Primary Election Set For Tomorrow

The Democratic Primary election will be held tomorrow, July 26. The polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. here in Sterling County, and voting will be at the usual voting places.

A second or run-off primary will be held a month later in August on the 23rd.

It is estimated that over 400 voters will vote in Sterling County in tomorrow's election, said Jack Douthit, county chairman. Interest is high in not only the governor's and U.S. Senator's races, but the local County Judge's and J.P. race will cause more people to vote.

Twenty-nine persons had voted absentee as the time ended Tuesday, said Mrs. Chas. Speck, deputy in the county clerk's office. This is about the usual number for absentee voting in a primary.

Names for persons to be elected as precinct chairmen will have to be written in, said chairman Jack Douthit. Serving now are J.S. Cole—Precinct 1; Reynolds Foster—Precinct 2; W. H. Owens—Precinct 3; and Ross Foster—Precinct 4.

The returns will be posted on a large cardboard in front of the local West Texas Utilities office, said the county chairman. Listed will be all state and district races that have two or more running for the same office and all local races. The large (and old) blackboards of former years will not be used this year.

Practically the whole gamut of offices are being fought for—especially in the state and district races. In the county the sheriff, county attorney and two commissioners (1 and 3) do not have races this year.

The race for county judge has 4 hopefuls in the race. Seeking the nomination are T. E. (Gene) Carr, C. T. (Boots) Williams, Bill V. Davis and W.R. (Bill) Brooks. All are seeking the office held for 20 years by G. C. Murrell. John Walraven and A. W. Dearen are seeking the office of Justice of the Peace, Prec. No. 1. T. E. Carr, the present Justice, is running for county judge, and not seeking reelection to the J.P. office. Stanley Horwood is on the ticket for county commissioner of Precinct 2 and E. F. McEntire is asking reelection of precinct No. 4. Voting will be at the usual polling places said Jack Douthit, Democratic Executive chairman.

Candidates on the ballot are only listed for the pertinent precincts, meaning that voters in precinct 1 will have candidates for Justice of the Peace whereas no other voting boxes will have them listed, etc.

The voting boxes and the judges and assistants (as appointed by the Commissioners Court) are as follows:

Box 1—At courthouse: O. T. Jones and W. R. Brooks. Brooks is of course disqualified this time being a candidate.

Box 2—Mrs. Bill Blair and Reynolds Foster.

Box 3—Mrs. T. H. Humble and Mrs. Wm. Foster.

Box 4—Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum and Billy R. Bynum.

Box 5—N. H. Reed and Forrest Foster.

Box 6—Absentee Box: Roland L. Lowe, S.M. Bailey and Mrs. Martin Reed.

Voting will be in the usual places. The places listed above, including the courthouse for box 1, and the homes of the judges in the others.

Behind The 8 Ball

Well, Saturday, the election hits. Demo Primary, that is. But here in Texas that means election usually.

We usually stick our neck out and make guesses on state races.

Seems to me that Governor Daniel will go back for a second term without a runoff. Gonzalez or Leo will be second man in the race.

Ben Ramsey is scheduled to go back as lieutenant governor, beating George Nokes.

Bill Blakley could beat Ralph W. Yarborough by taking 55 percent of the total to Yarborough's 45, or it could be the other way around. It should be a close race.

Robert Hamilton could and very well might beat both Hunt and Smith on the Supreme Court race. Hamilton is the best qualified man according to all accounts I've had.

Joe Greenhill is scheduled to beat Mrs. Sarah T. Hughes for the place on the Supreme Court.

Bill Allcorn will probably beat Lil Dimmitt for the office of Land Commissioner, and John White is more than likely going to win reelection for the Commissioner of Agriculture.

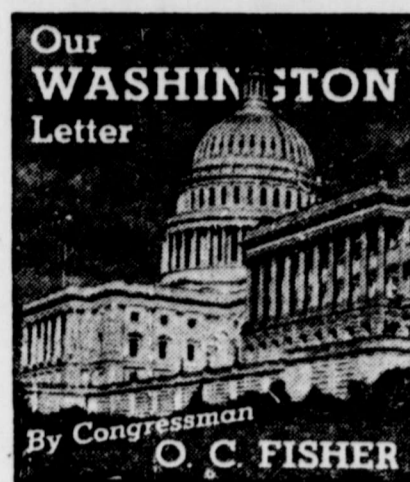
The bank will be closed here on Saturday, July 26, election day.

A STATES RIGHTS BILL passed the House last week. Designed to protect the Constitutional rights of the States against Federal encroachment, the measure simply provides:

"No Act of Congress shall be construed as indicating an intent on the part of Congress to occupy the field in which such Act operates, to the exclusion of all State laws on the same subject matter, unless such Act retains an express provision to that effect, or unless there is a direct and positive conflict between such Act and a State law."

In recent years the Supreme Court in several decisions has cast aside State laws because there were Federal laws on the same subject. A good example of that occurred in the Steve Nelson case wherein Nelson, a Communist leader, was convicted under a Pennsylvania law for subversive activities. But the Supreme Court set Nelson free on the theory that since Congress had enacted anti-subversive laws, all state laws on the subject were automatically invalid.

If the Senate follows suit and if this bill becomes law, it will be a significant step toward protecting the sovereignty of the States against encroachments by actions of the courts. It in effect says to the courts "Don't knock down state laws unless they are in conflict with Federal laws."

