

Democratic Primary Election July 26

The first Democratic primary of 1859 will be held over Texas next week—Saturday, July 26. Nominees for the Democratic Party column in November will be named at either the first or run-off primary this summer. Democratic nomination in Texas is tantamount to election, as it is in most southern states.

Practically the whole gamut of offices are being fought for—especially in the state and district races. In the county the sheriff, county attorney and two commissioners (1 and 3) do not have races this year.

The race for county judge has 4 hopefuls in the race. Seeking the nomination are T. E. (Gene) Carr, C. T. (Boots) Williams, Bill V. Davis and W.R. (Bill) Brooks. All are seeking the office held for 20 years by G. C. Murrell. John Walraven and A. W. Dearen are seeking the office of Justice of the Peace, Prec. No. 1. T. E. Carr, the present Justice, is running for county judge, and not seeking reelection to the J.P. office. Stanley Horwood is on the ticket for county commissioner of Precinct 2 and E. F. McEntire is asking reelection of precinct No. 4. Voting will be at the usual polling places said Jack Douthit, Democratic Executive chairman.

Candidates on the ballot are only listed for the pertinent precincts, meaning that voters in precinct 1 will have candidates for Justice of the Peace whereas no other voting boxes will have them listed, etc.

Names for persons to be elected as precinct chairmen will have to be written in, said chairman Jack Douthit. Serving now are J.S. Cole—Precinct 1; Reynolds Foster—Precinct 2; Mrs. T. H. Humble—Precinct 3; Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum—Precinct 4; N. H. Reed—Precinct 5; and the absentee box Roland L. Lowe.

The voting boxes and the judges and assistants (as appointed by the Commissioners Court) are as follows:

Box 1—At courthouse: O. T. Jones and W. R. Brooks. Brooks is of course disqualified this time being a candidate.

Box 2—Mrs. Bill Blair and Reynolds Foster.

Box 3—Mrs. T. H. Humble and Mrs. Wm. Foster.

Box 4—Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum and Billy R. Bynum.

Box 5—N. H. Reed and Forrest Foster.

Box 6—Absentee Box: Roland L. Lowe, S.M. Bailey and Mrs. Martin Reed.

Voting will be in the usual places. The places listed above, including the courthouse for box 1, and the homes of the judges in the others.

Candidates should file their first expense report with the county clerk, reminded Douthit by today, Friday, July 18.

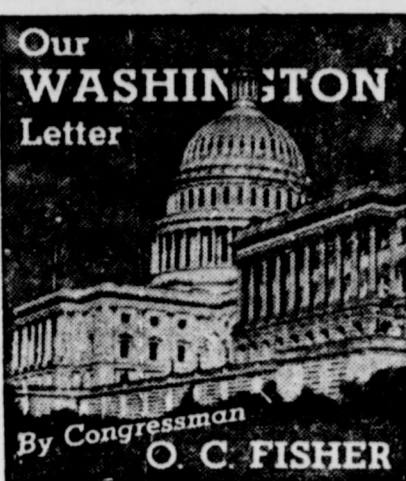

THE LIBERAL MAKE-UP of the Supreme Court under Chief Justice Warren was accented last week when the Senate Judiciary Committee reported an analysis of decisions involving subversive activities.

Going back to 1943 and tracing the trend, the report reveals that during the 10 year period up to 1953 when Warren was appointed, the court acted on 34 cases involving communism and subversion. A majority of the Court voted in favor of the position advocated by the Communists in 15 cases, and held contrary to what the communists wanted in 19 cases.

But in the 4½ years since 1953 when Warren became Chief Justice the Court consented to hear a total of 39 cases involving Communist or subversive activities in one form or another. Whether by coincidence or otherwise, the Com-mies were favored in 30 out of the 39 decisions.

Warren decided with the Com-mies in 36 out of the 39 cases; Justice Black and Douglas voted 100 percent liberal; Other Justices varied, with Justice Burton voting through the years pro-Communist 32 times, 37 against. Justice Tom Clark of Texas has established himself as the most conservative and most anti-Communist member of the Court. His box score shows 18 for and 33 against the Commie position, since he became a Judge.

