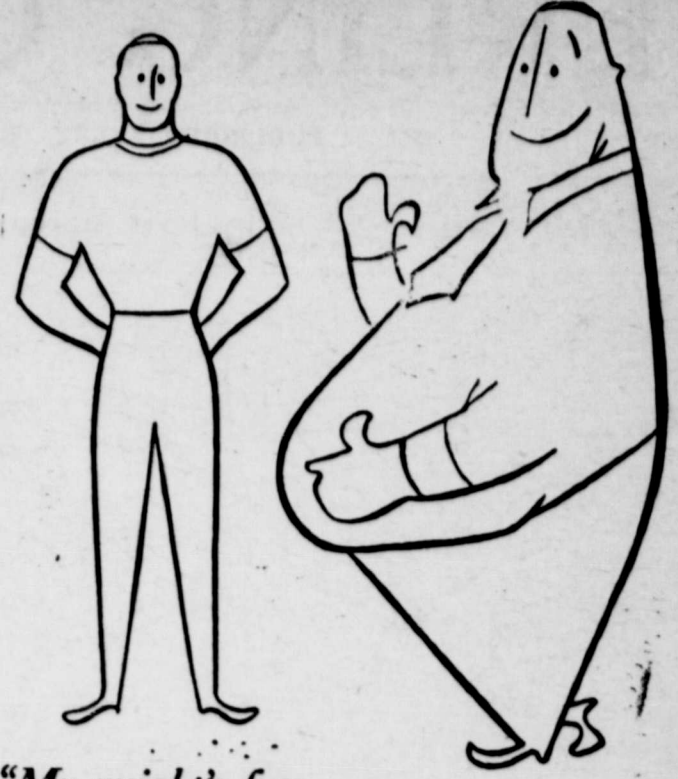

Remodel or tear the old house down to the ground and build anew?

This is a problem faced by many owners of old, outdated houses, particularly farmers who can't move away to new locations, or families who don't want to leave the friendliness of a familiar neighborhood.

In the case of Dennis F. Haines, of Haven, Kans., the answer was remodeling, since the old house occupied the best site on his wheat farm and was in sound structural condition.

As the "before" and "after" photographs show, remodeling changed the awkward-appearing house into a modern-looking home, giving greater comfort and more space, plus the conveniences of up-to-date living. The total cost was less than a third the price of a new house of comparative size.

Principal structural changes included removal of an upstairs wing, enclosing one front porch for a kitchen, and another porch for an office.

The house was given a complete new look by reroofing it with a deep shade of asphalt shingles to make it appear lower, and choosing a color for siding that harmonizes with the new roof.

Haines specified asphalt shingles, since they had given years of trouble free service on the old house and are available in a wide choice of colors.

To bring more light into

downstairs rooms, new windows of ponderosa pine were installed all the way around the house. These are stock units consisting of a wide pane of fixed glass above modern hopper windows which open for ventilation. Windows upstairs were flanked with louver shutters of ponderosa pine to make them look bigger. Other new features included a new heating plant, central air conditioning, a modern new kitchen, and complete interior redecorating.

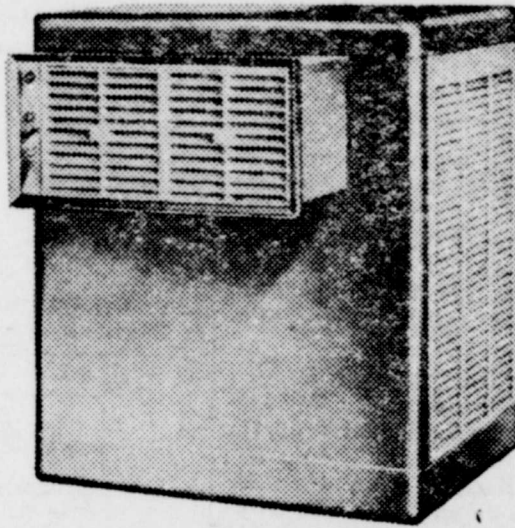

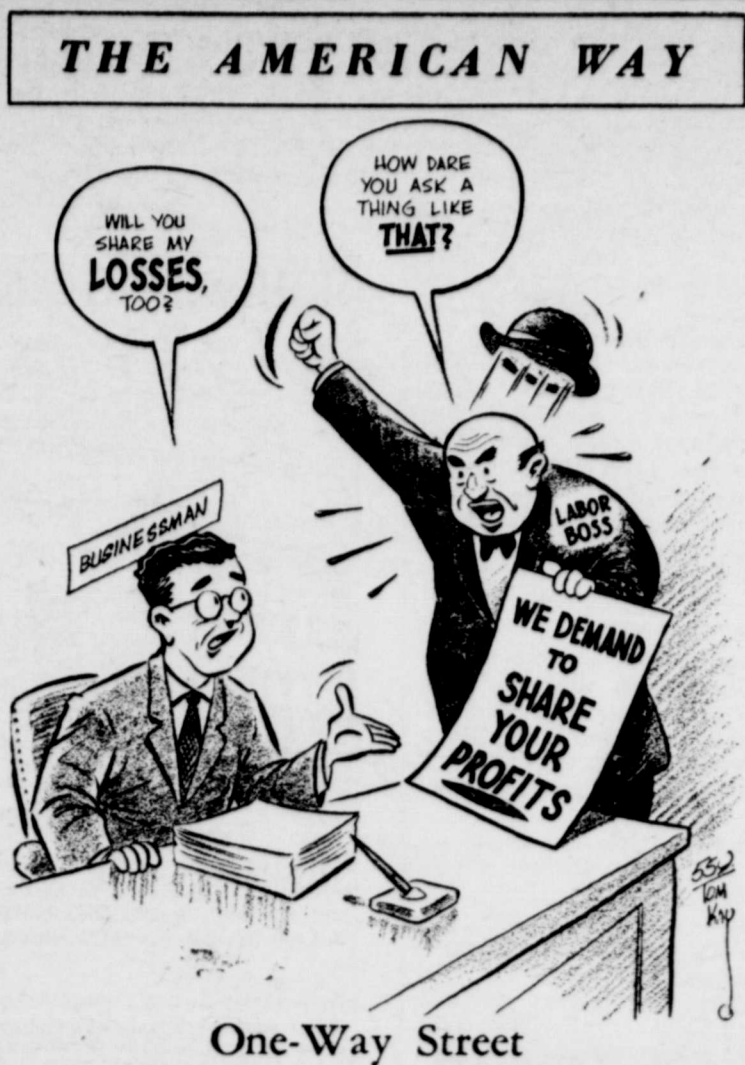

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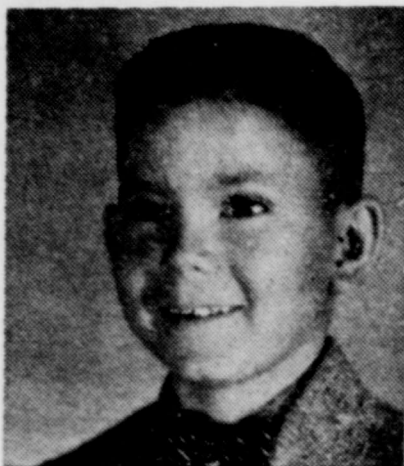
