### MECHANICAL COTTON PICKERS O.D. Emery Likes Em

O. D. Emery, son of Mrs. W. L Emery of Sterling, has developed a real liking for mechanical cotton Valley and raises lots of cotton.

He has bought some of the mechanical monsters that can pick two bales of cotton an hour and has even gone into the cotton picking business. He'll pick cotton for the other farmers with his cotton picking machines. O.D. said: "I'm through with bracero labor in cot-ton picking." A machine can pick a bale of cotton for about \$5 a bale-including labor, supplies, depreciation, interest and taxes. The actual operation of a mechanical harvester is estimated to be only \$1 a bale. A machine costs from \$16,000 to \$17,000 each.

Bracero and other hand labor generally costs \$45 per bale at the rate of \$3 per 100 pounds and 1,500 pounds of seed cotton.