WHAT ABOUT the flag, now that Alaska is coming in? The make-up of the new flag will be decided later, probably by a special board, headed by Admiral Dewey. Congress can, of course, legislate on this but it is more likely the President will make the decision, probably through a commission he would appoint.

But what to do with the 40 million old flags is being asked. They may continue to be used even though a new one with 49 stars is okayed. In fact, under the law it would be appropriate to fly a flag with only 13 stars, since it was once the recognized flag of our country.

So, let's hold on to those old flags. They are good souvenirs to keep, and they still will continue to be just as appropriate and useful as they ever were.

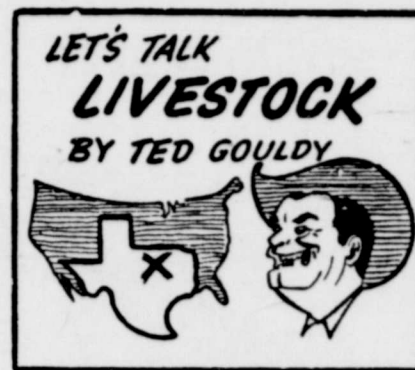

CATTLE AND CALVES WEAKEN, RUNS EXPAND

FORT WORTH—Cattle and calves opened about steady at Ft. Worth Monday but weakness developed on cows shortly after the opening and sales were around 50 cents lower by the time a clearance was completed. Liberal waterfills offset some of the apparently lower offers in most cases. Fed steers and yearlings sold on a steady to weaker basis, spots 25 cents or more lower. Most of the fed cattle were of the shortfed, or warmed-up grasser variety and attracted about equal bids in many cases from packers and feeder buyers.

Slaughter calves were steady to weaker, compared with the high close of last week, as national packers exerted pressure from the start on that class. Stocker and feeder cattle and calves were firm through out. Bulls were steady to stronger, some toppy bulls up to \$22.50 or fifty cents above most recent sales.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$24 to \$27 and common and medium offerings cleared at \$17 to \$24. Fat cows cashed at \$17.50 to \$20.50, and canners and cutters drew \$11 to \$17.50. Bulls earned \$18 to \$22.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$24 to \$28, and common and medium sorts brought \$17 to \$24. Culls sold at \$14 to \$17. Medium to good stocker steer calves cleared at \$25 to \$32, a few to \$33. Heifer calves ranged from \$29 down ward. Stocker steer yearlings of medium to good grades sold from \$22 to \$27, with some choice lighter weights to \$27.50 and \$28. Stocker heifers sold around \$24 to \$25 and downward.

LAMBS AND YEARLINGS OPEN LOWER, FEEDERS FIRM

Slaughter lambs were weak to 50 cents or more lower and the top was \$1 under the highest price last week. Strictly choice lambs were very scarce. Yearling wethers were weak to 50 cents lower. Older sheep and goats were steady.

Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$20 to \$22 and cull to medium lambs sold from \$12 to \$19. Stocker and feeder lambs ranged from \$17 to \$20, and shorn feeders sold from \$18 down.

Good to choice yearlings ranged from \$17 to \$18, some 118-pound yearlings at \$17. Cull to medium yearlings sold from \$12 to \$15. Slaughter ewes cashed at \$7 to \$7.50. Slaughter goats sold around \$7. Two-year-old wethers ranged from \$14 downward. Old bucks brought \$5 to \$6. Broken mouthed ewes sold at \$11 and fairly low mouthed ewes sold at \$14. Young ewes were scarce.

HOGS OPEN 50c OFF, TOP BUTCHERS \$23.75

Hogs sold 50 cents lower as choice hogs cashed at \$23.25 to \$23.75 and medium to good butchers cashed at \$21 to \$23. Pigs drew \$20 to \$22. Sows sold from \$18 to \$21, a few choice lightweights to \$21.50.

FIRE TRUCK BOUGHT FOR STERLING

Mayor Rufus Foster and Fire Chief R. P. Brown went to San Angelo Monday and met with the City Commission. There they asked for and got a used fire truck (in good condition) for the City of Sterling City. The commission voted to sell the truck to Sterling City for \$1,000. It has new tires and a new motor in it. The pump will pump enough water to earn a reduction in fire rates here, said chief Brown. It is possible now to fix up two tank trucks for fighting grass fires, etc. and still have the hose truck for town, it was pointed out.