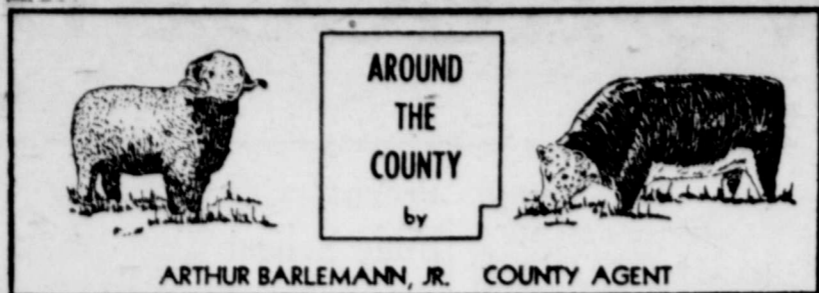

No Time — Nor Money — For Frills



The week of July 20-26 was designated Farm Safety Week by the president. This is the 15th national observance of the week.

Why is National Farm Safety week important? There are three big reasons why it is important to each of us; each is a prospective statistic. I would like to enumerate the reasons which are:

1. FARM WORK accidents claim 3,500 to 4,000 lives each year, more than any other major industry. This is in work on the farm or ranch alone.

2. From 12,000 to 15,000 farm residents lose their lives each year in all types of accidents; this includes highway accidents.

3. A million farm people suffer accidental injuries and the accompanying disabilities, miseries and financial strain each year.

Falls are a leading cause of death and injuries to farm residents each year with most of these occurring in the home. Check your home; see if the stairways are all in good shape with no loose boards, no shaky ladders, no loose throw rugs which are usually good for a fall.

Statistics for Texas released by the National Safety Council show that drownings lead in Texas, causing 23% of all accidents, machinery is second causing 22.4%, firearms 15.8%, burns 9.5%, falls 6.2%, animals 5.6%, lightning 4.1%, electric current 3.9%, blows 3.3%

and all other causes 6.2%.

A study of farm accidents for one year was recently made in Pennsylvania which revealed some interesting facts. Average cost of each accident was \$115, of which \$55 was for medical care and \$60 for time lost from work. Boys 15 to 19 had the highest accident rate—men 30 to 39 the second highest rate. More accidents occurred between the hours of 2 to 4 p.m. and more of them on Wednesday and Saturday. Also, the larger the farms the higher the accident rate per 100 farms.

Accidents on the farm, and elsewhere as well, do not just happen. The majority are caused by human factors and failures. Too often we are prone to do something that we know is hazardous but we do it saying to ourselves, if I get by this time I'll never do that again. Rural residents are more likely to have accidents than other industrial people because industry has a safety education program, which is aimed at preventing accidents before they happen, not after.

The large amount of dry weeds and winter grass on the ranges now make it advisable for ranchers to keep some type of equipment ready and available for fighting grass fires. The high winds we have had lately make it necessary that fires be extinguished quickly since the wind could spread them over a large area in a very short time.

On thing that nearly every rancher has available that makes an excellent piece of firefighting equipment is a livestock sprayer. The sprayer should be kept filled so it will be ready to fight a fire at a moments notice. Also, any portable water tank might also be kept ready for such an emergency.

All precautions should be taken to prevent fires. Be certain that all matches and smoking material such as cigarettes or cigars are completely extinguished before they are thrown into the dry grass or weeds.

A number of 4-H club members are at work preparing grass mounts for the new contest on range management sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. One of the divisions in the contest is the collection and preparation of mounts of the different grasses, weeds and brush found in this area.

Club members who are working on this project include David Durham, Mitsy Davis, Reynolds Lee Foster, Clayton Stewart and several others. They are doing an excellent job of getting their material

and have it in good shape.

There have been a number of horses lost due to sleeping sickness in Glascock County just out of Sterling County. It might be well for everyone to watch their horses and if more cases develop, vaccinate to prevent it. Five horses were lost on the one place where it was confirmed by a veterinarian but thus far it is the only place where it has been reported in the immediate vicinity. Since spring there have been a number of cases of sleeping sickness in horses in Central Texas, East Texas, and an area around San Antonio.

Symptoms of sleeping sickness vary but the most pronounced are sluggishness or drowsiness, lips loose and dropped or tensed and wrinkled, and sometimes drawn to one side. The muscles of the neck and shoulders and flank may twitch spasmodically. As the disease progresses, the animal has a stumbling, awkward gait, may move in a circle, some animals back up persistently, others legs are crossed and the animal becomes stupid. The disease is transmitted by insects such as mosquitos and ticks. Vaccination is the only preventive and gives protection for a limited time during an outbreak.

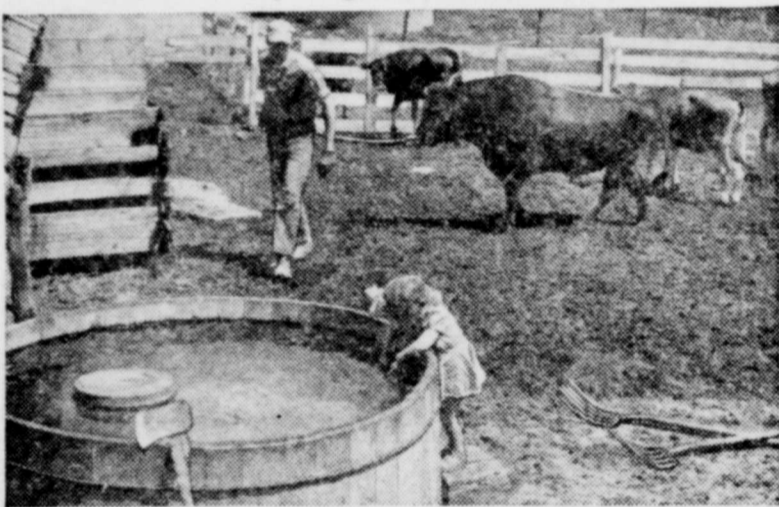

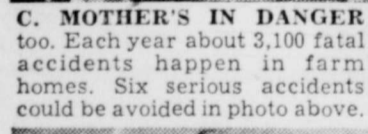
