when Warren was appointed court acted on 34 cases involving
communism and subversion. A ma-
jority of the Court voted in favor

Communists in 15 cases, and held
contrary to what the communists wanted in 19 cases.
But in the $41 / 1 /$ years since 1953
when Warren became Chief Justice the Court consented to hear a
total of 39 cases involving Com-
munist or subversive activities in munist or subversive activities in
cne form or another. Whether by
coincidence or otherwise ,the Commies were favored in 30 out of the
39 decisions.