\$2,000 Donations Needed

Chief Brown said if citizens here will donate \$2,000 the department can fix up the two grass fighting trucks, buy 1,000 feet of new hose for the newly bought truck and some other items needed to make the department come up to specifications. A committee has been named to try and raise the necessary funds. People who will be asked to leave a donation at the bank now, even before they are approached for donations.

Lions Hear About New Fire Truck

Fire Chief R. P. Brown told the Lions Club that if \$2,000 could be raised for new fire fighting equipment, that the city could have a real set-up for fighting local fires and ranch grass fires. A truck was purchased from the City of San Angelo Fire Department this week for \$1,000. The State Fire Insurance Commissioners have indicated, said Mr. Brown, that Sterling would get a reduction in fire insurance rates when the new truck was approved for pumping 400 gallons a minute. Some new hose (1,000 feet) and a few more necessary items which will bring the department up to date. The old tank truck will be dismantled and the tank put on the smaller truck, making an excellent grass-fighting truck. This will give Sterling County the hose truck just purchased and two tank trucks for grass fires, etc.

Donations Needed Now

The \$2,000 needed now to fix up the trucks should be raised now. Donations may be turned in at the bank. A committee was appointed to raise money for the department. Vice-President Bill Green was asked to name a committee from the club and several outsiders. He named Roland Lowe, S. M. Bailey, Arthur Barlemann and Jeff Davis. Then Rufus Foster and H. L. Hildebrand and David Glass were added by the other members.

Santa Fe Agency Here To Be Discontinued

Lion Secretary Billy Crews read a letter from the Railroad Commission of Texas granting the discontinuance of the Santa Fe Agency here in Sterling City. The station is to be kept open as a prepay station for carload shipments only said the letter from the commission.

Attend 50th Anniversary of Ordination of Dr. Baxter Greer

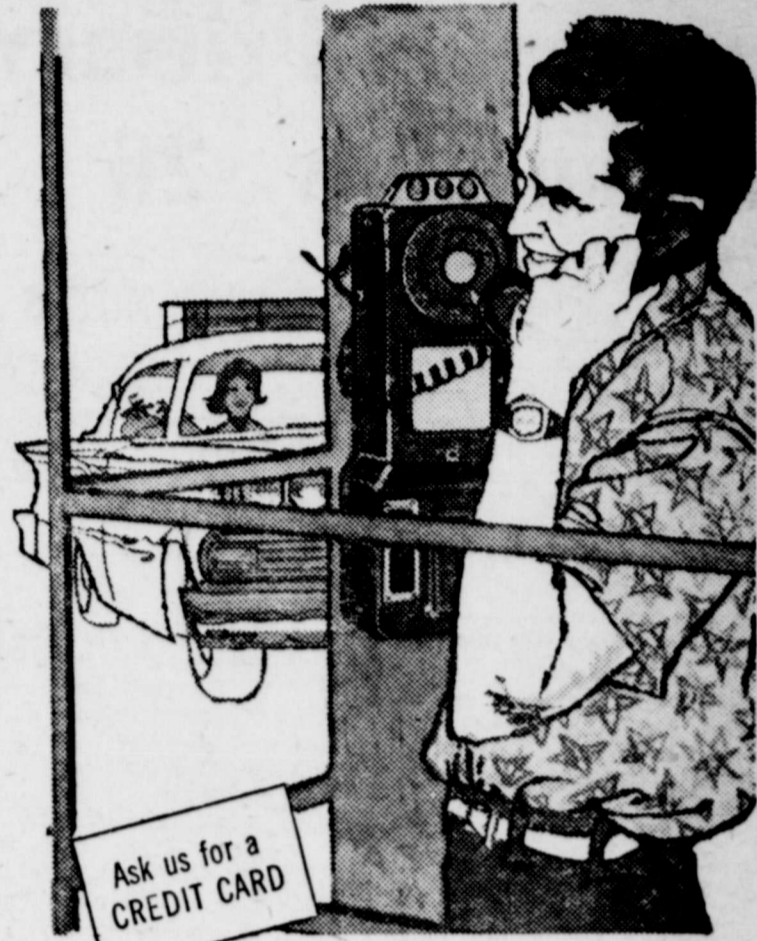
