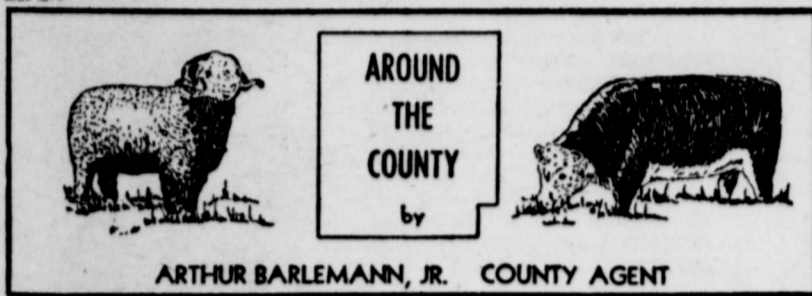

Present were 4-H club members, their parents, invited guests, which included buyers of 4-H club lambs at the 1958 county show, show officials, commissioners court members, and others. The weather was agreeable, the barbecue was up to par for E. M. Roberts, and it was a very nice deal in the city park.

4-H club members received their awards and year pins for the 1957 year's work. They were presented by R. L. Huckabee, District Agent for the Extension Service District 7. Ernest Williams, secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association presented the Sheep and Goat Raisers county award, a sterling silver tie clip to David Durham.

Mosquitos are bigger than ever this year. The standing pools of water resulting from the rain last week are furnishing excellent sources of the bothersome creatures. To eliminate them in water, there are several treatments depending on the location of the water and its

use. Stock tanks can be treated with kerosene. If there is vegetation in the tank apply the oil at the rate of 9 ounces of oil per 100 square feet of water surface. If there is no vegetation apply it at the rate of 2 to 4 ounces per 100 square feet of water surface.

In ponds where there is no fish or livestock presenting a problem, treat the water with a 1% solution of DDT, chlordane, or toxaphene, or methoxychlor. This requires 1 ounce per 100 square feet of water. Treatment will usually have to be repeated at weekly intervals as long as the water remains a source of mosquitos.

This long Fourth of July weekend will find many, many travelers on the roads. People will be rushing off to take advantage of the long week-end to visit relatives, fish, or just travel. The roads will be crowded; speed will be utmost in many people's minds—to get to the lake before all the cabins are taken or to the coast before all the boats are signed up.

If you get out on the highway, be especially careful this weekend. We can't afford to lose a single reader of this paper or column and we do want you reading it next weekend when it makes its appearance.

Two 1958 Easters Attract Visitors To Old Jerusalem

Easter is the most joyous and most celebrated Christian festival of Bible Lands, notably in Jordan, where, two thousand years ago, the events leading up to Easter morning actually took place. Visitors to Old Jerusalem will be able to enjoy two Easters this year—the Western Latin Easter which follows the Gregorian Calendar and which falls in 1958 on April 6, and the Eastern Easter, which follows the Julian Calendar and falls on April 13.

Observance of Easter in Old Jerusalem, Jordan, starts with a Palm Sunday procession from Bethphage, past the Garden of Gethsemane, through St. Stephen's Gate into the old city of Jerusalem. Worshipers and pilgrims from many countries walk the mile and a half journey reverently and quietly, carrying palm branches in their hands.

All during Holy Week colorful ceremonies take place in Old Jerusalem, commemorating events in Christ's last week on earth. Notable are the Washing of the Feet Ceremonies, the Good Friday processions along the Via Dolorosa, the Holy Fire Ceremony, the Abyssinian Searching for the Body of Jesus ceremony, and the sunrise services on Easter morning at the Garden Tomb.

Easter Sunday is a time of great rejoicing in the homes of Old Jerusalem. Each member of the family wears new clothes for Easter. After church it is

customary to pay calls. The mother and older daughters of the house remain at home to receive guests, the father, sons, and younger children make the calls, starting with the eldest member of the family group and continuing until calls have been made on all relatives and friends. Each home visited is usually full of friends and neighbors who greet each other with the traditional Easter greeting "Al-Masih Qam" (Christ has Arisen) and the response "Hakkan Qam" (verily He has Arisen). Moslems traditionally pay calls upon their Christian friends during Easter week.

Easter calls are brief, merely to drink a cup of coffee, and to accept three Easter gifts: a circular date-stuffed cookie with a hole in the center, symbolizing the Crown of Thorns, a sponge-like sugar cookie, which symbolizes the Sponge of Vinegar which was offered to Christ on the Cross, and a colored egg, generally red, symbolizing the resurrection.

Both Latin and Eastern Easters have equally colorful ceremonies, and visitors who can spend two Easter Weeks in Old Jerusalem, amid flower-strewn surrounding hills, with the fragrance of almond and cherry blossoms in the air, and with the joyous gladness of Easter in the faces of the people of Old Jerusalem, will find the experience a rare and unforgettable one.

J. H. Blackburn, 81, Buried Here Monday Afternoon

J. H. Blackburn, 81, a resident of Sterling County for the past 40 years, died at his home here Sunday. He had been ill for some time.

Services were held at 3 p.m. on Monday at the First Presbyterian Church with burial in the Foster Cemetery under the direction of Lowe Funeral Home. Officiating at the services was the Rev. Billy R. Crews, pastor of the First Baptist Church here.

Mr. Blackburn was born May 24, 1877 at Navasota, Texas. He had been a resident of Sterling County for the last half of his life.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Miss Frances Blackburn of Sterling City and Mrs. Mable Zimmerman of Midland; three sons, John C. Blackburn of Carlsbad, J. R. Blackburn of Brownfield and Eugene Blackburn of Sterling City; and seven grandchildren.

Serving as pallbearers were S.M. Bailey, W. Y. Bengel, Jr., Harvey Glass, Ollie Carper, Jeff Davis and Finis Westbrook.

V. T. Ferguson Buried Here Thursday Afternoon

Virgil Tennyson Ferguson, 74, a resident of Sterling County for only a few months, died at the hospital here Wednesday morning as an electrocardiogram was being run on his heart. He had suffered a heart attack about a week ago and had come in for a more thorough checkup. He was at the Sterling County Hospital.

Services were held at the Church of Christ here Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with Marion Hays, the minister, officiating. Burial was in the City Cemetery with the Lowe Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Ferguson and his sons had begun to operate the Pat Jackson ranch south of town recently. He was born in Stephenville January 13, 1884 and had lived there most of his life.

He is survived by his wife, three sons, Merton and Leon of Sterling and Garland of Saginaw; one brother, Oran of Carlsbad, New Mexico; two sisters, Mrs. Mollie Barham of Stephenville and Mrs. T. J. Hart of Plainview and one grand child.

The first expense reports due to be filed with the County clerk are to be filed July 16-18. This is the first of such reports that must be filed.

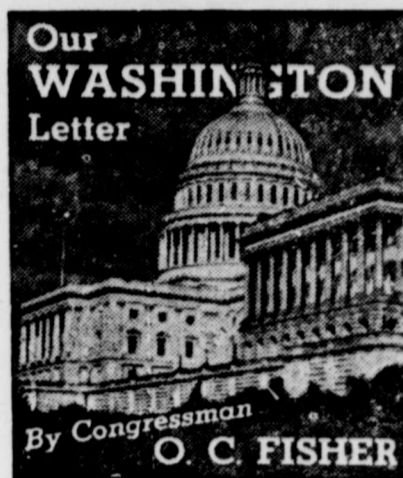

A RAILROAD TRANSPORTATION bill, designed to reorganize and modernize the laws that deal with railroads, and to provide a loan program for certain lines in financial stress, passed the House last week. It was previously approved by the Senate.

Certain New England interests had been able to slip an amendment into the bill before it reached the House which would remove scoured and clean wool from the present exemption from ICC rate control. By shopping around on the free competitive market, scouring plants are able to get wool shipped east by truck at a substantial saving in rates under those charged by railroads. We were able to get the bill changed on the Floor of the House, and retain the present exemption.
